





The ladies are 32-5 going into the area playoffs tentatively set for November 4th at a time and site to be determined.


A perfect district record is what

The JV ended their season with 20-7 and the freshmen ended with a 21-l record.



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


White also did an excellent job passing the ball and gaining yards. The offensive line, the no-glory members of the team, did a afantastic

### **ORDINANCE NO. 00-23** An Ordinance for the City of Bogata, Texas, providing that the code of Ordinances, City of Bogata, be amended; prohibiting unreasonably loud, disturbing and unnecessary noises which are deemed offensive to the ordinary sensibilities of the inhabitants of the city; prohibiting use of sound amplification systems, loud speakers; providing for exceptions; providing for a penalty not to exceed \$500.00; repealing all ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith; and providing for an effective date of November 8, 2000.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Bogata, Texas: CHAPTER 1. NOISE CONTROL Section 1.01. Making of noises detrimen-

tal to life or health prohibited. It shall be unlawful for any person to make, cause to be made, or allow noise of such character, intensity and duration as to be detrimental to the life or health of any individual in the City.

Section 1.02. Noises interfering with

the enjoyment of property or public peace and comfort. No person shall make, cause to be made,

or allow any unreasonably loud, disturbing and unnecessary noise in the City which is offensive to the ordinary sensibilities of the inhabitants of the City, which noise renders the enjoyment of life or property uncomfortable or interferes with public peace and comfort.

Section 1.03. Same-Enumerated The following acts, among others, are declared to create loud, disturbing and un-necessary noises, and shall be deemed a violation of this Ordinance, but such enumeration shall not be deemed to be exclu-

(a) The continued or frequent sounding of any horn or signal device on any automobile. motorcycle, bus or other vehicle, or the creating by means of any such signal device of any unreasonably loud or harsh noise for any cessary purpose or unreasonable period of time, except as a danger signal, or as may be required by law, if another vehicle is backing, starting or turning in such a manner as to likely cause a collision.

(b) The playing of any radio, television, phonograph, stereo, drum, musical instrumental or other similar devices in such an inreasonable manner, or at such an unreasonable volume, as to disturb the peace, quiet, comfort or repose of persons of ordinary sensibilities in any dwelling, apart-ment, hotel or other type of residence, or any place of business in the immediate vicinity

(c) The owning, keeping, possessing or narboring of any animal or fowl, which by making frequent or habitual unreasonable noises, disturb the comfort and repose of

persons of ordinary sensibilities in the imme diate vicinity thereof.

(d) The use of any automobile, motorcycle, bus or other vehicle so out of repair, or so loaded, which emits or creates loud or unnecessary grating, grinding or rattling noise.

(e) Noise from use-related loading or unloading operations that impact residential areas other than between the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 10:00 p.m.

(f) The discharge into the open air of the exhaust from any motor vehicle except through a muffler, or other device, which will effectively and efficiently prevent unreasonable

(g) The use of any mechanical device operated by compressed air, unless the noise to be created thereby has been effectively muffled and reduced.

(h) The erection, including excavation, demolition, alteration, or repair of any building in or adjacent to a residential area other than between the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 10:00 p.m., except in the case of urgent necessity in the interest of public safety.

(i) The creation of unreasonably loud, disturbing and unnecessary noise on any street adjacent to any school or other institute of learning, place of religious worship, or court which is in session, or adjacent to any hospital.

(j) The use of any drum, or other instrument, or sound amplifying equipment for the pur-pose of attracting attention, by the creation of noise, to any performance, show, sale or display of merchandise or to attract customers to any place of business or transmitting music to any person or persons or assemblages of persons in such a manner as to be offensive to the ordinary sensibilities of inhabitants of the City as to interfere with the public peace and comfort or make the enjoyment of life or property uncomfortable.

(k) The use of mechanical loudspeakers or sound amplifiers on trucks or other moving vehicle for the purpose of advertising any show, sale or display of merchandise in such a manner as to be offensive to the ordinary sensibilities of inhabitants of the City and as to interfere with the public peace and comfort or make the enjoyment of life or property uncom-

Section 1.04. Vehicular mounted sound amplification systems.

(a) It shall be unlawful for any person operating or controlling a motor vehicle in either a public or private place within the City, to operate any sound amplifier which is part of, or connected to, any radio, stereo receiver. compact disc player, cassette tape player or other similar device in the motor vehicle in such a manner that, when operated, is audible accompanying the sound at a distance of fifty (50) feet from the source.

(b) The provisions of the Section do not apply to vehicles operated in the performance of duty by law enforcement officer, fire department volunteer fire departments, or ambuances.

