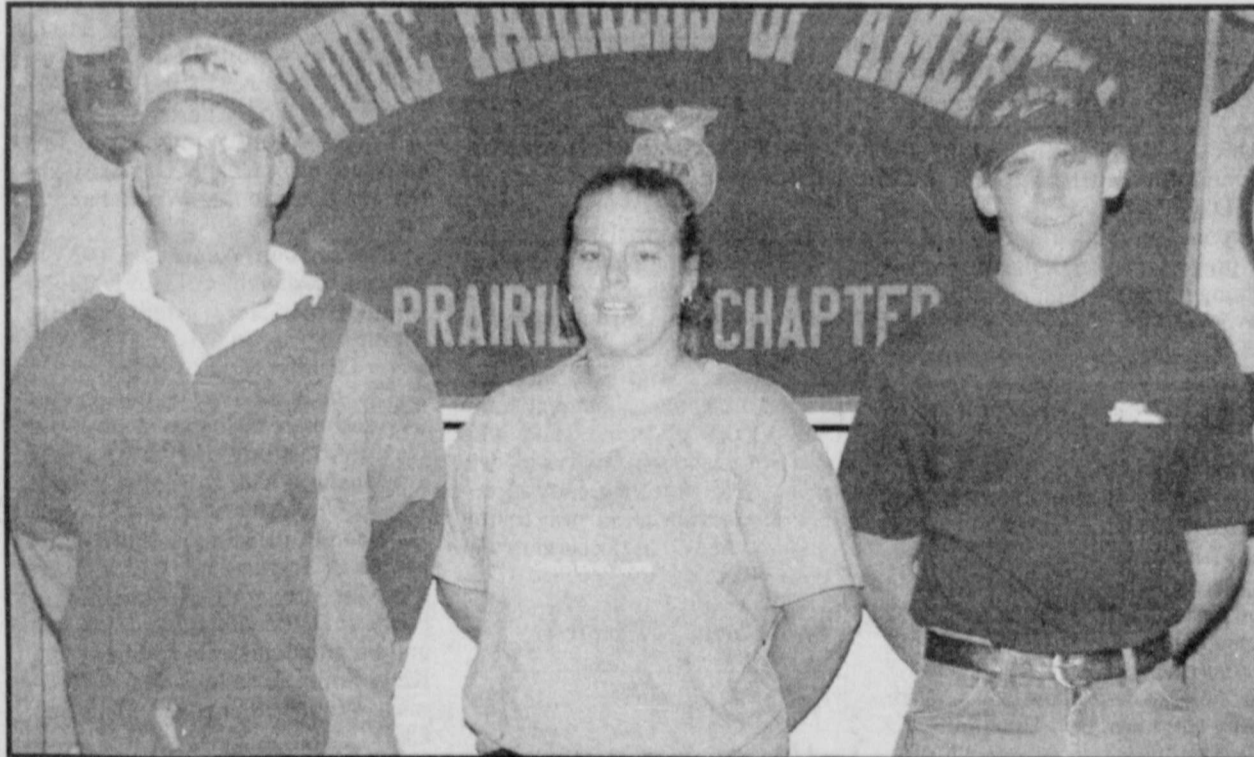
First, second and third place ribbons and cash awards will be given in Floats, Pickups, Car and Miscellaneous categories.

