Deport sets new tax rate

The primary item of business on the Deport City Council's agenda Monday night was to discuss and take action on property taxes for the year 2000. The present tax rate is 4243 ¢ per \$100 of evaluation.

The tax base in Deport is \$10,896,231.00, yielding a tax income of \$48,762.00, based upon 100% collection

The council unanimously voted to raise the tax rate to .4833¢ per \$100 evaluation. This will yield an additional \$6,428.76 in tax revues, based upon a 100% collection rate. This is still just lower than the .50¢ tax rate the city had nearly 30 years. This is approximately a 5¢ on

\$100 evaluation increase. The council discussed and passed


a resolution to allow Hayter Engi-

neering, Inc., to apply for the 2001 TCDP grant. This grant would be used for sewer improvements primarily on the east side of town.

They discussed and took action on the animal control ordinance. Council has made it mandatory for all animal complaints to be made in writing at City Hall. These complaints must be signed by the complainant. Complainants will remain anonymous to the general public.

The council heard that the First Baptist Church of Deport has donated the dirt from building their new parking lot to the city to be used in constructing a youth soccer field at Foster Park.

Budget discussion was held. The usual items such as approval of minutes, financial reports and payment were approved.



Mark Perkins files write-in candidacy for Sheriff position in Red River County

Longtime deputy sheriff Mark Perkins paid his filing fee Wednesday, August 9 to run as a write-in candidate for Red River County Sheriff.

Perkins will face Bob Storey in the November 7 general election. Storey defeated Sheriff Bob Edrington in the primary run-off earlier this year.

"Some people have been saying that I was "put up" to running for Sheriff, but that's definitely not true, I have thought of running for Sheriff several times as my experience in law enforcement expanded," Perkins said Monday morning from his office at the Sheriff's Department, "But I did not want to run against my boss, Sheriff Edrington, who I respect very much.'

"We all know crime is growing at an alarming rate and we all have to fight it just one day at a time and I am willing to work as many hours a day as it takes to fight the crime in our county. Most of my family lives in Red River County and as Sheriff, I would have a part in making this

county a better and safer place to live and raise a family."

Perkins continued, "We need to keep the department moving forward, not backwards, if the department can improve as much in the next four to eight years as it has in the past eight years, we will have an excellent Sheriff's Department."

Perkins, 40, is a Red River County native and has lived in Bagwell all his life. He has owned and operated a locksmith and gun shop there since 1978. He is a 1978 graduate of Clarksville High School and did attend East Texas Police Academy where he received his law enforcement training in 1981. He has since taken several criminal justice courses through Southwest Texas State University

Perkins is the only candidate who holds a current Texas Peace Officer commission, and with almost 20 years of law enforcement experience and 1,470 hours of in-service training. He holds the following licenses

with the State of Texas: Advanced Peace Officer, County Jailer, Instructor, Law Enforcement Firearms Instructor and Telecommunications Operator.

"I was a patrolman for the Clarksville Police Department for six years, " he said, "and I have been a Red River County Deputy for 13 1/2 years.

The last seven and one-half years, he has served as the department training coordinator and as a firearms instructor. Perkins teaches law enforcement courses for East Texas Police Academy, a division of Kilgore College, telecommunications courses for Texas Department of Public Safety, and DWI courses for Texas A&M University.

Perkins said, "Based on feedback from the citizens of the county, I believe I have a good chance of winning this election," he concluded by saying, "and if elected, I would have no problem in hiring women law enforcement officers.

An ordinance prohibiting operation of commercial trucks on city streets in residential areas and restricting parking in residential areas within the City Limits of the DCity orf Bogata, Texas; prescribing a penalty for viola-tion hereof; repealing all ordxinances or parts of ordinances in conflict hereewith; providing for an effective date of September 16, 2000,

It shall be unlawful for any person to operate, access, drive upon, or use any truck tractor, trailer, semi-trailer, bus, or any commercial motor vehicle with a rated capacity of one and one-half tons, or greater, on residential streets within the city limits in the City of Bogata, Texas. This section shall not apply to the following named roadways within the city limits of Bogata, Texas: Texas State Highway 37; U.S. Highway 271; Business Route 271; Gable Street; Mt. Vernon Drive; Halesboro Street; Clarksville Street; Texas Farm To Market Road 909. This section shall not apply to a truck tractor if the trailer is disconnected and the owner/ operator is in route to their residence and the vehicle is parked on private property. This section shall not apply of the vehicle is in route to a commercial destination as described and defined in Section 2 of this ordinance SECTION 2. It shall be unawful for any erson to leave, park or stand any truck tractor, trailer, semi-trailer, bus or any commercial motor vehicle with a rated capacity of one and one-half tons, or greater, on residential streets ithin the city limits in the City of Bogata, Texas. This section shall not prevent the parking or standing of the above described vehicles in such areas for the purpose of expeditiously loading and unloading of passengers, freight or merchandise; and provided this section shall not apply to street construction, maintenance and repair equipment, trucks, trailers and vehicles used by public service utility companies engaged in repairing or extending public utilities; and motor buses when taking on or discharging passengers at customary bus stops. This ordinance does not negate, alter. of change any currently existing posted "NO PARKING ZONES." SECTION 3. That any person found guilty f parking any motor vehicle or other vehicle in the above described areas at any time shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction, shall be punsihed by a fine as allowed by the laws of the State of Texas. SECTION 4. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby xpressly repealed. SECTION 5. (e) Summary abatement means abatement of the nuisance by the City, or a contractor employed by the City, by removal, repair, or other acts without notice to the owner, agent

SECTION 102.

