

Wade White releases 4th CD with real country roots

Local talent Wade White has just released his fourth album, "Hangin' Around" which truly goes back to Country's true roots. His songs will have you singing along with either

The album showcases his songwriting talents with "Hangin' Around", Songs on the Radio", "One from an Orphan's Home" and "Long & Lonely Week", as well as songs from Nashville songwriters Byron Hill, Tony Hiller, Sanger Shafer, David Anthony and Benny Arthur. It closes with a gospel tune, "He Loved His Us To Death". He teamed up with Ben Hall in Nashville for the record-

ing of the new offering. Wade began to sing at an early age, but at Rivercrest High School, where he joined the music class, and won a state-wide talent contest, he really began to develop his talents. After school he continued to enter competitions, including the Texas vs-Oklahoma "Showdown In The Desert" at Las Vegas. \$197.2 million rebates sent to cities

\$197.2 million in monthly sales tax payments were recently sent to 1,105 Texas cities and 119 counties, a 2013 percent incrase compared to the \$163.8 million paid in January 1999

January's sales tax rebates include local sale staxes collected by monthly tax filers in November and reported to the Comptroller in December.

City rebates were up 20.5% and county rebates were up 18.7% compared to last year.






