Area schools salute Future Farmers of America FFA...Future Farmers of
America..area schools will be cel-
ebrating National FFA Week on Febebrating National FFA Week on Feb-
ruary $19-25$ with various geared for their particular campus. geared for their particular campus.
FFA has a rich history and strong traditions. Its past is a solid foundation for today's FFA. Many things have changed in more than 70 years,
but the organization's founding principles are still solid.
The idea fir forming a national or-
ganization for agriculture students was ganization for agriculture students was
sparked in 1917 when Congress passed the Nationakl Vocational Education Act. This act, known as the
Smith-Hughes Act,created vocational agriculture classes throughout the country.
In the e
In the early 1920 's, the state of
Virginia formed ersclub for boys in agriculture classes. Henry Groseclose, an agriculture instructor from Blackburg, Virginia, or-
ganized the Future Farmers of Vi ganized the Future Farmers of Vir-
ginia and is commonly father of the FFA. It was not long bewfore Future Farmers' clubs wer springing up across the country. (In
states where schools were segregated states where schools were segregated
by law, New Farmers' Cclubs werre can students.)
In 1926, the American Royal Live-
stock Show in Kansas City, Missouri, stock Show in Kansas City, Missouri,
invited vocational agriculture students invited vocationalagriculture students
to compete in livestock judging contests. Two yers late, the students
formed the Future Farmers of America to provide leadership training for farm boys. While in Kansas City for the
American Royal, 33 delegates from 18 sttes met at the Hotel Baltimore and formally launched the organiza-
tion in November 1928. National dues were set at 10 cents per member Leslie Applegate of Freehold, New
Jersey, was the first national FFA president. The first national FFA advisor was Dr. C. H. Lane.
The National FFA Organization
started life as Future Farmers of started life as Future Farmers of
America. This name was used forthe organization's first 60 years. Student leaders voted to change the offical name to the National FFA Organization during the 1988 National FFA Convention. This current name re-
spects the organization's roots while spects the organization's roots whic
reflecting the science, business and technology of agriculture.
The FFA Code of Ethic

room. The law also allows staff member from the U.S. Department of Education to serve as the national FFA caddvisors.

The first federal charter was part of PublicLaw 740, passed by Congress
in 1950 Today, the organization's federal charter is part of Public Law 105-225.
Members dress in the FFA blue corduroy jacket that was born in the 1930s. Dr. Gus Lintner, then adviso 1930s. Dr. GusLintner, then advisor Ohio, was looking for a uniform for
