



The article in part says:

Monard Gregg, founder of the former Gregg Grocery and Market, the first black-owned grocery store in Oak Cliff, died at the age of 97.

"I don't think t he community would have survived without him" said Rose Pounders, his granddaughter-in-law.

Born September 10, 1903 in Deport, Texas, Mr. Gregg was a longtime resident of Oak Cliff and was known as a strong contributor to his community and as an entrepreneur with a vision.

"He was humble and very soft spoken and had a presence about him

that commanded respect" Mrs. Pounders said.

Mr. Gregg and his wife, Willie, Garrett Gregg, owned Gregg Grocery and Market on South Corinth Street for more than 35 years until they began to lease the store. The store, now named Mr. Cut Price, remains in his family's hands.

In 1957 The Dallas Star Post recognized the store as one of Dallas' "Best Black businesses". A year later Mr. Gregg was recognized as one of the city's most successful business-

The couple, who married in 1923, celebrated their 70th wedding anniversary before Mrs. Gregg died in

This is one of those columns that is a little "off the wall". . .so to speak. Fried Dill Pickles! Whoever heard of these...not me until a few weeks ago! In Arkansas and Mississippi, they are considered quite a dish!

Well, I began my search for recipes and this is what I came up with. They are really deep-fried dill pick-les and you dip them in ranch dressing or other dipping sauces!

Guess what else I found out a bout pickles? Pickle history began some-times around 2030 BC, when in habitants of Northern India brought cucumber seeds to the Tigris Valley. Soon, the cucumber vines were sprouting throughout Europe. Shortly thereafter, people learned to preserve fruits of their labor by pickling them in a salty brine. By the 17th century, the crunchy pickled cucumber had made its debut in the New World. Early colonists grew so fond of them, that in 1820, Nicholas Appert constructed the first pickle plant in America.

Did you know that America was named after the first pickle peddler. . .Amerigo Vespucci. He was a ships chandler, outfitting vessels scheduled for long explorations with vitamin Cpacked pickled vegetables. . . particularly cucumbers. . . to prevent scurvy among the crew members.




Percy H. Topping dies January 9
