I not only agree, but I will continue by saying that all that gobblygook could have been boiled down to one sentence..."the closing of the military base could affect the lives of 6,600 people". Period, that's it, forget input, output, factors, and inter-industry relationships.

I'm glad I didn't write the paragraph. I'd rather make my homey little errors, be a bit politically incorrect and have my readers grasp what I'm trying to tell them.

Deport Sewer testing to begin-smoke is harmless

Beginning on September 5, 1996, and through the month of September, employees from the City of Deport Water Department will be inspecting the Sanitary Sewer System of the city. An important part of their work will be the "Smoke Testing" of sewer lines to locate breaks and defects in the sewer system. The Smoke that you will seen coming from vent stacks on homes or from holes in the ground is non-toxic, harmless, has no odor and creates no fire hazard.

The Smoke should not enter your home unless you have defective plumbing or dry drain traps. If you have seldom-used drains, please pour in water to fill the trap. If the harmless smoke does enter your home, please contact a member of the smoke testing crew, or call the City Hall Office at 652-3875, so that the testing can be halted. Please Note: If Smoke can enter your home, the potential also exists for the entrance of dangerous sewer gases and you should contact a Licensed Plumber to investigate this situation.


The inspection of the Sewer System will involve the opening and entering of sewer manholes that are located in the streets and in backyard easements. Please be advised that city employees may need to enter backyards to gain access to these manholes, but homeowners do not need to be at home and the workers will not need to enter your house.

Workers will photograph areas that are emitting smoke, which is indicative of defects in the sewer system; these photographs, along with other documents will be comprise the records that will be utilized if repairs are made at a later date. The information gained from this sanitary sewer system inspection will be used to improve your sewer service and the city appreciates your cooperation in this important study.

The sanitary sewer system inspection program will be conducted throughout the month of September If you have questions or comments concerning this program, then please contact the water department at 652-3875.

This resulted in David Glover being selected by the magazine for one of their Outstanding overall performance awards.


That is right, baseball in August! While most of the young men are hitting the football field, a few area youths are playing in Fall baseball.




