Deport council hears of proposed rate increase from Lone Star Gas

The Deport City Council discussed change is November 29, 1996. purchasing a new computer system for the City Office Monday night. City Secretary Sharon Francis reported that the present system has reached capacity. The City Secretary and Council Person Nancy Gresham

were authorized to shop for a system. A letter from Lone Star Gas Company was reviewed by the council members. Attached to the letter was a statement of intent to change the City Gate Rate of Lone Star Gas Company that has been submitted to the Rail Road Commission of Texas. The Proposal Change will result in an annual increase of approximately 4.8

percent or \$24.2 million The customers affected are the 1.3 million residential and commercial customers served through the distribution systems of LSG-D in the state

The effective date of the proposed

No action was taken on the matter. The council also paid all bills, totalling \$7,351.60 for the month. Of the total \$5,608.90 was for repairs to pumps on the lift station at the sewer

The council agreed to endorse the pursuit of a grant from the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department to redo the walking track, install park benches and possibly a dock in the pool in Foster Park. A maximum grant of \$22,000 is available for the project if the application is approved.

A street light for First Street was approved by the council.

The Christmas Parade was set for December 2nd and was discussed. The council agreed to purchase a lot located on Grey Street from Hugh Jeffus, Sr. for \$1000.

Employees salaries were discussed in executive session.

If your paper has been late, please read this

If you have been receiving your paper late, please read this, it is important. With many people's subscriptions due for renewal during the December paper sale, now seems an appropriate time to have a word with subscribers

In July of this year the U.S. Postal Service "redid" second and third class mail. All of our newspapers are mailed second class (it's now called periodical class). There were new rules, some new routing and a price increase. Since that time we have been deluged with stories of papers that are arriving two to seven days later than they used to, or sometimes not arriving at all. This seems to be happening whenever our papers have to go outside the local post offices.

This is not our fault, we still put all our mail bags into the post offices on a Wednesday night so that they go out first thing Thursday morning, just like always. It is NOT your local post master or post office's fault either, they put the mail up when they receive it. Where the problem seems to be in is distribution

We have changed our labels, we have begun using bar coded labels, we have now done everything that the post office has suggested and many papers are still delayed.


Our local post masters have worked long and hard to help us. One is hand carrying bags to one location,

another has made a special trip to Greenville to try and find out why they might be delayed. I have personally spoken with numerous people within the postal system, as have the postmasters. I have even been told that if the bags are going through the North Texas Processing Center they are so backed up that they will automatically have a 24 hour delay! I have also been told that there are a lot of temps (temporary employees) on duty at the Greenville Distribution Center.

We have solved several problems, and many customers are now saying that they are getting their papers in a more timely fashion.

We are doing everything we can. So are the local postmasters. Our local postmasters at every location are great and have been tremendous. I want to assure our subscribers that we are will continue doing

any thing suggested by the post office to help speed delivery. However, we have no power over the distribution centers. We have mentioned to many people in the Post al Service that our business is being affected by this slow down. They promise things will get better. We hope so. In the meantime, we wanted you, our valued subscribers, to know what was happening.







From The Pastor's Heart



Fill The Spaces

Charles Spurgeon describes how to "fill the spaces" beyond question. Select a large box and place in it as many cannon balls as it will hold and it is, after a fashion, full; but it will hold more if smaller matters be found. Bring a quantity of marbles; very many of these may be packed in the spaces between the larger globs; the box is now full, but still only in a sense; it will contain more yet. There are spaces in abundance, into which you may shake a considerable quantity of small shot and now the chest is filled beyond all question; but yet there is room. You cannot put in another shot or marble, much less another ball; but you will find that several pounds of sand will slide down between the larger materials and even between the granules of sand; water will find a space. Where the little cannot enter, the less can make its way; and where the less is shut out, the least of all may find ample room.

Consider that we, in a spiritual sense are vessels. And that within our vessel se have room for faith, praise and thanksgiving. Even i the amount is very little there is room in the vessel for what you have to give. This is the meaning of Thanksgiving. God will except the smallest faith,

the smallest praise, the least of thanks and build on that amount giving. On the very first Thanksgiving those who gathered at table had plenty to give thanks for. They thanked each other for the companionship and friendship they had. They thanked the Natives who helped them survive. They thanked God for brining them to this land safely and rescuing them in this time of need.

Even when times are bad and things are not going well, we can always and everywhere give thanks to God for the small, little things in our lives that gives us joy. One time I met a homeless person on the streets and he was dancing and giving praise and thanksgiving to God. After a bit he slowed down enough for me to ask him, "What do you have to be so thankful for?" ""Life", he responded, "Life!". God pulled me through just one more night and if God will do it again tonight, I will sing praises to God again tomorrow.

Perhaps the things we have to be thankful for are not as large as a cannon ball, nor even as large as a grain of sand. I am sure that we can be thankful for the very least, our lives, our friends, our faith, our family. Possibly it is not easy to find something to be thankful for in ourselves, but it is not possible to find it elsewhere either.
