So, this week we had to publish early because of the six of us working on Tuesdays and Wednesdays, four of us have to take a State Test for our First Responder certification. When we discovered the test would be on a Wednesday it didn't bother me...big deal, just this once we'll publish early. But as the date has gotten closer and closer I've become more and more jumpy! I'm not particularly worried about the test ... just about publishing early.

But it just isn't right. It doesn't FEEL right to be doing this without a holiday!


I suppose the next thing I'll get upset about is when they don't have my favorite brand of cooking oil or furniture polish?

Send us your waste pesticides, old batteries and motor oil

You can't get rid of unused pesticides, pesticide containers, car batteries, used motor oil and filters at the city landfill, but the upcoming East Texas Pesticide Roundup will take them all off your hands.

Set at April 5, from 8:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m., at Helena Chemical and Rozell Spraying Manufacturing Co. in Tyler 3 1/2 miles West of Loop 323 on Highway 64 across from Tyler Pounds Field Airport, the Pesticide Roundup is free and voluntary and open to anyone who applies pesticides for the production of agricultural products in Texas, says Brial Triplett, Smith county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"The purpose of the cleanup campaign is to offer rural areas disposal and recycling opportunities for farm and ranch wastes and recyclables. This program provides pesticide applicators the opportunity to dispose of unwanted pesticides at no expense to participants, with no questions asked," Triplett said.

Disposal of old pesticides can be an expensive proposition. The commercial cost for one 55-gallon drum of pesticide would be as high as \$1,500 to \$2,000 at a commercial facility, Triplett said.

There are few stipulations for drop-

ping off chemicals at the Pesticide Roundup. Pesticide containers must be clean, triple-rinsed or high-pressure rinsed to be accepted. There is a two-drum limit per participant on oil filtering recycling. Filters will not be accepted from businesses that change oil for a fee.


banned pesticides, will be accepted in any amount with two exceptions. Pesticides or herbicides containint 2,4,5-T, also known as Silvex, will not be

accepted. Pesticide mixtures, pesticides or wood preservatives containing pentachlorophenol will not be accepted in quantities of five gallons or more.

The Pesticide Roundup will not accept automobile tires, explosives, compressed gas cylinders, fertilizers and animal waste.

The East Texas Pesticide Roundup is part of a statewide effort officially known as Agricultural Waste Pesticide and Texas Country Cleanup Collections, which is cosponsored by the Texas Natural Resources Conservation Commission's (TNRCC) Small Business and Environmental Assistance Division, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the Texas Department of Agriculture, the Ag Container Recycling Council and USAg Recycling. Since 1991, 21,400 participants have disposed of 3.25 million pounds of pesticides and 7.9 million pounds of recyclables through collections such as the East Texas Pesticide Roundup. Our recipes this week will feature the lemon. This sour, high acid fruit is used not only for cooking, but has a host of other uses. They include medicines, perfumes, oils, cleaning agents, and much, much more.

Do you know where the lemon originated? Well, the true lemon is unknown, although some have linked it to northwestern India. It is supposed to have been introduced into southern Italy around 200 A.D. and to have been cultivated in Iraq and Egypt by 700 A.D. It reached Sicily before 1000 and China between 760 and 1297 A.D. Arabs distributed it widely in the Mediterranean region between 1000 and 1150 A.D.

Christopher Columbus carried lemon seeds to Hispaniola in 1493. They were grown in California in the years 1751-1768. Lemons were reported planted in Florida in 1839. Not until 1953 was interest in lemon growing revived in Central Florida to take advantage for the demand of frozen concentrate and for natural cold-pressed lemon oil. At that time Florida was importing lemons from Italy for processing. Planting grew to 8,700 acres by 1975.

Arizona developed lemon or-

chards, though on a smaller scale from California. California and Ari-

zona have become the leading sources of lemons in the western hemisphere. Among the world's leading exporters are Spain, Greece, Turkey, Cy-

press, Lebanon, South Africa and Australia Hope you have enjoyed this little

lesson on the lemon tree and hope you enjoy the recipes below and we will see you in the kitchen!
