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More than a half dozen DPS troopers, the game warden and the Lamar County Sheriff's Office joined in the chase that began near Pattonville and ended when Webb jumped from his vehicle, leaving the passengers and

fled into the woods. Trooper Reynolds also jumped from his vehicle and chased Webb down.

Webb was charged with reckless driving and evading arrest, in addition to citations for changing lanes when unsafe, driving on the wrong side of the road, failure to yield right of way, failure to pass on the right safely and disregarding an official traffic control device. In addition, he was driving with a suspended license.

He also faces a possible more serious charge of endangerment to a child because he had a three year old youngster in his vehicle during the chase. A passenger in the car was the parent of the youngster.

He also faces a possible return to the Texas Department of Justice system through violation of probation on an arson charge.

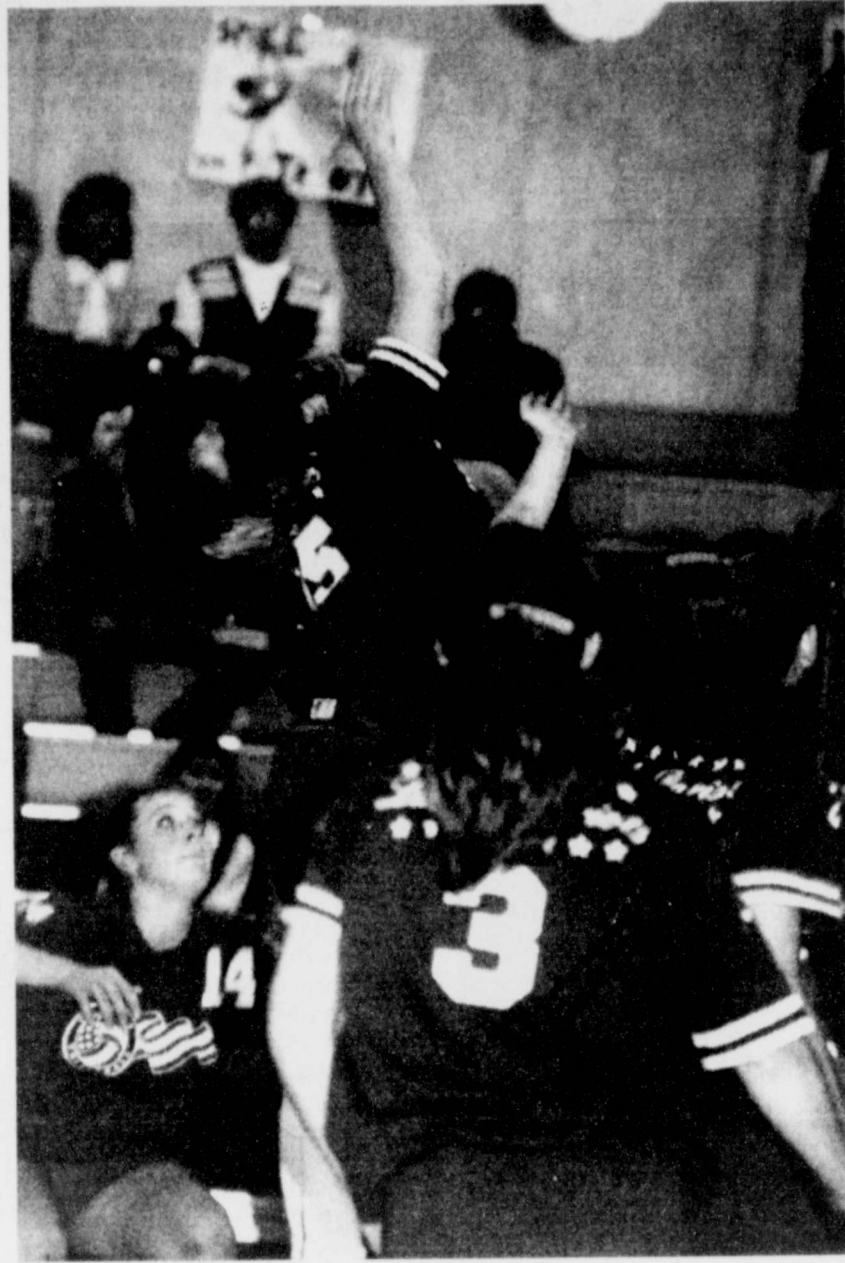
In game one, Prairiland was down 8-14 before catching up, but the momentum changed back to the Lady Panthers as they went on to claim the 14-16 win.

New federal program funded for 1998

There is now help as close as Paris Junior College for people who aspire to attend college but need some additional guidance and support to accomplish the goal.

