High Winds Cause Damage To Roofs, Trees, Cotton

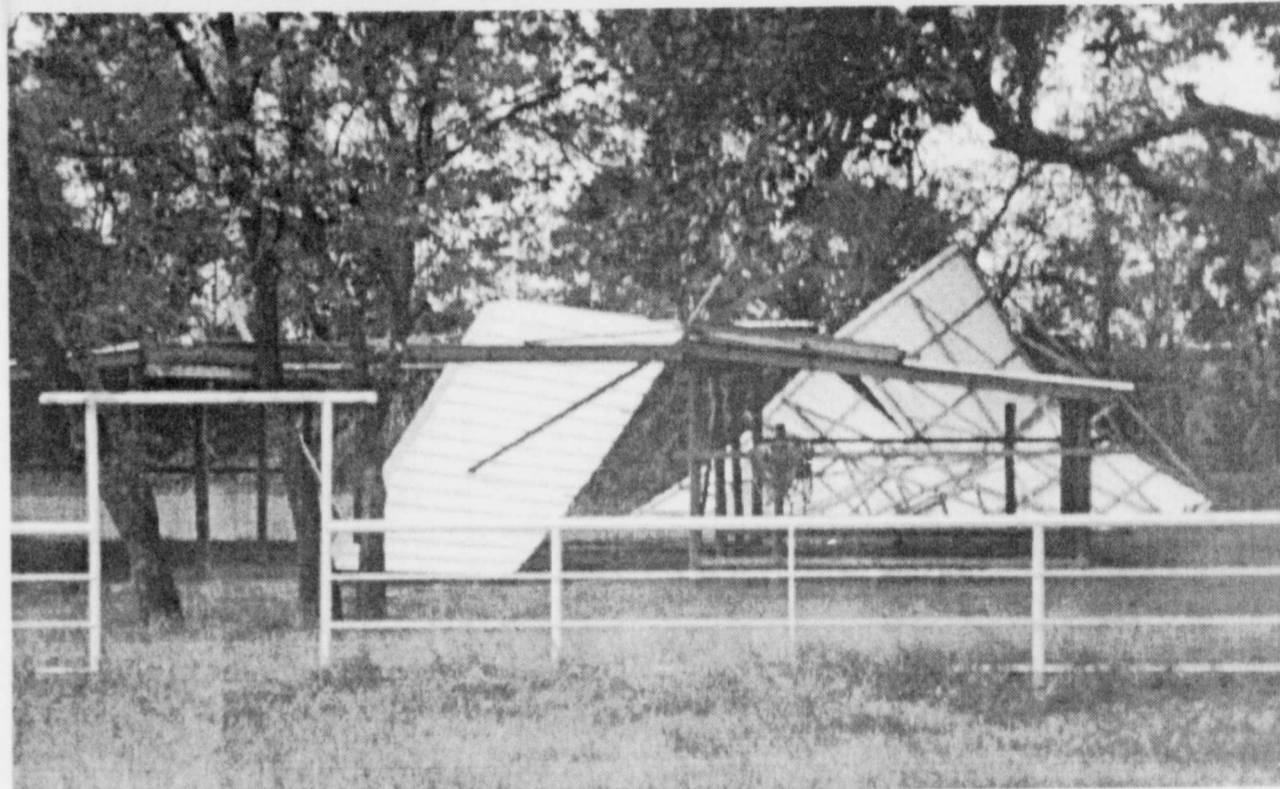
High winds and storm clouds woke residents of this area about 5:30 or 6:00 a.m. on Friday, October 21st. Winds reached as high as 60 miles an hour as branches, whole trees, metal barns, car porches and porches were literally ripped, torn and blown away.

In some cases the top third of cotton modules in the fields were blown off and scattered.

Damage reports of dented cars from limbs and some serious roof damage

were also noted. The storm dumped about one inch of rain on the area, and produced a loud roaring noise that made witnesses fear that a tornado was coming. A straight wind seems to have done the damage, however.

Weather settled down after that into days of cloud or intermittent rain.

