Back then, we had an old, used black and white tv, an antenna with a booster, and no working rotor...hence the wheel hub. If we wanted to improve the reception the antenna had to be moved until the picture was at it's best. Which wasn't much. I was in my late 20s before I knew ALL programming wasn't done in a snow storm!

Horizontal hold used to be a regularly visited control on the tv, as the picture would flip, flip, flip, slowly building up speed until it was totally impossible to follow a program.

Even after the advent of our first color tv, and a rotor powered by a motor, reception was horrible. But what a luxury not to have to go outside in the elements and manually wrestle the pole!

Of course, deciding what to watch was not much of a challenge.

There were three stations, ABC, CBS and NBC and one or the other of those was almost guaranteed to never be good enough to watch.

That boiled things down to two choices and that wasn't

much of a decision to make. Talking with Tim Wood the other day he recalled when he used to have antenna wire stapled to the ceiling. Each of the best reception points were marked on the ceiling and he would move the wire from one point to another to get the best reception for that station!

One of the chief joys of watching television back then was weather condition. It was always nice to have the picture and sound fade away in a sizzle and hiss just at the most critical portion of a program. Everyone was convinced that this only happened during programming, never during a commercial.

Then came cable tv, large satellite dishes and then the small dishes.

We have about 100 channels to chose from, each and every one of them brilliantly clear and unaffected by atmospheric conditions.

We sit in our recliners punching the remote as we flip from channel to channel to channel, never getting up to adjust a picture or anything

Our choices range from novies to sports, shopping channels to music. The range is virtually unlimited. That doesn't count the VCR and

anything we pop in to it. So why is it we can't find anything to watch on television? Back when we had two choices we seemed to have been more easily satisfied. Could it be we are spoiled? Hmmm, probably!

An interesting look back at pro football

by Nancy Brown

Jack Dodd stopped by my office at the Bogata News Monday with a very interesting item. It was a letter that was given to him in 1975 in Glen Rose, Texas. The letter is from Bert Bell, owner of the Philadelphia Eagles professional football team written to Hugh Wolfe on June 28, 1940.

We all know what professional players in any sport receive as a salary now. We all think it is unbelievable the amount of money they get but we all hope to have our children or grandchildren make the cut in various sports and earn that kind of money for something they love to do. Professional players did not always make the big bucks, become spokespersons for shoe, cereal and other companies or even become well known figures. Few people even knew who owned a team. I hope you find this letter as interesting a look back as I

Mr. Bell writes: Received your letter of June 25, and as we now have under contract 48 ball players I naturally would like to hear yes or no from you immediately after you have read the terms and conditions which are the best that I can offer you.

First I will give you a game to game contract calling for \$150.00 per game.

Second, instead of paying your fare or expenses or part of the same from Texas, which is absolutely against the principles of this club and which we have never done with any single ball player, I will agree that if you are good enough to stick the full season with us that I will give you a bonus of \$100.00.

Third, I have always paid my ball players when they were injured and could not play and have never released a ball player without the Doctor's stating that he was absolutely in good condition and able to

Hump Snyder, Captain of North Carolina, broke his leg here three years ago on the 10th of August, and I paid his full salary. I am therefore perfectly willing to put a clause in your contract that if you encounter a serious injury while playing for or practicing with the Philadelphia Eagles that would prevent you from future participation in football that we would agree in recompense for that to pay you your game salary for the remaining league games on the 1940 league schedule, with the understanding that you of course will still live up to all our training rules and etc., even while incapacitated. I will not in any way, or under any conditions promise you any bonus if we win the Eastern Championship or the World's Championship, as you yourself will reap the benefit of this by participation in the play-off game and in California if we should win the championship, and at any rate I am not promising

anything to anybody along those lines. I have written every ball player on my squad and have told them that under the new conditions there are no seasonal contracts and that unless they are perfectly satisfied with their salaries and the conditions and rules and regulations laid down by the club I would much rather than have them dissatisfied in any way that they did not play at all as I feel sure with the proper mental attitude and aggressiveness of the players with a fine team spirit and no crabbing or crying about anything that we have a great chance of winning and therefore I am much more in favor of a boy not playing at all unless he is perfectly

I made trades this winter for six ball players, namely: Russ Thompson, regular right tackle on the Chicago Bears; Milt Trost, substitute left tackle on the Chicago Bears; Les play football. As a matter of fact, McDonald, regular left end of the Chicago Bears; Ray George, regular

right tackle of the Detroit Lions; Chuck Cherundolo, regular center of Cleveland Rams, and Dick Bassi, substitute guard on the Chicago Bears, and everyone of these ball players, playing on great football teams, received less than \$155.00 per game and every one, with the exception of one, received less money than I was paying to men in the same relative position, so you can see that \$150.00 per ball game is surely a fair contract and if you do not feel that way, I would rather you would not play

We will start practice here in Philadelphia on Friday, August 9, 1940, and everyone will report at the above address on that date on or before 12:00 noon.

