Twelve people from this area joined about sixty others in Mt. Pleasant last Wednesday to take their Emergency Medical Services tests.

I had studied. I knew my material. I knew my book. My weak spots (respiration rates, figuring burn percentages) I had gone over until I literally was doing them in my sleep.

I walked in that classroom pretty cocky. Then, when the door shut and our instructor announced it was time to start, I nearly froze. First thing, after being told about four times NOT to write in the test book, I did. I marked my first answer down in that book, instead of on the handy-dandy scan-tronic sheet. The moment I realized what an idiot I had been, sweat popped out on my forehead. I immediately corrected my error, but it totally shredded my confidence. I'll also be getting a bill for the test booklet, hope that isn't too expensive!

But as I plowed through the questions my palms kept on sweating. Did I know what I was doing? Were these really the correct answers? Of course they were right...weren't they?

Then I hit my first question that I truly wasn't sure about. I passed it over, answered the rest on that page and went back to it. Finally, I thought it through and answered, cor-

rectly, I hope. Then I plodded onward. My teeth hurt, I had them clenched so tightly. There was a palpable aura of tension floating over that room. If misery loves company, there was plenty of it in that particular location. Of course, the Paramedics had four hours of this torture as

opposed to our paltry one hour. Twice more I bounced off of questions that I just wasn't sure about. Twice more I made my best guess and passed on.

But after getting out of there, we all were chattering, moaning, comparing answers and complaining. I realized it had been years since I had been required to test for something where the grade really counted!

To cap it off, although our scores won't be posted, whether we passed or failed will be on the Texas Department of Health's EMS website. Wouldn't it be humiliating to have failed and have the whole state be able to see it?

But, we only had about four to seven days of waiting...we thought.

For now it seems that TDH had a little problem with their answer keys....and those who took this test after March 23rd learned that "grading of tests is expected to resume soon". That means our test results are on HOLD!!! Ahhhhh, the suspense is killing me! Remind me to have more sympathy for students, I had forgotten what they go through!

VA gets frequently asked questions

Editor's Note: Following are typical questions answered daily by VA counselors. Full information is available at any VA office. April 2001

Q: Ive heard about disabled veterans getting extra money for their families. I have two children at horne. Can I get an increase in my disability pay?

A: Disabled veterans can receive extra money from the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) for family members. There are several rules

that must be followed. First, the vererans disability must be officially recognized by VA as service connected. Second, VA must determine the disability is at least 30 percent. Third, the family member must meet certain requirements.

Among the requirements for chil-dren are that the child must be under 18 years of age, or under 23 years if still in school, or of any age if the child became disabled before reaching the 18th birthday.

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O: Is it true that money can be deducted from Social Security checks if a veteran owes money to the VA?

A: When veterans receive overpayments of their VA benefits or theyre responsible for co-paymen for medical care and they do no make the required payments, VA is legally obligated to turn the debts over to the Treasury Department, which then withholds the money from other federal payments.

Among the sources from which money can be withheld are income tax refunds and federal retired pay. Social Security withholdings began this year. Veterans will always receive the first \$750 of each months Social Security payment. Only 15 percent of the amount greater than \$750 can be withheld. Veterans will be notified several times before any withholdings are made. People can avoid the withholding by voluntarily settling their debts.

Q: Does VA provide health car for veterans with AIDS?

A: Veterans with HIV (the Human Immonunodeficiency Virus) and AIDS (Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome) are treated like veterans with any other health problem.

All are eligible to enroll in VAs health-care system. They may have to make co-payments for treatments and medication unless they qualify for VA disability compensation or their income falls below a certain level known as the means-test thresh-

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
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

Happy Easter everyone! With Easter just a few days away, I thought you might like to try some of these egg recipes. Not only will they be great for the kids, but you can also use up some of those hard boiled eggs that are left over!

Before we get started though, here are some things you might not know about Easter!

Easter falls on the first Sunday on or following the Spring Equinox after the full moon. The date has been calculated in this way since 325 A.D. Lambs, chicks and baby creatures

are all associated with Spring, symbolizing a new life.

Since ancient times, many cultures have associated eggs with the universe. They have been dyed, decorated and painted by Romans, Gaul's Persians and the Chinese. They were used in Spring festivals to represent the rebirth of life. As Christianity took hold, the egg began to symbolize the rebirth of man rather than

Polish folktales tells of the Virgin Mary giving eggs to soldiers at the cross as she pleaded with them to be merciful. As her tears dropped they spattered droplets on the eggs mottling them with a myriad of colors.

The Faberge egg is the best known of all the decorated eggs. Peter Faberge made intricate, delicately decorated eggs. In 1883, the Russian Czar commissioned Faberge to make a special egg for his wife.

During the 4th century, consuming eggs during Lent became taboo. However, Spring is the peak egg laying time for hens, so people began to cook eggs in their shells to preserve them. Eventually people began to decorate them and hiding them for children to find during Easter! This gave birth to the Easter Egg Hunt.

Other egg-related games also evolved like egg tossing and egg rolling.

The Easter Bunny, is a cute little rabbit that hides eggs to find on Easter. In the rites of Spring, the rabbit symbolizes fertility. In a German book, 1682, a tale is told of a bunny laying eggs and hiding them in the

The Easter bonnet and new clothes for Easter symbolizes the end of a dreary winter and the beginning of the fresh, new Spring. At the run of the century, it was popular to stroll to church on Sunday with your family and home again to "show off" their Sunday best.

The Easter Basket shows roots in a Catholic custom. Bakets filled with breads, cheeses, hams and other foods for Easter dinner were taken to mass on Easter morning to be blessed. This evolved into baksets filled with chocolate eggs, jellybeans, toys, stuffed bunnies and other "goodies" for children to be left behind by the Easter Bunny.

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



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
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Prairiland Livestock Show is successful


