## Rehab Barrel Race, Roping Set Oct. 28

A girls Harrel Race benefit is scheduled for the James Powell Arena Sunday afternoon, October 28, with proceeds to go to the Abilene Rehabilitation Center. Girls of any age may compete, and barrel racers from a 200 mile area are expected. The benefit is sponsored by Haskell Livestock Auction, owned by James Powell and Pete Burkhalter.

All ticket sales, concession stand sales, raffle money and donations from merchants and individuals, will go directly to the Rehab Center.

Each girl who enters will pay a \$2.00 donation to the Rehab Center, or any amount above \$2.00 they wish to donate. This money can come from her outside donations, or her own money. The barrel racer who turns in the highest donation above the \$2.00 will be awarded a \$50.00 pair of Tony Lama or Justin boots donated by Abilene Western World.

Cowgirls will pay a \$15.00 entry fee for the open barrel Race. The 10 girls having the fastest times will run again for a Luskey saddle. Second place winner will receive a \$50.00 gift certificate from Mackey's Western Store in Abilene.

A two-run Novice horse barrel race will see the winner given a saddle blanket donated by Abilene Vet Supply. This is for any age rider, but the horse must not have won \$150 by any and all riders. Entry fee is \$10.00. All money will be paid back in all barrel races. Electric eye timing will separate the winners by one hundredth of a second.

A two-calf jackpot roping will also be held, with the entry fee set at \$12.

A grandstand is at the arena for spectators and a concession stand will be available. Every effort has been made to make this an event you will want to attend, and support. So, if you haven't donated yet, or want

