# Country Cooking

Well, it seems that the inevitable is upon us. Another year is quickly coming to an end and you know what that means! Santa is coming to town...and Santa always likes sweet treats! I looked and looked and came up with some really great candy recipes for everyone...I hope you will like them!

Did you know that the idea of a sweet treat was first invented by the cavemen who ate honey from bee hives?

During ancient times, the Egyptians, the Arabs and the Chinese prepared confections of fruit and nuts candied in honey.

In Europe during the Middle Ages, the high cost of sugar made sugar candy a delicacy available only to the wealthy.

Boiled sugar candies were enjoyed in the 17th century in England and in the American Colonies.

Candy is made simply by dissolving sugar in water. The different heating levels determine the types of candy. Hot temperatures make hard candy, medium heat will make soft candy and cool temperature will make chewy candy.

Sweet-making developed rapidly into an industry during the early nine-

teenth century through the discovery of sugar beet juice and the advance of mechanical appliances. Homemade hard candies, such as peppermints and lemon drops become popular in America during that time.

By the mid-1800's, over 300 American factories were producing candy, primarily "penny candy", which was sold loose from glass cases in general stores.

Today, Americans consume 11.8 pounds of sugar candy per capita each year.

Okay, now that is your history lesson...or should I say...candy lesson for the week.

We hope you enjoy these recipes, check out the candy table at the bottom and **WE WILL SEE YOU IN THE KITCHEN!**

Temperatures and Test for Candy		
230-234 degrees	thread	syrup dropped from spoon spins 2-inch thread
234-240 degrees	soft stage	syrup can be shaped into a ball but flattens when removed from water
244-248 degrees	firm ball	syrup forms ball till pressed between fingers
250-266 degrees	hard ball	syrup forms hard ball, although is pliable
270-290 degrees	soft crack	syrup separates into threads that are not brittle
300-310 degrees	hard crack	syrup separates into hard, brittle threads

**Golden Fudge**-I know that everyone has their favorite fudge recipe, but here is one that has a variety of different ingredients to make seven varieties!

**Nutty Clusters**-these are very addictive...but you can't eat just one!

**Rudolph's Antlers**-let the kids help you make these...they are simple and not such a mess to bother with!

**Christmas Turtle Candies**-these make great Christmas gifts for anyone! The recipe calls for shortening, I like to use a quarter of a square of paraffin instead melted with the chocolate chips!

**Almond Brittle**-just like peanut brittle, but with a little different taste!

**Snow Candy**-it probably won't snow on Christmas...but we can dream can't we?

## Thursday, November 16, 2000 Candy Recipes

### Golden Fudge

1 cup evaporated milk or whipping cream  
1/2 cup water  
1/4 cup light corn syrup  
3 tablespoons butter  
3 cups granulated sugar  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1 teaspoon vanilla

Butter an 8-inch baking pan and set aside. In heavy 4-quart saucepan, combine milk, water, corn syrup, butter, sugar and salt. Place over medium-high heat and stir with a wooden spoon until mixture comes to a boil. If sugar crystals are present, wash clean sides of pan with a wet pastry brush. Clip candy thermometer, stirring constantly, cook to 238 degrees (115C) or soft-ball stage. Remove from heat. Without stirring, pour vanilla over mixture. Leaving thermometer in the pan, cool mixture to 110F (45C). Remove thermometer. Using wooden spoon, stir mixture for several minutes until it starts to thicken and loses its gloss. Scrape into prepared pan. Refrigerate 4 hours or until firm. For varieties add:

**Cherry**-Cut 32 candied cherries in half. Mark fudge into 1-inch pieces. While fudge is still warm, place cherry half on top of candy.

**Nut**-Stir in 1 cup walnuts, pecans or peanuts before pouring fudge into pan.

**Cherry-Nut**-Stir in 1/2 cup chopped candied cherries and 1/2 cup chopped nuts before pouring into pan.

**Coconut**-Stir in 3/4 cup coconut before pouring into pan.

**Pineapple-Coconut**-Stir in 1/3 cup candied pineapple, 1/2 teaspoon pineapple extract and 1/2 cup coconut before pouring fudge into pan.

**Lemon or Orange**-Stir in 1 teaspoon lemon or orange extract and 4 drops food coloring before pouring fudge into pan.

### Nutty Clusters

6 squares chocolate almond bark  
1/2 cup semi-sweet chocolate morsels  
2 tablespoons peanut butter  
2 cups peanuts or mixed nuts

Combine chocolate almond bark, chocolate morsels and peanut butter in heavy saucepan. Cook over low heat, stirring occasionally until melted. Pour nuts in; stir well. Drop by tablespoons onto waxed paper. Freeze for a few minutes and set quickly. Store in a tightly covered container in the refrigerator. Makes 2 dozen pieces.