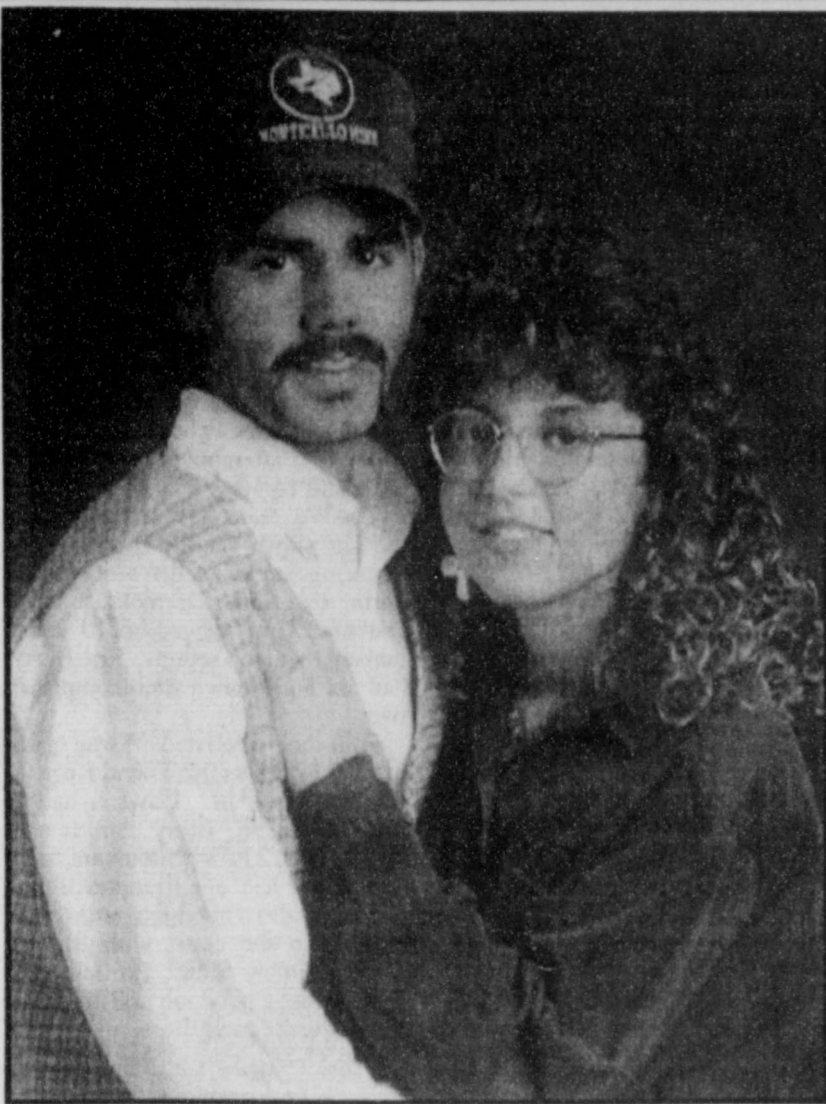

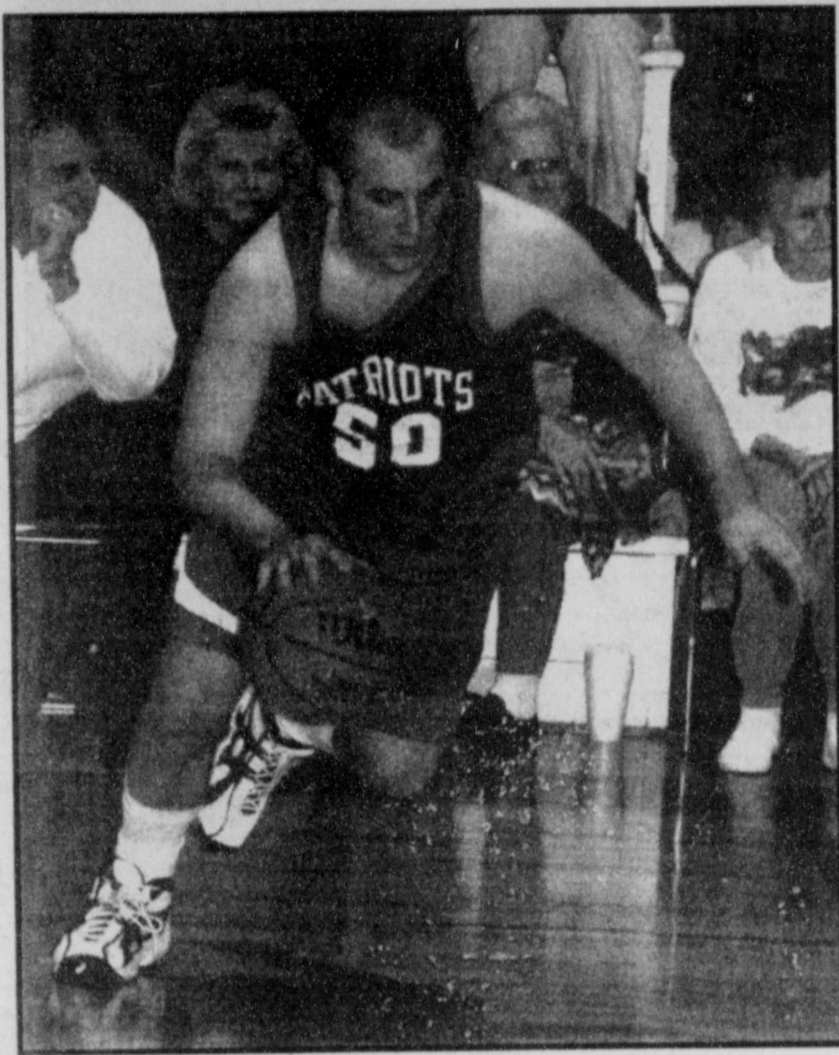

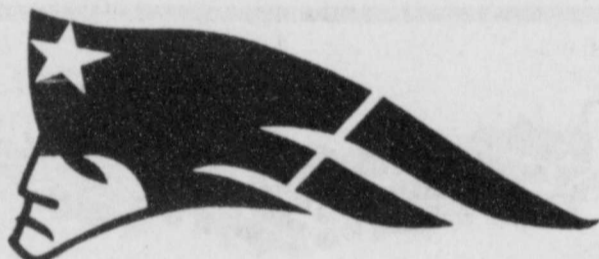
Avery tops ladies in both A/B games

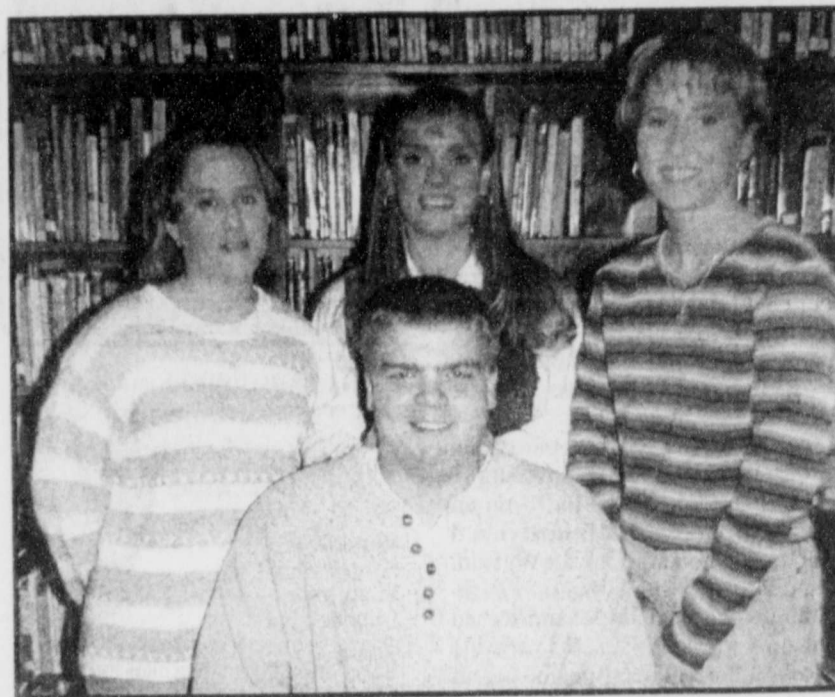

Hay used to bolster Galveston sand dunes

COLLEGE STATION - First, take 1,000 bales of hay and line them up along a one-mile stretch of beach. Cover the bales with two truckloads of sand. Then, add 45,000 plants to help hold the sand in place. A sprinkler system and fencing may also be added.

That's the recipe researchers will follow as they rebuild a one-mile stretch of Galveston Island sand dunes in an experiment that may save millions of dollars of beachfront property from being washed out to sea.

Texas A&M University at Galveston marine biologist Jim Webb hopes to stem the tide and learn how to prevent beach erosion by rebuilding sand dunes along the one-mile stretch.

"The beach and the dunes form a natural barrier to erosion and provide a source of sand to the beach," he said. "The dunes protect the land and houses behind the beach by blocking the wave action."

In Texas, sand dunes often mark the boundary between private property and public beaches. When the waves wash away so much land that a house encroaches on the beach, Webb said, the General Land Office forces the homeowner to demolish the house so it won't interfere with beach access.

"We've got houses that are literally falling into the Gulf," Webb said. "Water has cut underneath some of the foundations of the houses. We're trying to restore the dunes, renourish the beach and get some protection in front."

TNMP looks to support community efforts by matching customer donated dollars

Texas-New Mexico Power Company is looking for opportunities to match up to \$100,000 for worthy causes in the communities it serves. By matching funds donated by customers both directly and through its Customer Connection program, TNMP is willing to fund up to \$5,000 per project for qualifying community-based initiatives.

Once requests are evaluated the company will help raise funds and procure the company matching dollars.

TNMP's Customer Connection program matches customer and employee contributions two ways. Money that customers voluntarily contribute to the program when they pay their bills is pooled together by geographic region and matched dollar for dollar. Customer Advisory Groups then help select which of the customer-nominated projects receive

the funding each year.

The second type of matching operates more like a challenge grant. When a project nominated by an employee or customer is approved for the type of funding, community groups are responsible for raising half of the funding up to \$5,000. TNMP then will match the money the group raises.

To date, TNMP has contributed \$82,950 to communities in Texas and New Mexico this year. Paired with the money raised, these dollars have helped buy items from birthing tables for hospitals to playground equipment for children, and have built fences, bleachers and volleyball courts. Drug education programs, libraries and historical societies also have benefited from the matching program. Customer Connection funding allows TNMP to put in place projects that otherwise might be impossible. By the end of December