"We are very pleased with the reception we have received

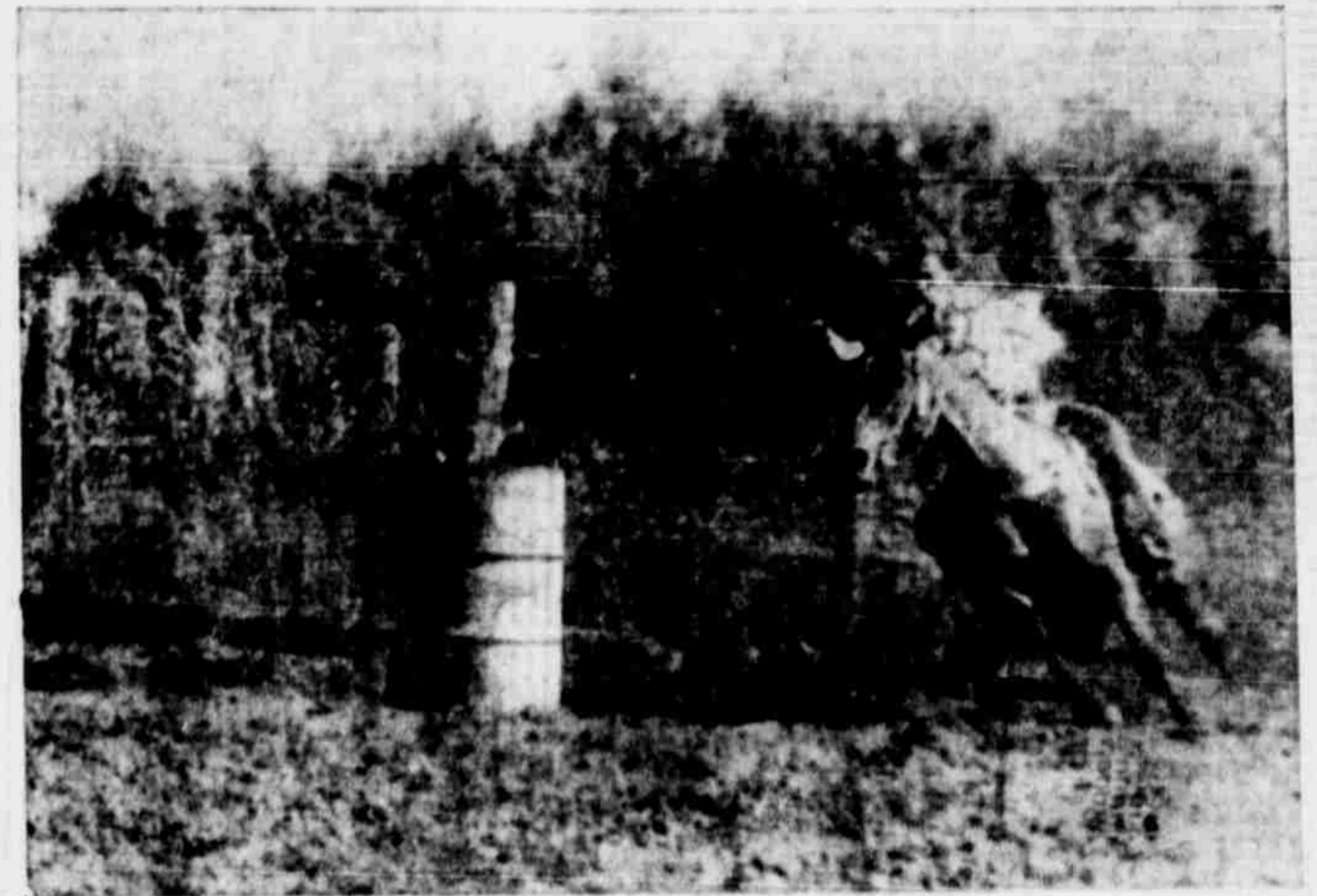

More interviews and testing are scheduled, tentatively, for Tuesday, Nov. 13 here, with the next classes expected to begin on November 19.

Completion date for the plant building is December 1, with tentative opening date of the plant set for December 15.

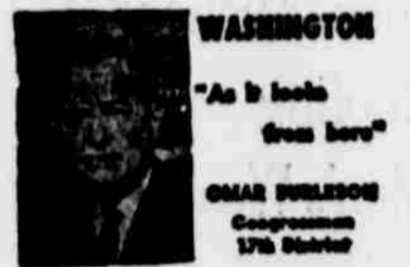
Haskell County Commissioners Court met in regular session Oct. 8, with all members present to discuss many financial matters of the county.

WASHINGTON, D. C. — On the one hand the Food and Drug Administration intends to prohibit the use of certain vitamins and food supplements. On the other the National Institutes of Health finds a low level of several vitamins in elderly people who need supplements furnished by organic foods.

Statistics show that there are at least 20 million Americans over the age of 65. Scientists and specialists report that vast numbers of these are suffering from mental and physical sickness that simple nutritional solutions might cure.

Thousands of the nation's elderly are poor, sick and confused. A study conducted at Duke

University in North Carolina found that half or more of all mentally confused patients over 65 had "borderline" or worse nutritional problems. It was concluded that if they ate better, with food supplements, if necessary, their health would be normal for that age.

The findings show that the nutritional problem exists in the disadvantaged as well as the advantaged and that vitamin supplements may be the reasonable means of overcoming the deficiencies common to older people.

Dr. Alan Whanger of Duke University's Medical Center, a

practicing psychiatrist, said he "almost routinely" treats patients with vitamin-mineral supplements. Up to 40 percent of his patients show deficiency and many respond to nutritional therapy.

The doctor admits he is unable to submit positive proof but believes that "many of our aged need vitamin supplements and is worried that by reason of the Food and Drug Administration's new regulations, vitamins will get more expensive and less available for those who need them most."

Specialists say that the life-style of many of the nation's

elderly lead to poor food balance.

They often live alone and as we all know it is not particularly fun to eat alone—it's just easier to do what seems necessary—cheese and crackers—sandwiches—a boiled egg—whatever—and let it go at that.

Dr. Leonard Iubby of New York Medical College pointed out to the Council on Aging that a simple fact, like the loss of teeth, discourages the eating of meat, even when it could be easily afforded.

He said this gradual degeneration in vitamin-mineral intake could lead to a "mid de-

gree of confusion" or worse, mental problems usually associated with senility.

"In many cases," the doctor said, "simply giving these older people a proper diet can often correct their physical and mental problem."

In the Duke University study of 80 chronically ill elderly patients over a two year period, 95 percent showed signs of significant improvement after a year's treatment of proper diet with supplements found needed.

Doctors would certainly rather keep their patients well than have to treat them after they are sick. Obviously, it is not possible for them to prescribe over the eating habits of everybody or to know their patients' mineral deficiencies at all times. It's true that some may be needlessly taking vitamins but to deny those organic foods and supplements which are not toxic and which can be thrown off if not needed is not justified by the evidence now available. This, of course, is applicable to both young and old but many elderly need to help in the situation in which so many find themselves.