### Rudolph's Antlers

1 cup semi-sweet chocolate chips  
1/2 cup butterscotch chips  
3 ounce can chow mein noodles  
12 marachino cherries-halved

Melt chocolate and butterscotch pieces together in a medium saucepan over low heat; stir occasionally. Remove from heat and stir in noodles. Using two teaspoons, on waxed paper-lined cookie sheet, shape about 1 tablespoon of mixture into v-shape cookie to resemble antlers. Chill for 1-2 hours until firm. Store in refrigerator in covered container.

### Christmas Turtle Candy

4 ounce pecan halves  
24 individually unwrapped caramels  
1 teaspoon shortening  
1 cup semi-sweet chocolate chips

Preheat oven to 300 degrees. Cover cookie sheet with aluminum foil, shiny side exposed. Lightly grease foil with vegetable spray. Place pecan halves in a "Y" shape on foil. Place a caramel in the center of each "Y". Bake just until caramels is melted, about 9-10 minutes. Heat melted shortening and chocolate over low heat just until chocolate is melted. Spread over candies and refrigerate for 30 minutes.

### Almond Brittle

1 cup sugar  
1/2 cup light corn syrup  
1/2 cup water  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
1 tablespoon butter or margarine  
1 cup whole unblanched almonds or peanuts  
1 teaspoon baking soda

Combine sugar, syrup, water, salt and butter in large saucepan. Cook, stirring constantly, until sugar dissolves. Cover pan for 1 minute and allow steam to wash down the sugar crystals that cling to the sides of the pan or wipe down with damp cloth. Uncover pan, insert candy thermometer. Cook without stirring until candy thermometer reaches 270 degrees (soft-crack stage). Remove from heat; stir in almonds; return to heat. Continue cooking until thermometer reaches 300 degrees (hard crack stage). Remove from heat and stir in baking soda. Let foaming syrup settle just a bit, then quickly pour out onto a well-buttered large cookie sheet and stretch out as thin as possible with the aid of two forks. Cool completely and break into pieces. Store 2-3 weeks tightly in covered containers. Separate layers with plastic wrap.

### Snow Candy

1 pound white bark candy  
1 pound salted nuts  
2 cups crispy rice cereal

Melt candy in a double broiler. Add nuts and cereal. Mix well. Spoon onto waxed paper. Refrigerate until firm. Break into pieces; store in air-tight containers.

