When that semi tractor/trailer rig backed up to the back of the civic center and latched trunks came rolling down the ramp it was mind boggling. Everything had to be unlatched, unloaded, and set up. The road crew scrambled around up in the rafters with a skill that was heart-stopping.

Everything had to be put exactly in place, hooked up with efficiency and speed.

As volunteers we simply tried our best to do what we were told and lend what help we could as the road crew created a sound and light system out of what seemed to us to be a hopeless maze of wires, cables and speak-

They worked really hard, and they tested the sound system for hours.

That night's performances had the best sound I have heard in that civic center.

After the last performance we all had to pitch in and repack everything, and roll it back up the ramp so that the truck could head for Oklahoma City. Every trunk had to go back in a certain

order so that when they left things were as they were when they had arrived, everything in it's place for easy unloading at the next stop.

While we were folding up hundreds of chairs many of us were talking about the huge amount of work that goes into something like this.

"You know", someone commented" there's an awful lot of work that goes into an awful lot os things we just take for granted, isn't there?'

Those are very true words. Give a thought to all the massive efforts that go on behind the scenes of so many things. From making movies to mowing the mail, there are hundreds upon thousands of hands that lend their effort along the way. The mail man we see or the movie we watch is backed up by all those efforts!Think about it.

As for me, it was fascinating. We worked until the early morning hours, and as well as learning more about sound and light systems I learned something else. I don't envy performer's road crews...and I don't want to be a roadie! It was fun while it lasted but I'd hate to do it day after day, h time in a new town.



Petition asks that section of proposed animal ordinance be removed or amended

A petition is being circulated in Deport concerning the proposed animal control ordinance for the city of Deport.

The petition reads: "We, the undersigned are NOT against animal control. We recognize the need for ordinances to allow for the control of dog packs or feral cats. We know the need for rabies vaccination. However, the proposed ordinance contains a section 11 which calls for households or individuals to be limited to only three cats or three dogs. We feel this is unfair. What is important is the quality of care provided to animals, NOT limiting the number of pets people can have. One dog or cat can be a big problem if it is not vaccinated, and if it's owner is irresponsible. Even six dogs or cats, given the kind of care many pet owners provide, can be less of a problem than one wild or uncared for pet. Many people take in strays, neuter them, vaccinate them and give them proper care. If these people are forbidden to do this worth service the end result will actually be more strays to be killed! Please, remove or change section eleven of the proposed ordinance.

land High School Seniors. A \$1000 donation from Duane Allen and his wife was made to the



Court ruling prevents Cap Rock-Lamar deal

A state district court in Midland yesterday issued a judgment that prevents the pending combination between Cap Rock Electric Cooperative and Lamar County Electric Cooperative.

The ruling issued from the 238th District Court in the case of Rayburn Electric Cooperative vs. Cap Rock Electric Cooperative and Lamar County Electric Cooperative, No. CV42814. The court's ruling is based on its finding that the proposed combination is contrary to prior contractual commitments made by Cap Rock to Rayburn, a cooperative based in Rockwall.

Those prior commitments are contained in a 1996 settlement agreement between Cap Rock Hunt-Collin Electric Cooperative and Rayburn. In that agreement, the court concluded, Cap Rock gave up any future claim to participation in Rayburn and any

future claim to power provided by Rayburn. That power includes inexpensive federally-marked hydropower from Denison Dam. The court then found that the terms

of the propsoed Cap Rock-Lamar transaction, as set forth in their 1999 Agreement to Combine, were contrary to Cap Rock's prior commitments to Rayburn because "the effect of the Agreement to Combine would make Cap Rock a participating member of Rayburn, entitling Cap Rock to voting rights as a participant cooperative and the right of electrical power acquisition from Rayburn.

In orders issued in December 1999 and January 2000, the court had temporarily enjoined the Cap Rock-Lamar transaction pending resolution of various contractual issues. The court's decision now prevents that transaction from occurring.

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

Charles Nichols answers call by using building skills

By Nanalee Nichols Charles Nichols "retired' from farming some years ago. His retirement has taken a shape that few people would think of as restful.

Charles helps to build Baptist Churches.

He does not do this in conjunction with any organized group, although he has occasionally worked with the Baptist Men's Builders

But, mostly, Charles hears of a need and goes to help meet that need, bearing all expenses himself.

He has recently returned from working on an expansion project at the University Baptist Church in Anchorage Alaska

He worked on the church last September and again this past March.

"I didn't like Anchorage as much as I have some other places." Charles smiles. "It was really cold and snowy, with a hard freeze every night, but just enough of a warm up during the day to melt the snow into miserable slush.

He slept in the church basement most of the time, or occasionally with a couple who lived nearby.

The days were long and hard, averaging ten to twelve hours daily spent, but still, Charles feels like it was a great experience.

Food in the grocery store he found to be very expensive, but eating out 't too much higher than it is

Charles started his own, personal program to help churches that were poor and/or had small congratulations a number of years ago when he was working for a man in Elkpoint, South Dakota. The man's family was working on the restoration of a church the congregation had just purchased, and Charles began helping. In fact, his friend's son in law and daughter are members of the Anchorage church Charles has been working on lately, which is how he found out

that the facility needed an expansion

He says that the worst job he ever took on was at Elkpoint, when they had a wall removed and it came a

The basement was filled with mud. It took us three days of hauling it out of there in five gallon buckets to get it cleaned out again.

He has helped with a number of churches in the South Dakota area.

Charles' wife, Cindy, goes with him sometimes. She went to Alaska with him in September. Sometimes she helps the women of the church cook,

The church members furnish most of the tools for these projects, and of

course the building materials. "I've learned a lot about carpentry since I began doing this" he says, "I do finish work, frame in windows and doors, pretty much whatever needs doing"

One of the first things that happened when he flew into Anchorage this last month was an earthquake.

"I was really tired. I slept right through it, even though it was a 4.7!". He enjoyed casseroles made from moose meat.


Up in Alaska they go on moose hunts like we go deer hunting here" he

When asked why he spends his hard earned money on working churches all over the nation he replies

This is something I just felt called to do. I think it is something the Lord wanted me to do"



Ags making lettuce better looking, better for you

COLLEGE STATION - Texas A&M University scientists have a head of lettuce that is better looking and better for you.

Molecular Breeding: New Strategies in Plant Improvement reports that Texas A&M University bioloists Ashok Jain and Craig Nessler have successfully engineered plants that produce more vitamin C. Their findings could help usher in a new era of more nutritious foods.

"I can see this vitamin C engineering being used to help people supplement their diet to keep them healthy," Nessler said.

Jain and Nessler transferred a gene that produces vitamin C in animals into tobacco and lettuce plants. Plants that received the gene produced up to seven times more of the vitamin than the plants that did not.

Nessler said he chose lettuce for the experiment because vitamin C can prevent the leaves from browning as quickly. Lettuce that stays fresh longer could ultimately decrease the use of preservatives known as bisulfites, which cause severe allergic reactions in some people. Tobacco was chosen because it is a widely used and wellunderstood organism for genetic studies, he said.

Nessler's work with lettuce may be the tip of the iceberg. The ts of his experiment are likely to be similar for other plants such as tomatoes or rice, he said.