Letter To The Editor

Dear Mrs. Nichols:
In my research in preparation for writing a history of the Post Oak community and surrounding area, I find that some of the people who lived or had connections to Post Oak later lived in the Deport area. If the reader has info on any of these people, or others who may be unknown to me, I would be grateful.

I would appreciate our placing this query in the Deport Times at your earliest convenience:
I am needing info on the following individuals/families:

Bro. D.W. Perkins, of Deport area, pastored the Post Oak Baptist Church sometime in the 1890's, it seems. Need more info on him and dates he may have pastored.

Bro. C.P. Pearson, also of Deport area, may have pastored this church in this same period. Any info on him and the dates would be helpful.

Calvin Marshall, a well known carpenter of the Blossom and Deport areas, owned a large tract of land just north of Post Oak ca. 1915/20. It is said that his sister's daughter was a teacher in the old Beulah School about that time. What was her name? Would like more info on these people. Think Calvin is buried in Deport.

Alonzo Dee Wright and wife,

Caldee (Rivers) Wright, who had roots in Deport, lived in Post Oak area for several years and died a few months apart in 1960/61 and are buried in Post Oak Cemetery.

Allegedly, one L.D. Wright and wife, Lillie M. Berry Wright may have had connections to the area, but I have no info on them, other than one of the men was supposedly called "Little Dee" and one, "Big Dee".

One John Wright, and wife, Claudie, seems to have lived in the Post Oak area in 1935, as Claudie and her stillborn son died that year and are buried in the Post Oak Cemetery. Whether they were of the Deport Wrights, I do not know.

This Post Oak history, it is hoped, will contain over 200 family histories of families who lived in Post Oak in the past 100 years or more. Also included will be: Will and Dora Hamby and their daughters who later lived in Deport; Lamer Mayes and family, who lived in Morgantown in the mid 1920's; J.C. and Sallie Young, who later lived in Milton; and Bob and Laura Southerland, who also lived in Milton, among others.

Spanish Rice
1 1/2 cups chopped onion
28 ounce can of tomatoes
1/2 cup finely chopped green pepper
1/2 teaspoon salt
dash of ground cloves
1 bay leaf
1 cup uncooked long-grain white rice
Spray a 3 quart microwave dish and cover with vegetable-oil spray. Add onions, tomatoes, green peppers, salt, cloves and bay leaf. Cover and cook with the microwave on HIGH for 1 minute. Stir and then continue cooking on MEDIUM for 4 minutes. Stir in the rice, recover and return to the microwave. Cook on MEDIUM for 10 minutes, rotating the dish and stirring every two minutes.

Delightful Rice Pudding
2 cups skim milk
2 eggs-slightly beaten
1/3 cup granulated sugar replacement
1-1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract
1/4 teaspoon cinnamon
1/8 teaspoon nutmeg
1/2 cup quick-cooking rice
1/3 cup raisins
Measure the milk in a 1 quart microwave or glass measuring cup. With the microwave on HIGH, cook for 5 minutes or until hot. Combine the remaining ingredients in 1-1/2 or 2 quart microwave casserole or bowl. Stir to mix; then blend in the hot milk. Cover with a lid or plastic wrap. With the microwave on LOW, cook for 12 to 15 minutes or until set. Allow the pudding to rest 5 minutes before serving.

Meat Loaf
1 beef bouillon cube
1/2 cup boiling water
2 slices bread-crumbed fine
1-1/2 pound 85% lean ground beef
2 medium eggs-beaten
1/2 cup chopped onion
1/4 cup chopped celery
2 teaspoons Worcestershire sauce
1 tablespoon catsup
Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Line a shallow 8-inch baking dish with foil. Dissolve beef bouillon cube in boiling water in a large bowl. Add all other ingredients except catsup and blend well with a fork. Turn onto foil in pan and with hands shape quickly into a 6 by 4-1/2 by 2 inch loaf. With the dull edge of a knife make a criss-cross pattern across the top; spread catsup on top. Cover loaf with a tent of foil that does not touch the top. Bake for 45 minutes. Remove foil; bake uncovered, for another 45 minutes. Remove from oven and cool in pan for 2-3 minutes before serving. Using this molded method instead of loaf pan allows the fat to drain from the loaf, whereas a loaf pan retains the fat.

