1/2 cup pecans In mixing bowl, stir together mix, cream and butter until pastry dough orms a ball. Turn onto flour dusted surface with additional baking mix if eeded. Knead 7-10 times. Roll out 15nch round. Fold into quarters and transfer to 13-inch pizza pan or baking dish. Spoon apple filling over pastry. Place teaspoonfuls of caramel dip over filling. Sprinkle pecans over top. Fold dough ward center to make edging. Bake at 100 degrees for 20-22 minutes or until den brown.

Chewy Caramel-Apple Pecan

Cookies I cup granulated sugar I cup packed dark brown sugar 1/2 cup butter-softened 1/2 cup margarine-softened

2 tablespoons milk 2 teaspoons vanilla 3-1/3 cups baking mix

2-1/2 cups oats I package chopped dried apples I cup chopped pecans-toasted 20 caramels-cut into 8 pieces

In large bowl, beat sugars, butters until light and fluffy. Add eggs, milk and vanilla; beat well and combine. Slowly add baking mix and oats; beat at low speed to combine. Stir in apples, pecans and caramel pieces. Cover; chill for I hour. Place tablespoonfuls on baking sheet well coated with cooking spray. Bake at 375 degrees for 12-14 minutes. Cool and transfer to wire

Pound Cake Cookies

I package pound cake mix 1/3 cup butter or margarine-softened I teaspoon almond extract

legg Heat oven to 375 degrees, Mix half of cake mix, margarine, extract and egg in large bowl until smooth. Stir in remaining cake mix. Divide into halves. Roll each half 1/8 inch thick on lightly floured board. Cut into desired shapes; or roll into l-inch balls. Place on ungreased cookie sheet and flatten with bottom of glass. Bake until edges are light brown; 6-8 minutes. Cool slightly and remove to wire rack. Ice with Butter cream Icing below.

Buttercream lcing 1/2 cup margarine 1-1/2 teaspoon clear vanilla 5 cups confectioners sugar

2-3 tablespoons milk Cream butter and shortening and add vanilla. Add sugar, one cup at a time. Beat at medium speed. Ad milk to desired consistency. Smooth onto cookies. Sprinkles may also be added.

Dr. Ford was born in Ilford, Essex, England in 1949. He earned a bachelor of science degree with honors from Bedford College at the University of London and a doctorate of philosophy from the University of East Anglia in 1975.

Aninterest in computational chemistry prompted Dr. Ford to come to the United States, where he worked and studied under Dr. Michael Dewar at the University of Texas at Austin.

After five years conducting cancer research at the Hutchinson Cancer Research Center in Seattle, Dr. Ford began his career as a chemistry teacher. at SMU in 1984.

He filled his time away from chemistry with world travel, bridge games and classical music, which is how he met his wife, Linda, more than twelve years ago.

"A major interest of his and mine was trying to learn about classical music", Linda says.

How I Turned My Hispanic Perspective Into a Positive Influence

Surviving negative episodes in my life, especially those that were aimed at my Hispanic heritage, is something I want to forget. However, I have found that this is not very easily done. I still can recall many of those negative events as if they were happening now. The emotional scars that these events left in their wake are long lasting and they still hurt when I recall them. However, I am able to cast them aside quicker than when they initially occurred.

As early as first grade, I learned that I had to rely on my skills and my God-given talents to overcome negative events. Instead of harboring hatred toward those who hurt me, I compensated by plunging into schoolwork with vengeance. I applied every piece of advice my Dad offered, especially if it applied to learning an achievement. I turned being a Hispanic, a negative in my peer's eyes, into a positive attribute for my family and me. Through my achievements, I wanted to pave the way for my brothers and sisters and other Hispanics who followed me, to show the world and mostly those that hurt me, that Hispanics could be smart in school

Throughout my education career, as a student and as an educator, I have always followed the philosophy instilled in me by my Dad: "work hard and it will pay off". In many respects this philosophy helped me to succeed at Paris Junior College, at Sam Houston State University, as a classroom

teacher of the mentally retarded, and finally, to succeed in obtaining my Ph.D. from the University of Kansas. I applied this same philosophy in my work as at teacher educator in the field of special education and as a Director of Student Assessment. Throughout all my endeavors I never lost the confidence that I gained as a first grader when I proved to my non-Hispanic peers that I was a smart dude and they had better study hard and work hard because if they didn't they would be beaten by a Hispanic.

I have tried to become a model that others can emulate, both academically and socially. To promote myself as an academic model, I publish articles in professional journals. I have published to monographs, and a chapter in a book. To promote myself as a social model, I maintain a strong work ethic, put in an honest day's work, apply rules an regulations fairly and justly and am open and accepting of individuals of all cultures, races, ethnic backgrounds, ages, levels of employment and income levels. In short, I, as a Hispanic, want those who witness my achievements, my positive work behaviors and my positive attitudes to use these attributes as a yardstick to measure other Hispanics they encounter.

