Second annual Sales Tax Holiday set for Aug. 4-6

Texas Comptroller, Carole Keeton Rylander announced this week that Texas families will have an opportunity to stretch their clothing budgets during the second annual Sales Tax Holiday, August 4 through August 6.

The timing of the Sales Tax Holiday is intended to help parents outfit their children for the new school year. However, the tax break is not limited to children's school clothes.

Clothing and footwear used primarily for athletics or protective wear, such as golf cleats or football pads, are not tax exempt.

baseball caps and jogging suits are eligible for the tax exemption.

Not included in the Sales Tax Holiday are accessories, such as jewelry and watches and items that are carried rather than worn, including handbags, briefcases, wallets and backpacks.

There has been one change for the better this year. Customers who put clothes and shoes costing less than \$100 on layaway during the Sales Tax Holiday weekend will be permitted to take those items out of layaway at a later date without paying sales tax.

"In the future, I think backpacks should be tax exempt, because kiddos need them for school," said Rylander. She also stated that she would like to see the Sales Tax Holiday include fabric, buttons, zippers and other items people use to sew clothes and to see

the Sales Tax Holiday last for a couple of weeks rather than just three days. But any change must wait until the Legislature meets next year.

Last year, Texans spent more than \$400 million on tax-exempt clothes and shoes during the three day Sales Tax Holiday, saving more than 432 million in sales tax.

The Sales Tax Holiday applies to all state and local sales taxes. Local communities were allowed to opt out of the event this year, if they notified the Comptroller by March 31.

Blood Usage in East Texas up 15 percent

The demand for blood in East Texas has increased by 15% during the first six months of the new millennium. However, blood collection is up by only 10%. Local hospitals in Quitman, Palestine, Jacksonville and Athens are experiencing dramatic increases in the usage of blood and blood components.

Director of Donor and Community Services Renay Moore said this is part is due to the increase in the number of critical automobile accidents and cancer treatments.

"The five percent gap between these figures can mean life or death for a patient that requires blood in order to stay alive," he said "In an effort to respond to this increase in

demand, Stewart Regional Blood Center is asking everyone who can donate to come by one of our six donor centers or to a blood drive as often as once every eight weeks".

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

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NOTICE OF APPLICATION OF TEXAS-NEW MEXICO POWER COMPANY FOR THE RECONCILIATION OF FUEL COSTS

TEXAS-NEW MEXICO POWER COMPANY ("TNMP") hereby publishes notice that it filed on June 30, 2000, with the Public Utility Commission of Texas ("Commission") an APPLICATION FOR THE RECONCILIATION OF FUEL COSTS ("Application") pursuant to the provisions of 36.103 of the Texas Utilities Code and P.U.C. SUBST. R. 25.235(b)(1)(B). In its Application, TNMP seeks to reconcile its Texas jurisdictional under-recovery fuel costs and fuel revenues of approximately \$21,144,132 during the period of January 1, 1997 through December 31, 1999 ("reconciliation period"). The purpose of this fuel reconciliation proceeding is for the Commission to review TNMP's eligible fuel costs incurred during the reconciliation period to determine whether they were reasonable and necessary to serve TNMP's customers under the Texas Utilities Code and Commission rules, TNMP may not earn a profit on these expenses and may only pass them through to its customers, pending reconciliation of such costs in a fuel reconciliation proceeding.

TNMP's Application affects only the recovery of the fuel portion of the rates charged by TNMP for electricity in Texas and has no effect on TNMP's non-fuel base rates. All of TNMP's Texas retail customers to which fixed fuel factors apply are affected by TNMP's Application.

During the reconciliation period, TNMP collected fuel revenues through its approved fixed fuel factors. These fixed fuel factors under-recovered eligible fuel expense during the reconciliation period in the total amount of approximately \$21,144,132, including interest. TNMP is requesting that the Commission find it has under-recovered its eligible fuel expense by this amount for the reconciliation period. TNMP recently proposed to change this fixed fuel factor in PUC Docket No. 22636. In Docket No. 22636, TNMP also requested that it be permitted to surcharge its retail customers to recoup under-recovered costs and interest, which include costs and interest that TNMP incurred during the reconciliation period. In this Application, TNMP is not requesting to make any change to the surcharge amount proposed in Docket No. 22636.