Light and Lemony Cheesecake
1-1/2 cups low-fat cottage cheese (or part-skim ricotta cheese)
2 teaspoons grated lemon zest
1 envelope unflavored gelatin
1/4 cup freshly squeezed lemon juice
3 eggs-searated
1/2 cup skim milk
Artificial sweetener equivalent to 8 teaspoons sugar
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
1/4 teaspoon cream of tartar
1 graham cracker crust(see below)
berry sauce(see below)
Press the cottage cheese through a sieve into a bowl. Stir in lemon zest. Sprinkle the gelatin over the lemon juice to soften it; set aside for 5 minutes. Combine the egg yolks and milk in the top of a double broiler. Cook, stirring until the mixture thickens. Remove from heat and stir in gelatin mixture until dissolves. Add the sweetener, vanilla extract and strained cottage cheese to the yolk-gelatin mixture. Refrigerate, stirring occasionally, until partially set. Beat the egg whites with the cream of tartar until stiff peaks form. Fold into the gelatin mixture. Pour into the prepared Graham Cracker Crust. Chill about 4 hours until firm. Serve with Berry Sauce if desired.

Graham Cracker Crust
3/4 cup graham cracker crumbs
3 tablespoons melted margarine
1/4 teaspoon ground cinnamon
1/4 teaspoon freshly grated nutmeg
In a mixing bowl or food processor, combine the crumbs, margarine and spices. Mix or process until well blended. Press into the bottom of a 9-inch pie plate. Use as is or bake for 10 minutes in a 350 degree oven and cool before using.

Berry Sauce
1 cup berries-unsweetened
1 tablespoon freshly squeezed lemon juice
liquid artificial sweetener equivalent to 12 teaspoons sugar
Puree all of the ingredients in a blender or food processor. Strain through a fine-mesh strainer to remove any seeds. Store in a tightly covered container in the refrigerator or freezer.

Hog Killin' And Pork Sausage

In last week's Country Cooking column, we asked if any one had an old fashioned recipe for seasoning for pork sausage. We received several interesting recipes. One was from from a lady, I'm not sure of her name. She said that it brought back fond memories to her of long ago, when "hog killing time" was a big deal to their country farm.

She relates that she began looking for a recipe that she could share with Mr. Marris that belonged to either her parents or grandparents. She said that they had moved out of their lives taking so much information that they wish they could remember.

Old timers used to say when they had a killing frost and ice, it was time to butcher the hogs. That usually happened in November, not so today. The winters are not cold enough to preserve the meat. Their place was the center for all the neighbors to come and bring their hogs to be cleaned.

It was a barn raising and they were all there to eat the noon meal. A group of hungry men could eat a mountain of food. This was a part of life they knew. It was a good life with no frills. It was called plain living. Below is her recipe.

Pork Sausage
Use any combination of lean meat not used otherwise.
10 pounds of lean pork
1/4 cup salt
2 teaspoon black pepper
2 teaspoon red pepper
1-1/2 tablespoon sage
Run through sausage grinder. Pack in small clean sacks and hang in the smoke house.
The next two recipes were submitted by Mary Jackson of Paris and she said that these recipes were used by the late Melvin Jackson and parents, Albert and Alma Jackson.

Pork Sausages
12 pounds of meat
3 tablespoons salt
3 tablespoons black pepper
2 tablespoons sage
1 teaspoon red pepper
Mix on meat and grind.
This recipe will care for 1000 pounds of fresh pork.

Pork Sausage
25 pounds of fine salt
4 pounds of sugar
9 ounces black pepper
9 ounces red pepper
Put preparation in tub. Rub meat good with mixture. Next morning, put on the remaining mixture.
Let us know, Mr. Marris if these recipes have helped you and are what you need.

