

brunch on Valentine's Day. Scones are like biscuits....but added with a little butter or your favorite jelly or marmalade, can be an extra special "treat" for you and yours!

Scones are a combination of flour, fat, baking powder, salt and milk. The difference comes from the fat used....scones are made with butter, instead of vegetable shortening with the addition of eggs and sugar. Dried fruit, chocolate, spices and sugary glazes add that extra little zing.

Always use all-purpose flour for best results. If using wheat flour add 2 tablespoons additional flour to each cup used.

Use very cold butter. Cut into dry ingredients until the mixture forms lumps the size of large peas.

Handle dough as little as possible for tender scones. Gently roll or pat dough into a large circle before cut-

Like biscuits, scones tastes best right out of the oven piping hot. They also freeze well. Warm thawed scones in a 400 degree oven for 5-7 minutes.





# Matter of Fact

Texas Agriculture Commissioner

Even with satellites, radar and computers, Mother Nature still slips things by us - like El Niño. Some scientists who spend their careers trackng this type of elusive weather system admit they missed the early signs of El Niño. This has the climate research community taking a hard look at the models it uses to predict weather because some of the most reliable totally missed the event.

If there's indication an El Niño is on the way, then climatologists have the challenging task of predicting how it will affect global weather patterns This is particularly difficult because scientists don't completely understand all the complex interactions between the ocean and the atmosphere that create climate in an El Niño year. To op it off, each year brings different interactions so each El Niño doesn't behave like the one before.

Scientists are confident that with better weather pattern observation and mproving technology, their ability to predict the development and outcome of an El Niño will continue to improve. And because history - and weather repeats itself, scientists will have a chance to prove that. An El Niño occurs about every seven years.

Of course even with better technology, folks in agriculture know it's best to remember the words of one very humble climatologist who admitted, 'there are limits to prediction no matter now smart we are.'