I am enclosing a form letter which is self explanatory, stipulating the conditions under which all our ball players agree to play. Hoping to hear favorable from you by return air mail. The letter is signed Yours sincerely, Bert Bell.

Mr. Wolfe returned his contract and received this letter from Mr. Bell: Dear Wolfe:

Received your signed contracts this morning and am certainly glad that you are going to be with us.

Looking forward to seeing you at the above address on Friday, August 9, 1940 on or before 12:00 noon. Yours truly, Bert Bell.

P.S. I am enclosing your contract which you must have forgotten about and mailed to us. Be sure to be in great shape as we will start rough work immediately. Also, don't forget your shoulder pads, hip pads and shoes.

Guess how many of today's players furnish their own equipment and would agree to this contract? It's an interesting look back. Thank you, Jack for sharing it with me and the Bogata News.

A precious gift.. wife gives husband a kidney

Cato one of her kidneys so he could live. The transplant took place December 13, 1999 in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma and was success from the first minute. Annette said, "I never doubted for a minute that this was something I would do. He would do it for me. We have loved each other for 40 years and plan to continue our lives together until death takes us".

Annette, who had a foot-long incision compared to Cato's six inch one is back to normal and glad the dangerous episode is over. Cato on the other hand is still recovering. He is not yet able to put in a full day at his job as President of the Security State Bank in Wewoka where he has served for 22 years. But, he is getting better

It took two decades for Cato's kidney problem to reach crisis stage. Back in 1979 doctors found cancer in his right kidney and had to remove it. From the start Cato grew up in Talco, TX. the son of Felix Jones, founder of the Talco State Bank. His mother, Ruth, was a school teacher. He was born August 16, 1938 the next to the youngest of 12 children. His boyhood was average. He played football for Talco High School and was in the band. He worked at his father's bank beginning with sweeping up. After graduation in 1956 he attended Abilene Christian College and worked part time in a bank.

Annette also grew up in Talco and attended the same college. She is the daughter of Troy and Ruby Lewis of Talco. Troy was an employee of Mobil Oil. She played junior high basketball and was a member of the high school band. She has 3 sisters, Becky, Lewis Blackburn, Brenda Lewis Russell and Jan Lewis Lily.

Annette and Catodated during their high school days occasionally but they fell in love at Abilene campus. She quit college in her junior year and they married on September 5,

Cato got his business administration degree from Abilene Christian in 1960 and he joined his father in the bank at Talco for 6 years. They moved to New Jersey where Cato was an assistant branch manager for 7 years. His mother suffered a heart attack and the couple returned to Texas where he worked in a bank at Grapevine. He was recruited by Security Sate in January 1978 where he became President. Barely a year had gone by when carcinoma was detected in the left kidney. The medical

nightmare extended over 20 years. First surgeons took out the disease kidney. Two years later cancer developed around his esophagus. Radiation treatments were given. "Then heard about a doctor in Greece, who was having great success with an immune system enhancement treatment," said Cato. He and Annette flew to Athens where for a month he took this very unorthodox treatment.

The doctor in Greece put his on a very strict diet. Nothing with chemicals. He ate vegetables, no red meat, white meat of chicken and swimming fish. Annette used unbleached flour and still does. No salt, soda, caffeine or food with preservatives were allowed. Cato stayed on the diet for 8

The radiation he had taken had destroyed his other kidney and the function went from 100 percent to 20 percent from 1981 to 1988. Every 3 to 6 months doctors in Oklahoma City ran tests and the results were frightening. The kidney was failing fast. Dialysis was next and it was a terrible ordeal.

Tubes inserted into his neck were hooked up to pump his blood through a machine to take out the impurities his kidney could not. He had to have this done 3 times a week for 4 hours and 15 minutes each time. For about 3 months it helped. Then it became evident that he could not stay on dialysis for a long period of time. His body just would not tolerate it.

