Accident Injures Local Youngster

David Tidwell, 15-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Bobby Tidwell of Haskell, continues to improve at Hendricks Memorial Hospital in Abilene, from injuries received in an accident here last Friday.

At approximately 5:30 p. m. April 12, a 1967 Plymouth driven by Mrs. Slover Bledsoe was in collision with the Kawwasaki motorcycle driven by David.

Tidwell was traveling north on Highway 277 and Mrs. Bledsoe was traveling east on North 11th Street. The accident occured at the intersection, and Tidwell was taken by ambulance to the Haskell Memorial Hospital, with a broken leg, a broken arm, severe lacerations about the head, and possible internal injuries. He was transferred to Hendricks and was in the intensive care unit there until early this week.

Finnell's Expense Budget In Black Holliday - Rep. Charles Fin-

nell of Holliday, Democratic senatorial candidate, said this week that his legislative expense budget is again in the black-just as he said it would be last month when it momentarily dipped into the red.

Finnell said that addition of his April expense allowance put his House office fund back in the black-with a balance-by making up an overage caused primarily by expenses of mailing a constitutional questionnaire to constituents in his dis-

trict. "This whole thing has been blown all out of proportion, and I think the balance now in the fund proves this," Finnell said of efforts by his opposition to make a political issue out of the temporary fund overage. "I think the people of both my House district and the Senate district saw through the whole thing, just as they see through the opposition's efforts to create a controversy over the mobile telephone in my car," Finnell said.

"West Texas is a big land and I think the folks here appreciate a legislator who is available and keep in touch with them and their needs," Finnell said.

Finnell, who is campaigning in the district during a recess of the Constitutional Conventon, will be visiting supporters and friends in Sweetwater this week end and attending the festivities in Anson for Omar Burleson Day. Finnell's wife and his brother, Leslie, are joining him on the campaign trail and the three will visit in Plainview, Seymour and Big Spring during the week.

Located on the East side of the square, it is built with a sloping ramp up to the side door, to accommodate his wheel chair. His living quarters are at the back of the shop, thus the only time he has to leave

the store, is when he wants to. He is open, and eagerly awaiting the business he knows will come his way. Haskell has always had a shoe shop, until Allen's closed several months ago ... and in this agricultural and cattle growing county, people need boot, shoe and leather repairs often.

Purpose

"I picked Haskell for my hometown because of the enthusiasm shown me by its people," he told us, "and I don't think I'll ever regret my decision."


TURKEY income in Texas for 1973 grossed a record \$70,-500,000. Texas now ranks fifth ed and is in fourth place in gross income. Production in 1973 totaled 8,900,000 birds; Service Officient in the number of turkeys raisthis is 13 percent higher than Service Officer last year. The average price of turkeys in 1973 was 39.7 cents per pound; the total gross and price per pound is about double a year earlier.







More Fuel For Suppliers Now

Dallas - Fuel suppliers are now permitted to automatically the Internal Revenue Service increase petroleum product to will figure out your tax if your wholesale purchasers who have experienced "unusual growth" without requiring an application by the wholesale purchaser or validation by the Federal Energy Office, William E. Simon, FEO Administrator, has announced.

Under a rule change, which became effective with its publication in the March 18 Federal Register, suppliers may elect to make such an adjustment for the base period volumes for all the suppliers eligible wholesale purchasers.

"This change will eliminate some of the delay wholesale dealers have had in obtaining enough product to meet increasing needs," Simon said.

The fuels for which the adjustment is allowed are motor gasoline, propane, butane, middie distillates, aviation gasoline (except for civil aviation) and residual oil (except for allocatons to utilities).

"Unusual growth" is defined over 10 percent for wholesale purchasers of gasoline, and over five percent for wholesale purchasers of other products, during 1973.

Under previous rules, adjustment applications submitted by wholesale purchasers with unusual growth were considered individually, and those applications demonstrating growth of over 20 percent had to be validated by the FEO before action could be taken.

Of course, you should still keep a record of your individual dividend and interest receipts. Q. I received a short form 1040A in the mail. How can I tell if I should use this short form or the long form 1040? A. If you received a short form 1040A in the mail, it was sent to you based on the return you filed last year. But your situation may have changed and you may save money by filing Form 1040 instead. This is especially true if your itemized deductions are substantial, or if you are eligible for the retirement income credit. Just use the short formula set out in your Form 1040A instructions to help determine whether your tax

could be lower if you itemize deductions. Q. The person I paid to fill out my tax return has not signed it. Should I make sure that he does?