Section 1.05. Presumption

(a) Whenever a violation of Section 1.03(k) or Section 1.04(a) of this ordinance occurs, it is presumed that the registered owner of the vehicle for which the citation was issued is the person who committed the violation, either personally or through an agent or employee. Proof of ownership may be made by a computer-generated record of the registration of the vehicle with the Texas Department of Transportation showing the name of the person to whom state license plates were issued. This proof is prima facie evidence of the ownership of the vehicle by the person to whom the certificate of registration was issued. (b) If noise can be heard from a distance of

fifty (50) feet or more after the person making the noise receives from a peace officer that the noise is a public nuisance, such noise is presumed to be loud and raucous. Section 1.06. Loudspeakers and amplifi-

(a) A person commits an offense if he operates, or causes to be operated, any mechanical loudspeaker or sound amplifier in a public place or upon any public sidewalk, street, alley or highway of the City in violation of any of the following limitations and requirements:
(1) No mechanical loudspeaker or sound

amplifier may be operated within 150 feet of the property line of the premises of a residence, except between the hours of 7:00 am. and 10:00 a.m.

(2) A mechanical loudspeaker or sound mplifier may not emit unreasonably loud, disturbing and unnecessary noises so as to interfere with the enjoyment of life or property or to interfere with public peace and comfort.

(3) A mechanical loudspeaker or sound amplifier must be operated so as not to cause traffic congestion or congregation of crowds that obstructs any public sidewalk, street, alley

(4) A mechanical loudspeaker or sound amplifier may not be operated within 150 feet of any of the following:

(A) hospital;(B) school that is in session; (C) court that is in session;

(E) facility that provides surgical services to

patients who do not require overnight hospital care during the hours of operation of the facil-(F) place of religious worship while services are being conducted; or
(G) funeral home while services are being

(D) nursing home;

(b) In this Section:

(1) Residence means a single-family, duplex or multi-family dwelling.

(2) Surgical services means therapy of a mechanical or operative kind, including but not limited to, operations involving cutting, the setting of fractures and dislocations, and

similar manual forms of treatment. (c) If conduct that would otherwise violate this Section consists of speech or other communication, of gathering with others to hear or observe such speech or communications, or of gathering with others to picket or otherwise express in a nonviolent manner a position on social, economic, political or religious questions, the person must be ordered to move, disperse or otherwise remedy the violation prior to arrest or citation

(d) The order required by Subsection (c) may be given by a peace officer, a fireman, a person with authority to control the use of the premises, or any person directly affected by the violation

(e) It is a defense to prosecution under Subsection (a) that:

(1) in circumstances in which this Section equires an order, no order was given;

(2) an order, if given, was manifestly inreasonable in scope; (3) an order, if given, was not promptly

(4) the mechanical loudspeaker or sound amplifier was operated in a public place within an enclosed structure and was not audible beyond the property lien of the premises on which it was located;

(5) the person operating the mechanical loud speaker or sound amplifier was a law enforcement officer or member of the fire department in the performance of official

(6) the mechanical loudspeaker or sound amplifier was operated for the purpose of alerting persons to the existence of an emergency or danger; or,
(7) the mechanical loudspeaker or sound

amplifier was operated in the performance of emergency work necessary to restore public utilities to restore property to a safe condition or to protect persons or property form imminent danger following a fire, accident or natural disaster. Section 1.07.

Use of bell, siren or compression or exhaust whistle on vehicles.

No vehicle shall be equipped with, and no person shall use upon a vehicle, any bell, siren or compression or exhaust whistle, except that vehicle operated in the performance of duty by law enforcement officers. the fire department including volunteer fire departments, and ambulances may attach and use a bell, siren or compression or ex-Section 1.08. Use of compression or

"Jake" brake by commercial vehicles.
It shall be unlawful for any commercial vehicle to have a compression or what is commonly known as a "Jake" brake acti-

vated within the City limits.
Section 1.09. Discharge of Firearms. (a) It shall be unlawful to discharge a

firearm within the City limits. (b) In this section: (a) Firearm is defined as any device designed, made or adapted to expel a projectile through a barrel by using the energy generated by an explosion of burning substance or any device readily convertible to that use; or

(A) Any device designed, made or adapted to expel a projectile through a barrel by using the energy generated by compressed air or compressed gas (CO-2).

Section 1.10. Fireworks unlawful within

City Limits.

(a) It shall be unlawful to posses, sell or set off fireworks of any kind inside the City limits. This is to include but not limited to:

(2) bottle rockets;

(3) whistlers;

(4) cannons; and (5) noisemakers of any type.