They agreed to meet again in five years.

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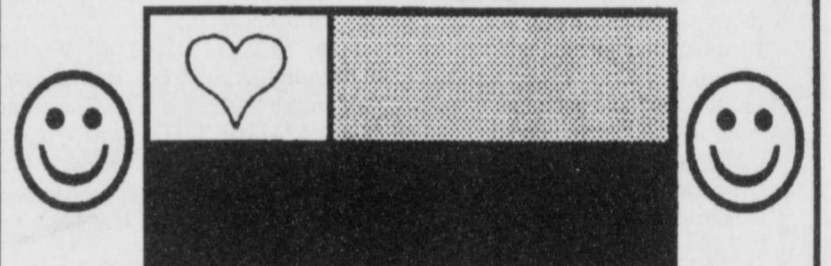
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Terrence Farrell To Perform

He has played in Ireland, West Germany, Spain and across the United States to name a few.

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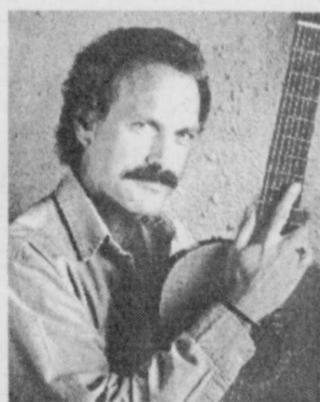

