I am once again reminded that in a few seconds so much can happen to change so many

And, once again I am reminded that the most dangerous thing we do in life is to

Because of the necessity of driving we tend to take it for granted.

We shouldn't. Most of us think that we are good, safe drivers. All too often that is beside the point. Over the past 22 years in the newspaper business I have seen so many wrecks, so many people injured or killed. And a good portion of them were good drivers, driving safely. But, circumstances conspired to create a series of events that led to tragedy.

We cannot control the other driver. We cannot control things that may happen to our vehicle, or weather conditions.

In spite of overwhelming evidence that seat belts save lives, there are still many people who will not wear them. Yes, on rare occasions, a seat belt does more harm than good. But by and large they do the opposite.

The hardest part of this ioh is taking photographs of terrible accidents and writing stories about lives cut short.

Knowing that these photos and stories can upset family and friends is another difficult part of the job.

But, if one person can look at that photo and THINK a little about their driving....if they can drive a little more defensively, if they remember to buckle up that seat belt something has been accomplished.

I know there are many who disagree with me on this, as well as other issues. That goes with the territory. But, here is

my "Mother Hen" lecture. Please, please, drive carefully. Don't assume the driver at the intersection sees you and is stopping. Don't assume just because you have the right of way you won't have to yield it in order to avoid an accident. Fasten your seat belt. Drive

defensively. Drive politely. Each of us has made driving mistakes, and we will again.

Awareness helps us to cut down on those mistakes. Please, be aware of what you are doing...and what other drivers are doing. Be cautious, don't take risks driving.

In short, please, be careful. The result is no accident. And that's a great thing for everyone concerned.

Lamar County volunteer firefighters plead for help from commissioner's court

"Powder Keg" "Dry as a paper sack" and "emergency situation" were terms used by Lamar County Firefighters Association President Jack Steed to describe the present situation to Commissioner's Court on Monday.

Steed and representatives from all 19 Lamar County Volunteer Fire departments tried to express their need for financial assistance from

the court. Steed reported that most of the departments have more than twice as many calls this year as last year. Fuel prices have increased by as much as 50¢ per gallon. Some firefighters have resorted to hauling 55 gallon barrels of water in their pickups at all times during the present drought situation. Some departments, Steed reported, have equipment that won't operate without repairs . Some fire departments have had firefighters injured fighting fires without proper gear. Some fire departments are "Flat Broke" and firemen are paying for fuel and repairs out of their own pockets just to keep things going, he

Lamar County Judge Chuck Superville asked if all nineteen departments needed assistance.

"Some departments have money in t he bank drawing interest. Do they need to be paid assistance too?" he

Blossom Volunteer Fire Department members James Taylor responded that "yes, Blossom does have money in the bank from our fund raisers. That money is set aside for a new truck to replace the old truck that the department has trouble keeping in operation now. If that money is used up to operate we won't have many funds to use for new equipment".

Taylor's stated was echoed by other departments with the same situation.

Steed asked for that, for this year, to help ease the extra burden put on the departments by the drought, that the Commissioner's Court give each department \$1,000 each to help get equipment repaired and some departments could use the money for gear.

Judge Superville stated that the county fire departments had received a raise from the county two years ago. "This can't go on much longer" The county pays \$82,000 to the de-

partments now. James Whitney of the Deport Volunteer Fire Department pointed out that \$82,0000 wouldn't pay the salaries for four paid firemen if the county had to hire firefighters instead of using volunteers, much less pay equipment.

Steed reported that if the \$82,000 was divided by the number of calls the county volunteers made for fire, medical emergencies, weather watch and Amber alert programs the amount paid to the departments would amount to \$2.80 per call! "That won't even pay for the gas used" he stressed.

In summary the court agreed to review the budget and see if any funding can be found to help the county departments.

Judge Superville said they would get an answer within two to three

The fact that some rain showers have helped to alleviate the immediate fire danger does not negate the fact that the county's volunteer fire departments have had to use up most of their resources this summer fighting massive grass fires.



Volleyball teams down Sulphur Springs


All three Lady Patriot volleyball teams came away with victories Tuesday night at Sulphur Springs.

It has been brought to my attention that some statements made in my previous letter to the editor that appeared in this newspaper were considered by some people to be

Let me clarify and set the record straight. In my previous letter the first three sentences said: 1(that was a member of Lone Wolf Electric until it merged with cap Rock in 1991; 2) that we were offered the same three options on capital credits as are being offered to Lamar: and 3) that now, nine years later, I have not received anything for my capital credits. These statements did not present an accurate picture. Lone Wolf members were not offered the same three options in 1991 at the time of the Lone Wolf Cap Rock merger. To the extent that my letter led people to believe that we were, I apologize for any trouble this may have caused.

The fact of the matter is that the offer of the three options, credit on electric bills, a dutch auction, or stock in Cap Rock's stock company, was made in October, 1998 at the time the members of Cap Rock voted to convert Cap Rock to a stock company from a co-op. The conversion plan that Cap Rock's members, including the former Lone Wolf members voted to set no specific date for the conversion to take place. Cap Rock has sent information to its members stating that it hopes to have the conversion completed and stock available for issuance to its members who chose the stock option by the end of 2000. In 1998, I chose the stock option, and I have not received anything for my capital credits at this time.
