Clothing, offers of aid, money and food began to pour

A list of sizes for the family was available from the school at Detroit almost immediately.

At the Deport Fire Department garage sale Saturday a bucket was set out at the checkout table explaining the family's loss. Immediately people began putting their change into the container.

One family read the bucket's note and carefully handed over a one hundred dollar bill!

A man read the label and tears came to his eyes. He reached into his wallet and pulled out all the bills he had left in it to add to the growing stack of money.

People from the fire departments that were at the blaze went home to have their families go through their household goods. In all the towns around people began to reach into their pockets find things

in their homes to send. As one family member said "I can't say thank you enough. As we try to get through this we are given offers of every kind of help over and over again. So many people want to help it's just unbelievable".

There, once more, shines the light that keeps us all toiling on through troubles and sorrows. That offer of help, that lending of strength, that vibrant desire to do whatever can be done to help pull a family out of the depths of despair to where they can function once more and go forward.

Of course the one thing this family wants and needs more than anything is the one thing no one can give them. There is no way to return their most precious possession to them. But, we can help, all of us, by sharing our goods, our money, or faith with them.

And we do that. Oh, yes we do. And that proves that as humans we are more good than bad, more generous than not, more loving than uncaring. So do not be of little faith. Have faith in human kind. It is not misplaced.

Apple Streusel Cake cup light brown sugar cup chopped apples cup chopped nuts

1/4 cup flour teaspoon ground cinnamon tablespoons melted butter cups flour

I teaspoon baking powder I teaspoon baking soda I/2 cup butter-softened 1/2 cup granulated sugar

large eggs 1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract 1/3 cup orange juice 1/2 cup confectioner's sugar

2-1/2 teaspoons orange juice
Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Combine first six ingredients and set aside. Combine flour, baking powder and baking soda; mix well. In large bowl, using electric mixer, beat butter and sugar until light and fluffy. Add eggs, one at a time and beat well after each addition. Add vanilla. Alternately beat flour mixture and orange juice into egg mixture. Spoon half of batter into tube pan. Sprinkle half of streusel on top of this. Spoon remaining batter over steusel and spread to make even layer. Swirl batter with knife to create marble effect. Bake for 15 minutes. Remove cake and sprinkle top with remaining streusel. Return cake to oven; bake until toothpick comes out clean. Cool completely.

Combine confectioner's sugar and or-

ange juice.Drizzle over top of cake.

Chocolate Cake Roll 1/3 cup cake flour 1/3 cup unsweetened cocoa 2 tablespoons cornstarch 1/2 teaspoon baking soda 1/2 teaspoon baking powder 1/3 teaspoon salt 4 large eggs-sparated

cup granulated sugar-divided confectioner's sugar 8 ounces Cool Whip

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Line 15x10 jelly roll pan with waxed paper. Spray with Pam. Combine first 6 ingredients and mix well. In separate bowl, using electric mixer, beat egg yolks and 1/4 cup sugar until fluffy. Beat egg whites in separate bowl until foamy. Gradually add 1/2 cup sugar and beat until stiff, but not dry. Fold in 1/3 beaten egg whites into egg yolk mixture. Alternately fold in remaining whites and flour mixture. Pour batter in pan; smooth top. Bake about 15 minutes or until toothpick comes out clean. Dust cake with remaining sugar. Turn cake out onto prepared cloth; remove paper. Trim edges. Starting with long side, tightly roll up cake with cloth. Transfer cake seamside down to wire rack to cool. Unroll cake; remove cloth. Spread Cool Whip over cake within 1/2-inch of edges. Re-roll cake; place seamside down on plate. Dust with confectioner's

Ultimate Cheesecake 1-1/2 cups graham cracker crumbs 2 tablespoons sugar V4 cup butter-melted

5-8 ounce packages cream cheese 3 tablespoons flour

3 large eggs 1/2 cup sour cream 2 teaspoons finely grated lemon peel

1-1/2 teaspoons vanilla l egg white

I tablespoon sugar 1/2 cup sour cream 1/2 cup raspberry preserves 1/2 cup apricot preserves

cup assorted fresh fruit-chopped Preheat oven to 325. Combine crumbs, sugar and butter; stir to blend. Press mixture in springform pan and chill for 30 minutes. Beat cream cheeses for 2 minutes and add 1-1/3 cups sugar. Gradually add flour; mix until combined. On low speed beat eggs, one at a time until just blended. Add sour cream, lemon peel and vanilla; beat until just blended. Pour into crust. Bake for one hour and fifteen minutes. Remove cake from oven and let cool. Meanwhile, beat egg white until frothy and add sugar and beat until soft peak forms. Fold in sour cream until blended. Spread on top of cake. Return cake to oven and bake until topping is set; not browned, for about 20 minutes. Turn off oven and let cake set for I hour with oven ajar. Place cake on wire rack to cool completely. Place preserves in microwave to thin. Spread each topping on half of cake in desired design. Arrange fresh

fruit on top.

Edible Cookie Bowl 1-1/4 cups flour 1/2 cup cocoa powder 1/4 cup blanched slivered almonds 1/2 teaspoon salt

4 tablespoons butter-softened 2/3 cup sugar

1/2 teaspoon vanilla

Cover outside of loaf pan or other oven-proof bowl of your choice, with foil. Spray with Pam. Combine flour, cocoa, almonds and salt in medium bowl; set aside. In large bowl, beat butter, sugar and egg and vanilla until light and fluffy. Add flour mixture; beat until dough forms. Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Roll dough out to 1/8inch thickness. Using 1-1/2-inch cookie cutter with scalloped edges, cut out shapes. Cover pan with cutouts, overlapping and pressing them slightly Bake until edges are firm about 15 minutes. Transfer pan to wire rack and cool completely. Carefully lift off the foil-lined pan and remove foil. Fill with cookies or other treats




