I think we have a problem. We're all getting old. But I don't know how to solve it because there are other problems that come from getting younger employees! You see, all of us here at Thunder Prairie are about the same age. And that age is an age when we begin to have more brain cells die than are replaced. We tend to forget things we used to always remember. We have to make notes where before we just committed things to memory. We throw things away and then have to go back and dig in the trash.

One of us will turn to the other and exclaim, "don't you remember when so and so talked to us that day and said to do such and such". The other then looks blankly back and denies every having seen "so and so". Then, four or five hours later someone will say "Ohhhhh yeah, I vaguely remember. I made a note of it here somewhere. " Then we begin looking for the note, which we have trouble finding.

In our 40s we never had any of these things happen to us.

But, we have two young people working for us. They are good workers...but easily distractible. Their minds are on dates, parties, cruising around town, ball games, anything that qualifies as fun.

Also they don't know much about all five towns. That means they don't know automatically that (for an example) Red River Genealogy goes in all five while other things do NOT go automatically in all five.

So the very young don't make the perfect employee either.

Then, I began recalling what it was like when we were all here and in our 30s. We were pretty distractible too. In our 30s there were gatherings, children, houses build, many things that kept us from being "perfect" at our jobs.

That leaves our 40s. In our 40s, (yes, some of us are still there, but barely) things all came together. We were dedicated, energetic, never forgetful.

It didn't last long. Now those middle-aged-forgetful-low-energy days stretch out in front of

In other words, there is about an 8 year window for perfection!

It looks as if we should have only people in their early 40s working here. But then, they would make ME look old and stupid!

Oh well, I am told by older people that things won't be getting much better. It's taken a little while to learn, but now we make NOTES. If we can remember where we put them.