Annette suffered with Cato. Early on doctors had told them he might need a kidney transplant in 15 to 20 years but it had seemed like a long

Annette Jones gave her husband time off. Annette decided to volunteer giving him a kidney when doc-

tors first mentioned dialysis. The idea had came from Oklahoma State University football coach, Bob Simmons who got a kidney transplant from his wife, Linda. It was the first time Annette knew she could be a possible donor. She mention the idea to Cato's doctors who thought it was a wonderful one. But, she had to

Tests started in May 1999. First blood work and then all sorts of ultrasounds, Cat scans etc. etc. It turned out Annette's kidneys were healthy and the right size and she was accepted as a donor.

The couple's son, Gregory, a banker

in Paris, TX., fought the decision He demanded to be the donor. But, the doctor's had already made their choice. The couple's 4 daughters had already been eliminated because they were young and of child-bearing age.

Annette and Cato were ready for

the transplant. He was failing fast, but unexpected complications arose. He developed a staph infection which brought a 6 week delay. Surgeons had to go into his neck and remove all the cartilage form his clavicle and practically drown him with antibiot-

Finally, the date was set for Monday, December 13, 1999. Annette was prepped in one room, Cato next door. The transplant was almost scrubbed at the last minute. Cato's surgeon had come down with a virus. But, she medicated herself and scrubbed for surgery.

Annette's left kidney was removed. Then Cato was put to sleep and his groin opened. Her kidney was quickly attached to his bladder. Cato said, "They told me later that it started working immediately, which is a little unusual." Annette said, "They just put me to sleep and the next thing I knew I was in my room and awake. It was a hard surgery but I had excellent care and am fine now

The next morning Cato was able to walk down the hall and visit Annette. He told her he could not believe how good he felt. Cato has thanked his loving wife over and over. Annette

finds the attention of the transplant a bit embarrassing. She said, "He is really my life and it is like a gift to me because he feels good now.

Suppose there was a fire....and nobody came?

The Blossom Volunteer Fire Department would like to say thanks for all of the support in the past years. We could not have made it where we are today without your generous donations and working together as a community.

In the last several years the fire service has made a great deal of progress. One of the major changes that directly effects you is the insurance key rating. This is something that has effected every homeowner in our coverage area. Before the key rating, everyone had a rating of 10. (The rating is 10=worst to 1=best.) On an average most larger cities are in the 4 to 5 range, there are very few I's. Because of your help last year, we were able to get the rating from a high rating of 10 to a low rating of 6 in the city. However, because of the condition of our grass fire truck and the increasing number of homes being built outside of the city limits of

Blossom, Reno and Paris, the homes in our coverage area outside the city limits of Blossom are at a rating of 9, down from 10.

With the increasing danger of wildland fires, (grass fires) our grass fire truck will not hold up to the rugged demand that is put on it. The truck in question is a 1978 model ambulance that was converted to what we have today. The expenses of keeping the truck running are too great to keep it in service. Therefore, we feel that it is in your best interest for us to replace the truck with something that is more suited for rugged terrain. The truck we have now is adapted for grass fire use only. We would like to replace it with a truck that can be used for house fires, car fires, grass fires, woodland fires, etc.

As you are aware, vehicles are expensive. Our main income to the fire department is the Blossom Vol-

unteer Fire Department's annual Chili Supper, which raises enough funds to pay bills for the year and buy some small equipment. However, we never have enough to put back for larger equipment such as a new truck. So the BVFD is asking once again for the help of the community in replacing our grass fire truck.

If everyone in our coverage area would give a tax deductible donation of as little as \$10, to help in the purchasing of the grass fire truck, the BVFD could better serve the community

Roses By Another Name—Gorgeous

To keep your garden "rosey", with a little "rose sense" here are some tips from Monty Justice of Monty's Joy Juice, a midwest regional judge for the American Rose Society and avid rose gardener for 35 years.

 It takes a minimum of four hours of direct sun, six to eight hours is optimum.

 Provide a porous medium for the roots to easily reach out.

• Ensure a soil acidity/alkalinity or pH that roses prefer: 6.0 to 7.0, 6.5 is optimum.

 Maintain a cool soil temperature, no higher than 70 degrees.


 Develop discipline for spraying. This keeps the rose plants from losing their green leaves.

• Apply fertilizer as far from the center of each plant as possible (24 inches or more).

• Use correct pruning techniques: A) Don't take off more than 20 percent of the foliage the first bloom period, and pinch off the blooms once they look old and weary. B) After the first bloom period you can cut long stems.