Student Support Services is a new federal program recently funded for PJC and is designed to help people from families with incomes under \$24,000 (where neither parent graduated from college) to stay in college until they earn their baccalaureate degree.

This is a national program with an objective to increase retention of students; to help those people who need special support to achieve

success. Director of the new program is Deborah White.

Student Support Services, whose offices are in the PJC Student Center, is a part of the Paris Junior College TRIO Program that also includes the Educational Opportunity Center, Talent Search, and Upward Bound. A federal grant of \$180,000 was awarded PJC to start up the new TRIO project.

Participants of the program, which include disabled college students, receive tutoring, counseling and remedial instruction. Paris Junior College is one of 707 college and universities nationwide that is offering this service to students.

Alan Hubbard and John Shasteen, the two advisors in the program, will help clients develop and carry out their educational plans, help them get involved in campus and community activities. Student Support Services will work with students finishing high school as well as non-traditional, or older students. Students will be taken in the spring of 1998 at regular registration time.

In addition to advisors, the program will have two professional tutors on staff, and will utilize student tutors. Mike Cook, assistant baseball coach and dorm supervisor, will serve as one of the professional tutors.


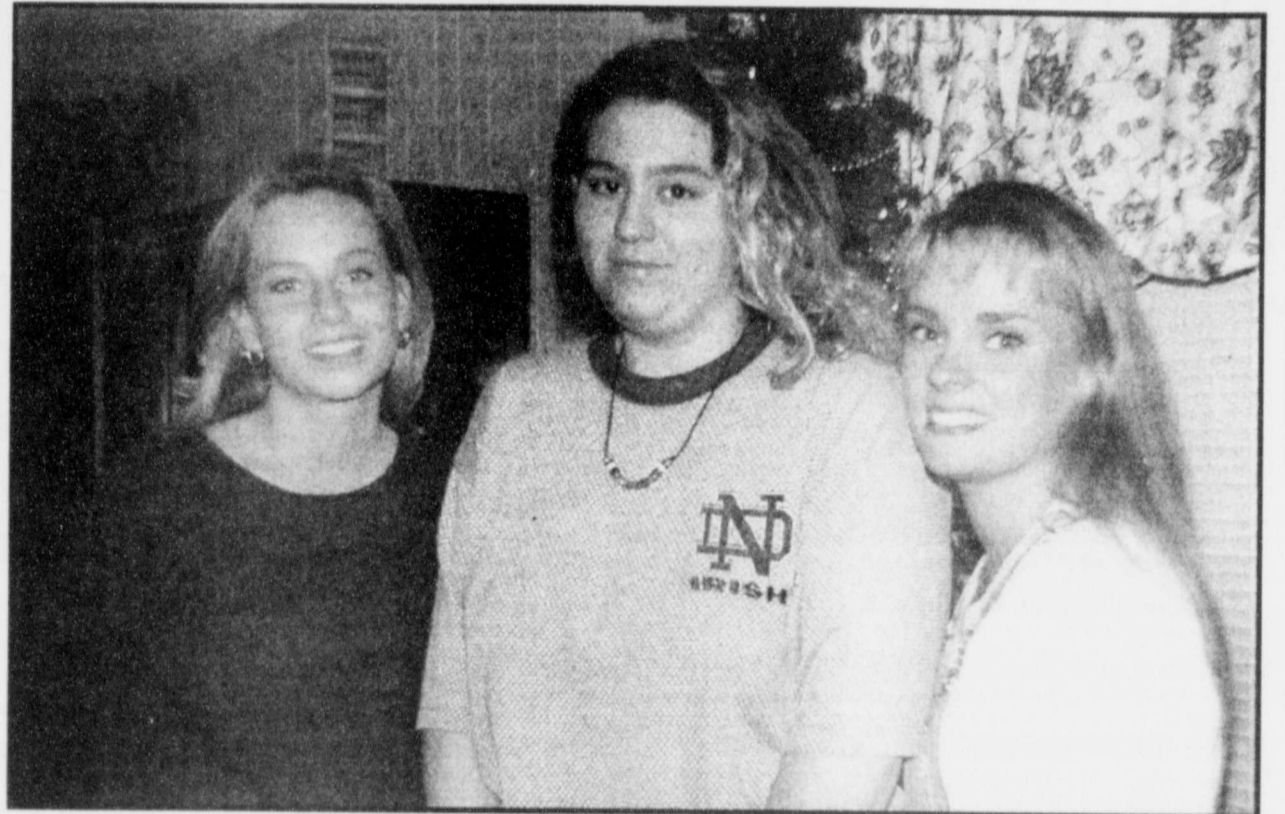