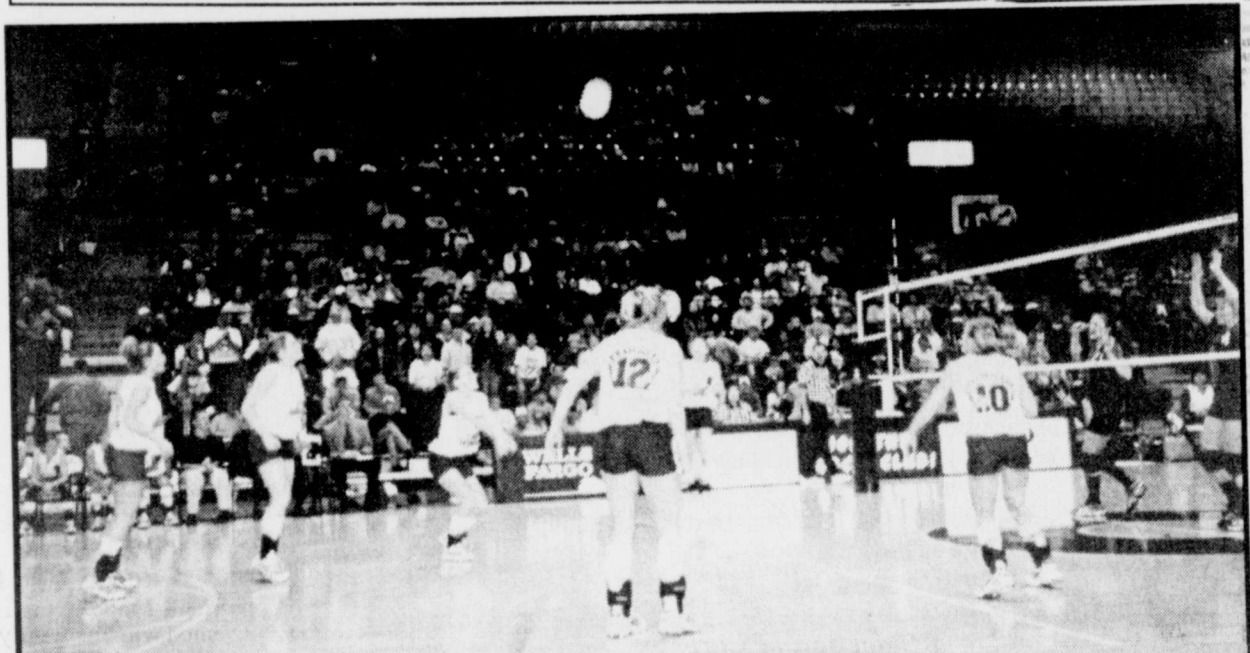

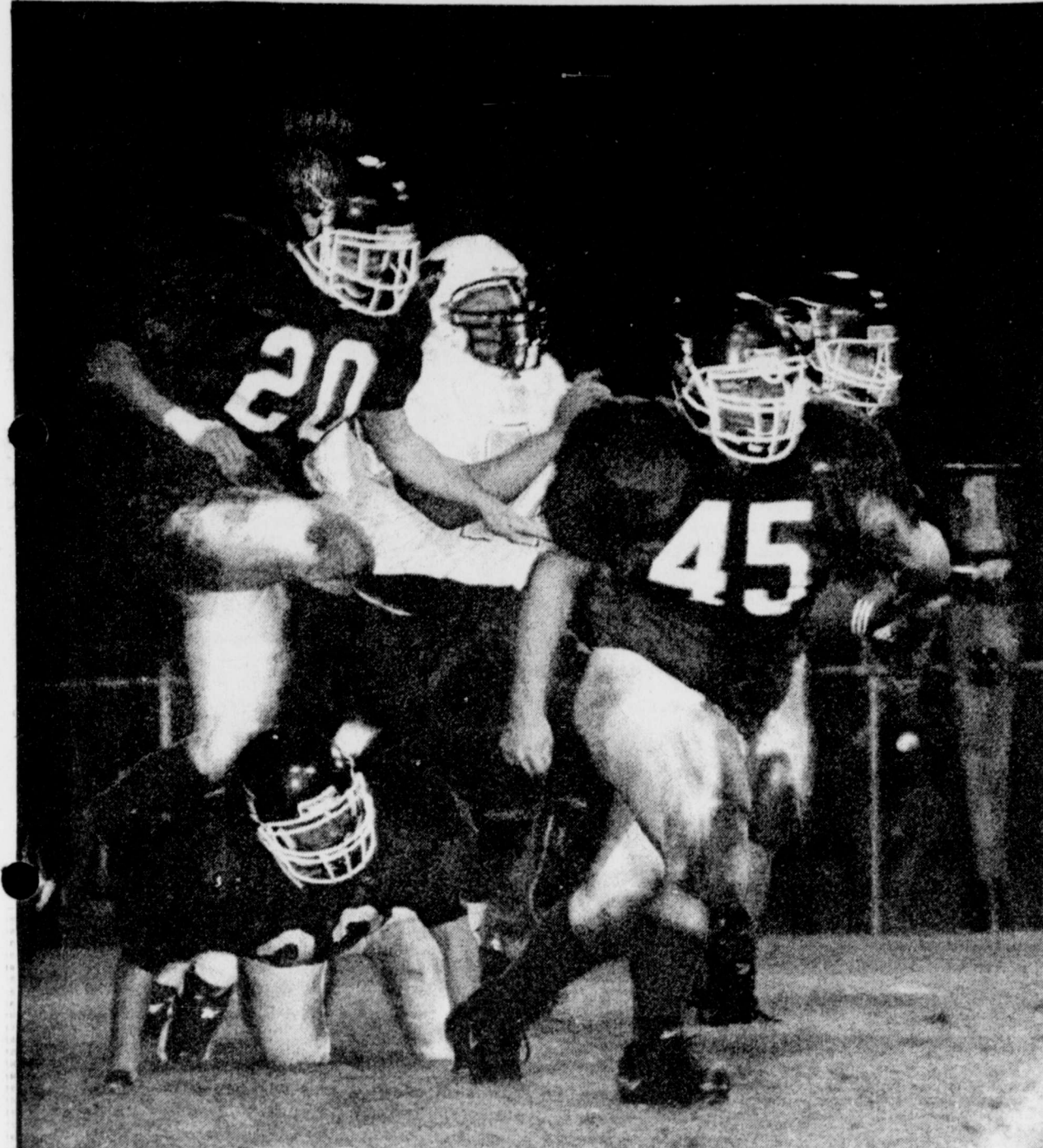
