





Heel Spur Surgery

Advances in heel spur surgery have led to fewer complications, less scarring, and quicker recovery times for patients. Heel spurs, bony growths that develop on the heel bone near the foot's arch, are a common cause of heel pain. They can occur due to highimpact exercises like running, excess weight, arthritis and poorly fitting shoes. One new surgery involves removing the spur via a tiny transverse incision on the bottom of the heel just before the arch. The podiatrist then closes the wound and places a dry, sterile dressing on the foot. No stitches, casts, splints or post operative shoes are required. Patients may choose to insert an orthotic device in their shoe to support the foot after