If I succeed in making a positive impact on some individual within and without my cultural group, then I am satisfied that I have turned my Hispanic perspective into a positive in-





ORDINANCE NO. 01-002 Amending Ordinance No. 99-010 "An ordinance of the City of Blossom, Texas, amending certain Articles of existing

Ordinance No. 99-010": Whereas, the governing body of Blossom, Texas, meeting in duly posted Public Session, deem it prudent and necessary to amend Articles I and II of existing Ordinance No.

99-010, adopted May 18, 1999: and Whereas, a duly posted Public Hearing has been held prior to consideration for adoption of aforementioned amendments;

Now, therefore, Be It Ordained by the City Council of Blossom, Texas, that Articles I and II, Ordinance No. 99-010, are hereby canceled and superseded and are restated as follows:

Article I. Construction Regulations: Section 1. Building Codes. The "Standard Building Code," in its latest edition is hereby adopted by reference as though it were fully copied herein, as the safe and practical building standards for all construction within the City of Blossom and other areas outside the City over which the City has regulatory au-

b. Set back requirements for all structures must be a minimum of ten (10) feet from the back and side property lines and a minimum of 25 feet set back from the property line facing

Section 2. Types of Construction. Except as approved separately by the City Council, all new construction or residences shall be sitebuilt single family residences or consistent with "Existing Land Use, City of Blossom, July 1999", prepared by Hayter Engineering

Section 3. General Land Use Requirements. The City of Blossom Comprehensive Plan, developed with financial and administrative support from the Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs, completed by Hayter Engineering, 1999, is hereby adopted by reference as though fully copied herein as the standard for land use and types of construction to be considered in the approval of all

building permits. Section 4. Regulation Outside City Limits. The regulations established herein, pertaining to building permits is extended to areas outside the City limits wherein the City has regulating authority and regulations established herein specific to plumbing permits and general requirements relating to plumbing extend to any area wherein the City provides water supply, whether that supply is provided by public or private distribution lines

Article II. General Provisions. Section 1. Permit Required. 





approximately 250,000 students, over 5% of all Texas school children, were not in class, according to recent data issued by Texans for a Traditional

School Year. Tina Bruno, spokesperson for the group, says poor attendance not only means students are not receiving the benefit of 180 days of instruction, but it creates havoc in the classroom and reduces the amount of money the school district receives in state fund-

Poor attendance does effect a district's total revenue. According to the Texas Education Agency, schools lose approximately \$29.00 per student per day absent from school. If school districts were paid every day, Texas school districts would have lost about \$7.5 million in 1999 due to high absenteeism on the first day of

school alone. Bruno said she is not comfortable making the assumption that an early August school start date is totally to blame for the high absentee rate, due to the lack of historical data available. It is premature to make any leaps saying starting school later produces better attendance, but according to teachers heard from, first week of school attendance has gotten worse as school starts earlier.

Numbers around the state supported the theory. According to data available on the San Antonio Independent School District web site, absenteeism was reduced two percentage points this year, as the dis-

A report in the Fort Worth Star Telegram said Fort Worth Independent School District, which started school a week later this year, also reported higher attendance the first day of school. Officials from the district credited the later school start with better attendance this year.

Bruno said Texans for a Traditional School Year started looking into the problem after receiving telephone calls from teachers voicing concern. The concerns were basically the same, teachers told the group many students do not enroll prior to Labor Day and those who do are often kept behind by unstable, constantly changing classes.
Bruno said, "We expected atten-

dance date to be readily available and were surprised to find it wasn't". She stated she hopes school boards will take a look at their districts' attendance data for the past few years before setting this next year's calen-

The region with the greatest percentage of students not in school on the first day was Region 1, representing Brownsville, Hildago, Mission, Laredo and surrounding areas. Cumulatively, the data shows that 13.15 percent of Region 1 students are not in school the first day. The greater Houston area, or Region 4 came in a close second with 9.55 percent of students not in attendance.

Facts show that areas with great absentee rates are not just due to area

250,000 students absent on first day of school On the first day of school last year, trict enjoyed a week later school start migrant populations. It is a statewide problem that needs to be dealt with. Texans for a Traditional School Year announced their findings after tallying the data they received from school districts across the state. Data was received from 356 of the 1,042 requests sent and represents 47 percent of the student body in Texas. The

data was collected via public information requests to each school district. The group asked school districts to provide attendance numbers for the first day of school and every day through October 1. Based on the data collected, the

statewide absentee rate for the first day of school was 5.53 percent in 1999. The percentage was multiplied by the total number of students enrolled in public schools and determined that approximately 250,000 students were absent across the state.

Bruno said their research doesn't show the same problem from September 1-October 1. She added that the difference in attendance was less than one quarter of a percent.

Texans for a Traditional School Year is a grassroots, educational organization of parents, teachers, administrators and business leaders concerned about the negative impact of the early August school start date on students, teachers and families. 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
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