(a) Whenever a complaint is made to the City of the existence of a public nuisance, as defined in Section 101, the Mayor shall promptly cause to be inspected the property on which it is alleged that such public nuisance exists. Should the Mayor find that a pubic nuisance exists, and that the public health, safety or welfare may be in immediate danger then summary abatement procedures shall be implemented and the City may cause the nuisance to be removed or abated. The Mayor may notify the Building Inspector if the public nuisance involves a building that appears struc-turally unsafe. The Building Inspector, upon being notified by the Mayor shall cause the building on which it is alleged such public nuisance exists to be inspected and submit a nuisance exists to be inspected and sub written report of such inspection and the findings to the Mayor. (b) When summary abatement is autho-

rized, notice to the owner, agent or occupant of the property is not required. Following sum-mary abatement, the Mayor shall cause to be posted on the property liable for the abatement a notice describing the action taken to abate the

SECTION 103. Abatement in Other Cases; Notice, etc.

(as) If, after inspecting the property on which e nuisance is reported, the Mayor declares the existence of a public nuisance, but the nature thereof is not such as to require the

premises, location or structure at the time an order pursuant to this Ordinance is used and served upon him, shall be responsible for complying with that order, and liable for any costs ncurred by the City therewith, notwithstanding the fact that he conveys his interests in the property to another after such order was issued and served.

(e) It shall not be a defense to the determination that a public nuisance exists that the property is boarded up or otherwise enclosed

SECTION 104. Abatement by Owner (a) Within thirty (30) days after the posting

and mailing of a notice to abate a nuisance, the owner, agent of the owner, or individual in possession of the affected property shall remove and abate such nuisance or show that no nuisance in fact exists. Such showing shall be made by filing a written statement that no nuisance exists. The statement shall be filed with the City

(b) The Mayor, upon written application by the owner within the thirty (30) day period after the notice has been served, may grant additional time for the owner to effect the abatement of the public nuisance, provided that such extension is imited to a specific time period.

SECTION 105. Appeal Procedures; Hearing, (a) The owner or occupant of the property who has been served with a notice pursuant to this Ordinance that a public nuisance exists and that it must be abated within thirty (30) days may, within seven (7) calendar days after receipt of such notice, make a written demand of the City for a hearing on the question of whether a public nuisance in fact exists. The hearing shall be held within seven (7) calendar days following receipt by the City of the written demand and at least two (2) days' notice of the hearing shall be given to the individual who made the written demand for the hearing.

(b) The hearing shall be conducted by the City Council. The City Council may amend or modify the notice and/or order, or extend the time for compliance with the Mayor's order by the owner by such a date as the majority of the Council may ermine

(c) The owner, agent of the owner, occupant or lienholder, if any, of the subject property shall be given the opportunity to present evidence to the City Council in the course of the hearing. (d) In those instances where the nuisance has

been abated by the City, the City Council shall have the discretion to waive the cost of abating a nuisance, in whole or in part, if, in the course of the hearing reviewing the decision, the City Council finds that any of the following did not conform to the provisions of this Ordinance: The notice to remove the nuisance: (2) The work performed in abating the nuisance:

(3) The computation of charges. SECTION 106. Abatement by City.

(a) Should any public nuisance not be abated the expiration of time stated in the notice/ order or within such additional time as the City may grant, the City shall have the authority to enter upon the property and abate the public nuisance found thereon. (d) If no appeal of a determination by the Mayor is filed within the time period allowed, a copy of the determination will be furnished to the City Secretary who shall then enter a lien in the amount determined by the Mayor in the City liens docket as provided in subsection (a).

(e) If a timely appeal is received by the City Council, a hearing shall be scheduled and held on the matter. If, after the hearing, the City Council determines that the proposed assess ment does not comply with subsection (g) herein, the City Council shall so certify to the City Secretary and the proposed assessment shall be cancelled. If, after the hearing, it is determined that the proposed assessment or any part of it is proper and authorized, the City Council shall so certify to the City Secretary who shall enter a lien in such amount as determined appropriate by the City Council, in the lien docket as proided in subsection (a).

(i) The lien may be cancelled or reduced by the Mayor, in administrative review, or the City Council, on appeal, if it is determined that the owner did not receive notice of the proposed assessment, did not previously have kno of the lien or of the nuisance abatement work constituting the basis of the lien, could not, in the exercise of reasonable care or diligence, have had such knowledge, and in addition, that the circumstances are such that a reduction or cancellation of the charges would have been appropriate had the matter been reviewed pursuant to this Section prior to assessment. Citizens of Deport need to be aware that on the First Saturday of every month there will be a test at noon of the siren.


Since the siren is no longer used for calling firefighters to a fire, it needs to be tested regularly in case it is needed for a tornado alert


