But the real show was out back on the pools. There the ducks and the great



During 1995 the department purchased 4 new joints of hose (we had 2 old joints that blew out during fire fighting operations), a ventilator fan to be used after a house fire has been contained (this fan can take smoke out of a house in a heart-beat, thus minimizing smoke damage), swift water and high water rescue equipment, as well as adding to our first aid and medical equipment compartment.

As we move in to 1996 our goals are to replace two worn out nozzles on the small grass truck and purchase a radio that can be set up at our station or moved out in the field and set up as a command post for whatever situation might arise.

Please come out, enjoy the fellowship and support your local fire department. Help us make our goals a reality so we can better serve everyone in a professional, organized and more efficient man-

About 1.5 million head of cattle were imported into the United States from Mexico in 1995. Converted to their meat equivalent, the 1.5 million head represented about 716 million more pounds of beef on supermarket shelves and wholesalers' freezers.

The Mexico imports amounted to about 2.8 percent of the total beef supply in the United States.