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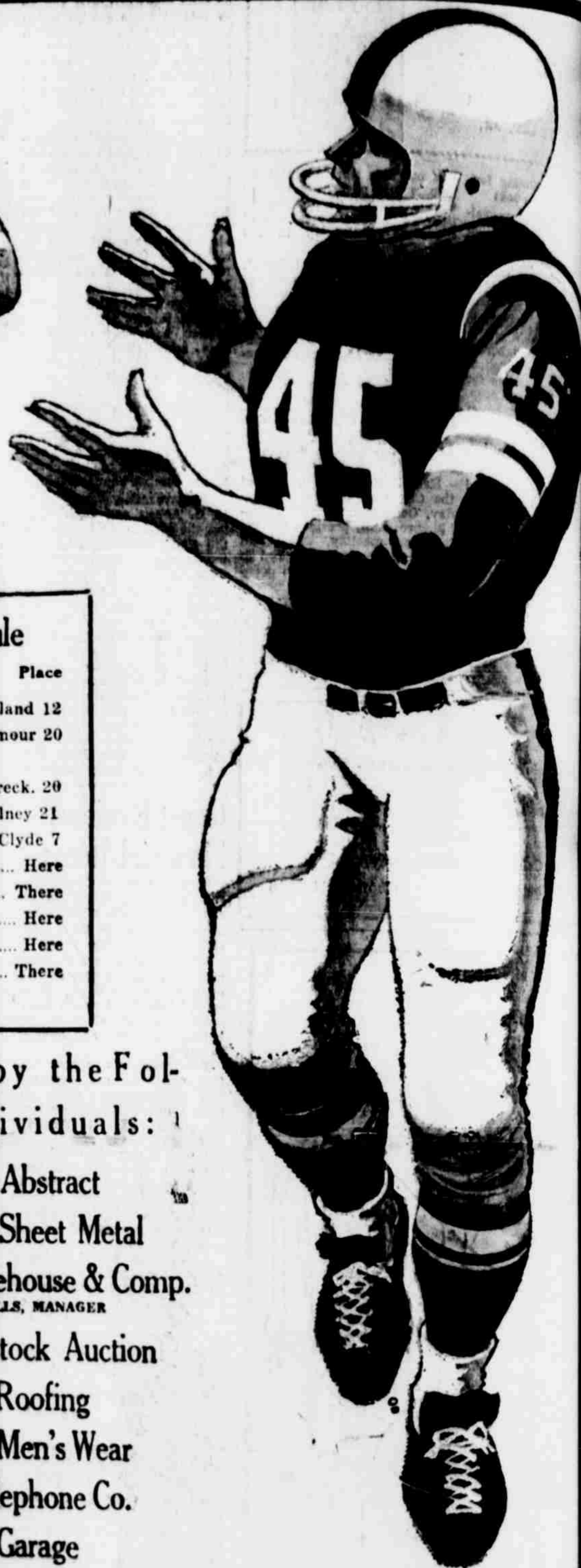
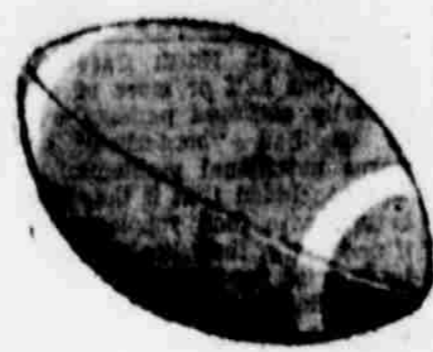

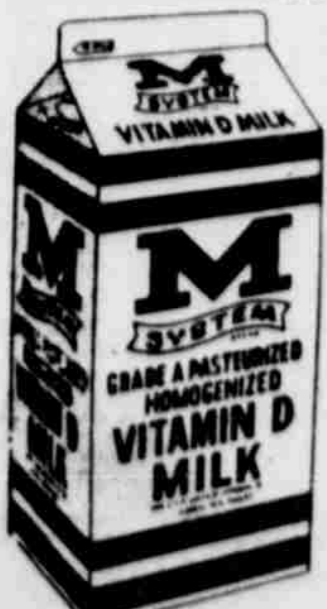