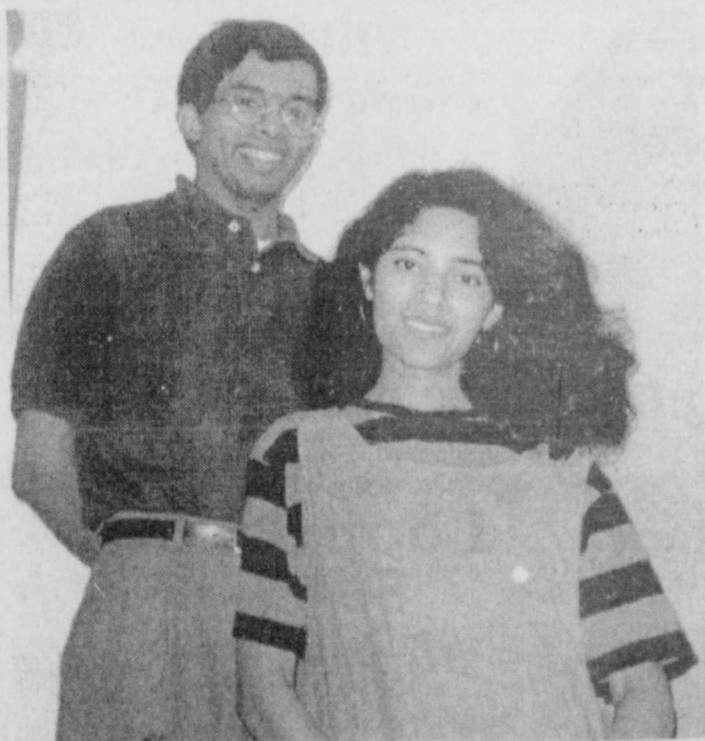

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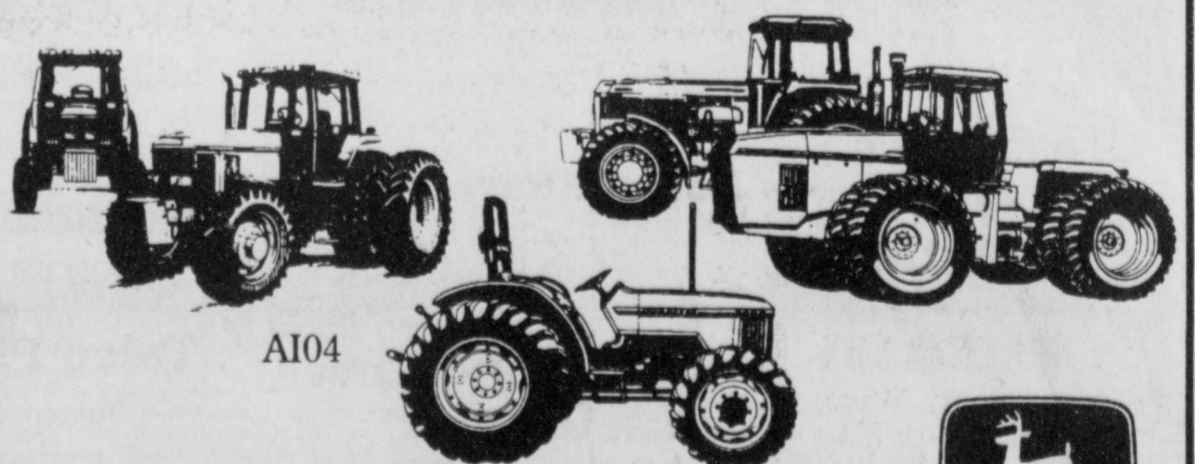


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Patriots Take Rebels, 28-16

Coach Rick Connot was pleased with his Prairilan Patriots following last Friday's 28-16 win over the Rivercrest Rebels. It was not easy, but his team had been consistent.

Evening their record to 4-4 on the season, the Patriots had to overcome a Rebel team which had been openly confident before game time, and translated that confidence to a crisp 61-yard scoring drive to open play.

Utilizing Juan Torres, Jay Hancock and Chris Waller in running back mix, the visitors never missed a beat in consuming over half the first quarter before the Pats ever touched the ball. Hancock got the touchdown off tackle, and Rodney Humphrey added the two-point conversion.

The Rebel defense seemed to be at the points of attack before the Patriot offense throughout the early going, and for the rest of the quarter Jody Ottinger, Torres and Humphrey held the Pats to a minus-4 yards total offense. Early in the second stanza, keying on a 33-yard sweep by freshman Quinn Sessums, the Pats moved 53 yards before Alvin Savage intercepted. But Mike Stewart, a whirling dervish this night, and Johnny White limited the three back tandem to only one yard, and the Pats were back at the Rebel 42.

Stephen Swaim got that in two plays up the gut of the Rebel defense. The first went for 11 yards, while the second found the burly Pat splitting the defense for a 300-yard score. Quarterback Zach Allen got the countering conversion for 8-8 with 2:28 before halftime.

White and Sessums again stuffed Hancock and Waller, and Hancock punted to the Pat 23. James Dudley got 23 more on a pitch sweep, bringing the clock to :50 before halftime. Allen then arched the ball to

Sessums who outfought a Reb for the ball, maintained balance, and showcased the acceptable breakaway speed he has infused into the Pat offense. The Pats suddenly had the lead, and Swaim drilled the PAT for a 15-8 halftime advantage.

And when Sessums zipped 26 yards on the second play of the last half, keying a march to the Reb 4, it looked as if the Pats would win going away. Rivercrest stiffened, and a Swaim field goal attempt fro 27 just missed left. The Rebs had dodged a big bullet, but were still in the shadow of their goal.

Halftime adjustments moved Humphrey into the offense, and it paid off handsomely. He got 28 on his first carry, and two plays later, he suddenly burst from the middle of the secondary and outsprinted Allen and Michael Murphy for 64 yards and the touchdown. The Rebs then worked the sweep to perfection for the 2-pointer which got them a 16-15 lead.

But that would be the last gasp for the Rebels.

Prairiland moved 60 yards, featuring Dudley and Swaim who scored from the four at 10:52.

After the entire middle of the Pat defense stopped the Rebs on fourth and a foot at the Reb 40, Dudley pooch-punted to the Rivercrest 9.

But Stewart stripped the Reb ball carrier, and the Pats jumped on the ball at the one. Allen sneaked that yard, and it was 28-16.

The score might well have been higher against his team had Kevin English not have had an exemplary evening on defense. Brent Beers and Tee Green also made plays of note.

