Christmas Mail Urged To Be Early By Local PM

Postmaster Sam Rosser today joined Postmaster General E. T. Klassen in urging the residents of Haskell to post their domestic and foreign Christmas mail one to two weeks earlier than the Postal Service origally recommended, so that the energy shortage will not interfere with on-time deliveries.

"The urgency of the fuel energy crisis compels us to request a one-week advancement of suggested dates we gave for demestic mail and a two-week advancement for foreign mail," Postmaster Rosser said.

The new deadline for posting domestic first-class Christmas mail is December 8 rather than December 15, as previously announced. Domestic surface parcels, except those for Alaska and Hawaii, should be mailed by December 3, instead of December 10. To Alaska and Hawaii, mail by November 23 instead of November 30.

Airmail parcels and letters within the United States (except Alaska and Hawaii) should now be posted no later than December 15, rather than December 21. To Alaska and Hawaii, mail by December 13, rather than December 20

'The seriousness of the fuel shortage to the Postal Service is underlined," Postmaster Rosser said, "by the fact that in addition to the fuel consumed by commercial air carriers, we require approximately 350,000, 000 gallons of fuel to travel 2.25 billion miles delivering the 90 billion pieces of mail that flow through the system each year. Our requirement for the month of December alone is 45 million gallons."

Postmaster Rosser said that "public cooperation on meeting these new, advance mail early dates is needed to help us complete all Christmas deliveries."

New HM Training School Begins

The first Training School for prospective Herman Marcus sewing plant employees ended here last Friday with 35 finishing the 80-hour training.

Monday morning, another training school began, with 37 people enrolled for the course that will end on December 14. If all these finish their 80 hours of training, some 72 people will be trained to begin the new Herman-Marcus plant production that is scheduled to begin on Dec. 15.

Claude Lester, Production Specialist for the plant, and Amelia Perry, Plant Manager, toured the industrial site Tuesday morning and watched the lights being installed. "Things at the building site are still on schedule for a December 1st finish date," said Mrs. Perry, "and we are looking forward to having the plant in operation by December 15."

Each of the trainees in the first school worked on Herman Marcus dresses-the type that will be manufactured here. These dresses cannot be sold, and are always given to care homes, charities, etc., as these will be. The finished products are up to H-M specifications, and are beautiful garments.

"Although training schools will be in progress again, we do not plan to begin another one at the end of the one now in progress. These trainees will graduate Dec. 14 and taking the holidays into consideration, another training class will not start until sometime after the first of the year," said Mrs. The Dinner honoring Finneh

"I am pleased to participate in the dinner honoring my very able colleague Charles Finnell," Daniel said.


RED CROSS DRIVE