Section 1.11. Exceptions
The provisions of this Ordinance shall not

(a) Sound caused in the performance of emergency or public service work including police, fire, emergency medical services and public utility operations, acting in the per-formance of lawful duties to protect the health, safety or welfare of the community. (b) Any vehicle of the city, county or state

while engaged in necessary public business; (c) The intentional sounding or permitting the sounding of any fire, burglar or civil defense alarm, siren, whistle or similar stationary or emergency device for emergency purposes or for testing;

(d) The use of bells or chimes in conjunction with places of religious worship; (e) Sound generated during a special event

for which a Special Events Permit has been issued under this Code; (f) The following activities, as long as they are conducted between the hours of

7:00 a.m. and 10:00 p.m. as a normal function of a permitted use and equipment is maintained din proper working order: (1) Lawn maintenance; (2) Repair of personal-use vehicle; and

(3) Home repair of place of residence. Section 1.12. Enforcement; penalties.

Any private citizen may enforce compli-ance with this Ordinance by filing a complaint in the Municipal Court of the City of Bogata. Any person, firm, company, partnership, corporation or association violating any of the provisions of this Article shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction, shall be fined in any sum not to exceed \$500.00, and each and every day's continu-ance of any violation of this Ordinance shall constitute and be deemed a separate offense.

Section 2. It is hereby declared to be the ntention of the City Council that the sections, paragraphs, sentences, clauses and phrases of this ordinance are severable, and, if any section, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase of this ordinance shall be declared unconstitutional by the valid judgment or decree of any court of competent jurisdic-tion, such unconstitutionality shall not affect any of the remaining section, paragraphs, sentences, clauses and phrases of this ordinance, since the same would have been enacted by the City Council without the incorporation in this ordinance of such unconstitutional section, paragraph, sentence e, clause

Section 3. Any person violation any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction, shall be fined in any sum not to exceed \$500.00 and each and every day's continuance of any violation fo the above enumerated sections shall constitute and be deemed a separate offense. Section 4. All ordinances or parts of ordi-

nances in conflict herewith are expressly r pealed. Section 5. This ordinance shall be come

An Ordinance of the City of Bogata, Texas, providing that the code of ordinances of the City of Bogata, be amended by revising any pertinent sections of said code; providing for a curfew for children under seventeen (17) years of age, making it illegal to be out past 10:00 p.m. on week nights and past 12:00 midnight on weekends, and providing for a fine to be set by the municipal court of Bogata, Texas; repealing all ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith; and providing for an effective date of

WHEREAS, the City Council and the Mayor of the City of Bogata, Texas, being concerned fo the health, safety and well being of the citizens of the City of Bogata, Texas; and

WHEREAS, to prevent any further vandalism which has occurred in the past; NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF

**BOGATA, TEXAS:** It shall be unlawful for any child under seventeen (17) years of age to intentionally, unknowingly, recklessly or with criminal negligence be in or remain in or upon the streets or public places or an establishment within the city limits of Bogata, Texas, during the follow-

ing periods: Ending at 6:00 a.m. and beginning at 10:00 p.m. on week nights (Sunday through

Thursday nights). 2. Ending at 6:00 a.m. and beginning at 12:00 a.m. weekends (Saturday and Sunday mornings.).

LAW ENFORCEMENT PROCEDURE

1. A law enforcement officer may stop and detain persons whom the officer has developed reasonable suspicion to believe have committed a violation of this ordinance. A law enforcement officer shall attempt to ascertain insofar as possible that the persons are not:

A. Returning home without any detour or stop from a law occupation which requires the child to remain out beyond the curfew hours. B. Returning home from an educational, religious or nonprofit activity which can be verified by the parent, guardian, custodian or

other responsible person. C. Engaged in an emergency errand or acting in a case of reasonable necessity and of such urgency that the parent, guardian, custodian, or other responsible person is unable to accompany the child. In such cases, the parent, guardian, custodian or other responsible person should

be able to verify. 2. A. It shall be unlawful for a parent, guardian or custodian to fail to respond to any notification by a law enforcement officer to take custody of a child, unless reasonably hindered

B. A child shall commit a first offense upon the second violation of this ordinance. For such first offense, and for any subsequent offenses, a child upon conviction shall be fined in the Municipal Court in the City of Bogata, Texas.

C. A parent, guardian or custodian shall commit a first offense upon the second violation by a child. For such first offense, and for any subsequent offenses, a parent, guardian or custodian upon conviction shall be fined in the Municipal-pal Court of the City of Bogata,

D. Jurisdiction for violations of this ordinance shall be in the Municipal Court in th City of Bogata, Texas.

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED that a priority be declared and this ordinance become effective at 12:00 midnight on the 8th day of

November, 2000. APPROVED, PASSED AND ADOPTED on the first reading on this the 23rd day of October, 2000.