For the Pats, except for a couple of breakdowns, the defensive unit played well. Stewart, Brandon Maroney and White were quite strong.

Offensively Sessums continued his exceptional freshman season, with 73 yards on six carries, plus the 54-yard touchdown reception for an average of 18.1 yards each time he touched the ball. Swaim was his consistent, heavy duty 6.1 per carry with 153 yards on 25 attempts.

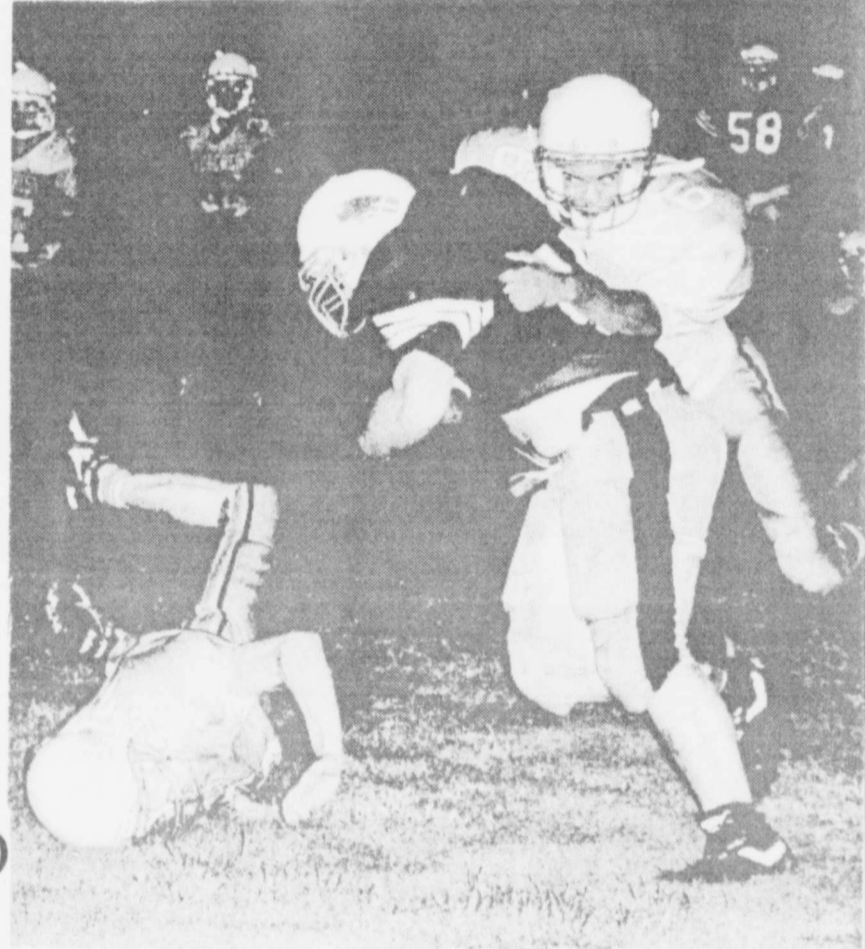

Check Chimney Before Cold Weather Arrives

With colder weather expected soon, homeowners should check out their chimneys before using them.

Wood-heating accounts for more fires, more deaths and greater property damage than any other type of heating fuel, the Consumer Product Safety Commission has reported.

Most wood heating fires involve ignition of creosote inside the chimney. Creosote is a black tar-like substance that builds up inside the chimney in normal use.

While most of these fires are contained within the chimney and cause no damage to the house, there's still much cause for concern since a potential hazard exists.

Homeowners who have a wood-

burning stove or fireplace should check the chimney for any damage that may have occurred in the past heating season. A local "chimney sweep" or dealer can help with this effort. Have any damage repaired.

A number of causes of home fires involving chimneys can be avoided. They include:

- *Improper chimney installation too close to wood framing.
- *Installation of thermal insulation too close to the chimney.
- *Improperly passing the stovepipe or chimney through a ceiling or wall, causing ignition of wood framing.
- *Structural damage to the chimney caused by the ignition of creosote.
