Cotton Classing

The territory served by US-DA's Agricultural Marketing Service Office is 85% through harvesting, according to Sidney Ferrell, In Charge. Haskell County, from which we receive about 70% of our total, is about 95% through.

During the week ending Friday, Dec. 21, 1973, there were 14,300 samples classed, bringing our season total to 83,900.

Statistics for the week are as follows: grade 31 accounted for 6% of the cotton classed; grade 41 was 39%; grade 51 was 5%; grade 32 was 20%; grade 42 was 24%; and grade 53 was 3%. Staple 30 accounted for 13%; staple 31 was 58%; staple 32 was 26%; and staple 33 and longer was 3%.

USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service Office classed 9,100 samples during the week ending Friday, Dec. 28, 1973, according to Sidney Ferrell, In Charge. The season total now stands at 93,000. Statistics for the week are as

folows: grade 31 accounted for 6 percent of the cotton classed; grade 41 was 37 percent; grade 51 was 3 percent; grade 32 was 21 percent; grade 42 was 27 percent; grade 52 was 3 percent; and full spots accounted for 3 percent. Staple 30 made up 9 percent; staple 31 was 61 percent; staple 32 was 28 percent; and staple 33 and longer was 2 percent.

Mike readings in the 3.5-4.9 ranges showed a slight increase with 87 percent while only 12 miked 50 or higher.

Cetton prices advanced from 300 to 500 points this week for staple 31 and longer cotton. This cotton is now bringing from 4400 to 5000 points above CCC Loan prices.

Schools Set New Classroom Time Schedules, Jan. 7

H. T. Wilkinson, Superintendent of Haskell schools, announced this week new class times, beginning with the January 7 classes. The time will be changed on January 6, when clocks will be set up an hour earlier, in the government's efforts to ease the energy cri-

In Haskell High, this new schedule will become effective. with the times being actual class times:

9:00-9:55; 10:00-10:55; 11:00-11:55; Lunch; 12:30-1:25; 1:30-2:25; 2:30-3:25; 3:30-4:25.

These times will become effective January 7, and may have to be adjusted, Wilkinson said, but as of next week, students will need to be at the school before the tardy bell rings at 8:55. The times, too, will be changed at a later date.

Herman Marcus, Inc. Announces New Employee Insurance Plan

Officials of Herman Marcus, Inc., announced this week a new comprehensive health insurance program for company employees, including those employed at the Haskell plant.

According to company comptroller Dennis Yarbrough, the new plan will cover any employee automatically after 90 days with the company. The new plan will become effective on January 1, 1974.

According to Yarbrough, the insurance will pay all hospital and major medical expenses. Also, at employee option, life insurance may be added or dependents may be added to the policy at employee expense.

New Course Is Offered At WTC

SNYDER-A limited number of students will be accepted for a general sociology course to be offered on Tuesday evenings at Western Texas College beginning Jan. 16.

The course is designed for busy people who want an enriching learning experience without outside research and assignments which would tax their time, Joe Reaves, instructor, said.

No previous courses in sociology are necessary to enroll for this course, Introduction to Sciology.

Classes will be from 7 to 8:15 p. m., with the hours from 6:30 to 7 p. m. and 8:15 to 9:30 p. m, set aside for listening to taped lectures and for private assistance as needed. The taped sessions may be heard at other times during the week if desired.

The course will consist of live lectures, guest speakers, and numerous audio-visual sessions covering such topics as culture, and society, ethnic and racial minorities, population and ecology, and deviant behavior and social control.

Persons interested in enrolling for the course may contact the college Director of Admissions. Students will be accepted until Jan. 15 unless the class is filled earlier.

Yarbrough estimated the new plan would cost Marcus about \$65,000 in 1974 for the company's 450 employees. He describes the new coverage as an up to date policy, the type that takes effect immediately.

The new insurance plan was formally announced by Richard Marcus, President of Herman Marcus, Inc., at an October meeting in Dallas.

The new plan is one of a number of benefits that the Dallas manufacturing firm has recently begun.

Mr. Joe Timo of Blue Cross and Blue Shield was in Haskell on Dec. 26, 1973, to install the plan, which will become effect tive for this plant on January

Another benefit of the company, according to Yarbrough, is a profit sharing setup for employees that have been with the organization for some time. He explained that the company contributed over \$10,000 this year to the profit sharing plan.

The plan operates on a percentage basis of a fund established for employees with more than five years service. At five years, an employee "owns" 20 percent of profits set back to his name. At the end of 13 years with the company, 100 percent of the fund belongs to the employee, according to Yarbrough.

Texans Can Order Licenses By Mail

AUSTIN—Owners of some 8.4 million motor vehicles in Texmail coming their way early in

Registration renewal applications will be put in the mail shortly after the holiday season W. C. Grissom Tuesday, by the Motor Vehicle Devision of the Texas Highway Depart-

> The same quick and easy method made possible by modern computer technology will be in effect this year as it has been in the last few years.

Vehicle owners can save time that used to be spent waiting in long lines at county tax offices throughout the state, by ordering the 1974 license plates

All that must be done is to send the entire three-part application by mail to the county tax assessor-collector in the owner's home county, enclosing the registration fee plus \$1 for each vehicle to cover handling and mailing.

There are three things to re-

1. Leave the three-part form intact. Don't separate the three

2. Mail it to the county tax office in your home county. (Mailing it to the Highway Department will only delay getting your 1974 license plates).

3. Be sure to include the registration fee, plus \$1 for each vehicle for postage and handl-

You may apply for license plates by mail after January 1. However, county tax offices won't mail plates until after February 1. Owners should allow at least 30 days from the time they apply for the license plates to be returned.

In-person registrations will begin at county tax offices and, in some counties, at substations on February 1. Even though the automated registration application procedures have speeded up the process, waiting lines will grow progressively longer as the April 1 deadline approaches.

Vets May Draw Additional Pay

Many veterans who are re-ceiving disability pension may be entitled to increased payments if they will report to the Veterans Administration the amounts which they spent for family medical care in 1973. These increased benefits may be retroactive for the encurrent calendar year, and are also available to widows of wartime veterans who died not as a result of military service, and to dependent parents of veterans whose deaths were caused by disabilities incurred during service. This announcement was made today by C. H. Herren, Veterans Service Officer for Haskell County.

Current laws provide for these people to receive VA benefits in accordance with the amount of their annual income. When personal funds must be spent to pay for any type of medical or dental care, such amounts may be used to reduce the countable income upon which VA payments are based. Deductible expenses may include doctor and hospital charges drugs and medicines, dental care, eye glasses, laboratory and x-ray charges, as well as any others involving health care for the claimant or any household family member. Also included are nursing home care expenses for the claimant or a dependent.

These medical expenses must be reported to the VA at the end of each calendar year. Persons who receive an annual income questionnaire from the VA may report their medical expenses on the card, which must be returned to the VA on or before January 15, 1974. These income reports are not mailed to children, or to vet-erans or other claimants who are 72 years of age or older and have been receiving VA benefits for two years or more with no appreciable income change. These claimants should gather all information concerning their medical expenses during 1973, and contact their local Veterans Service Officer for assistance in making the required report to the Veterans Administration. A one-time payment will be made



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

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
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
