Deport City council discusses water bill policy, street paving

The Deport City council agreed with Alan Vanderburg of Hayter Engineering and voted unanimously to pay Online Construction 420,804.71 for materials used on he water grant project for the city.

All council members present agreed to pay for a service of three HEPB injections for city employee Charles Reavis. The shots will cost \$102.00 per shot.

Councilman Mike Francies reported on checking with the city's attorney in regard to enforcing city ordinances concerning lots and structures in the city that need to be cleaned up. Certified letters are being sent to property owners.

Francies also addressed the issue of

putting oil vort on Fourth Street. The council voted approximately a year ago to resurface the street, but weather and lack of materials has postponed the project. Francies stressed the need to move forward and get the street oiled as soon as possible.

City Secretary Sharon Frances announced that there will be no more late notices sent on water bills. All bills are due on the 10th of the month. If bills are not paid within ten days they will be disconnected and a \$20 reconnect fee will be charged before water service can be turned back on.

Water Bill Policy to be enforced

The City of Deport water bill policy is: all water bills are due on the 10th of the month. If they are not paid by the 20th of each month, service will be disconnected and a reconnect charge of \$20 will be paid by the customer.

No second notices will be sent. If you plan on being out of town for any extended length of time, please contact city office at 652-3875 to let the city secretary know how to handle your account and avoid termination of services.

Blossom native earns respect through research

Most people find mosquitoes to be a nuisance, a bother -hardly worth the energy necessary to swat the small insect. However, Jasper Clarkson has found the six-legged creature to be nothing short of fascinating.

Clarkson, a recent graduate of Southern Arkansas University, Magnolia, made the insect the focus of his study and paper: Examination of Mosquitoes DNA for Transposable Elements." He presented the paper at the annual meeting of Alpha Chi Honor Society in Savannah, Ga.

Clarkson, a native of Blossom, Texas, arrived at SAU four years ago on a band and academic scholarship. But it was the Chemistry Department that quickly drew his interest.

"I've always been interested in how things work," said Clarkson. Chemistry is a basic science in life. To understand how life works, you have to understand chemistry."

Clarkson has received two SAU research grants as an undergraduate. Both grants allowed him to conduct continuing research on mosquito DNA. He also spent the summer of 2000 on the campus of Mississippi State University, conducting research in analytical chemistry. He presented his findings at the American Chemical Society Southeast/Southwest Combined Regional Meeting in New Orleans in December of 2000.

"That was a big honor to speak at the convention," said Clarkson. "That meeting is only held once every six years."

The son of Randy and Lesa Clarkson of Blossom, Jasper credits much of his success at SAU to Dr.

Rebecca Willis, associate professor of chemistry, Dr. Wayne Suggs, associate professor of chemistry, and Dr. Scott White, assistant professor of chemistry.

"Dr. Willis really helped me out. She showed me a lot of lab techniques and the dedication it requires to work in research science," said Clarkson. "Dr. Suggs taught me a lot, and Dr. White helped me choose a graduate school."

Clarkson will now continue his study at Purdue University, where he received a graduate assistantship. During his first year, Clarkson will work as a teaching assistant, and will then receive a research fellowship in subsequent years at Purdue.

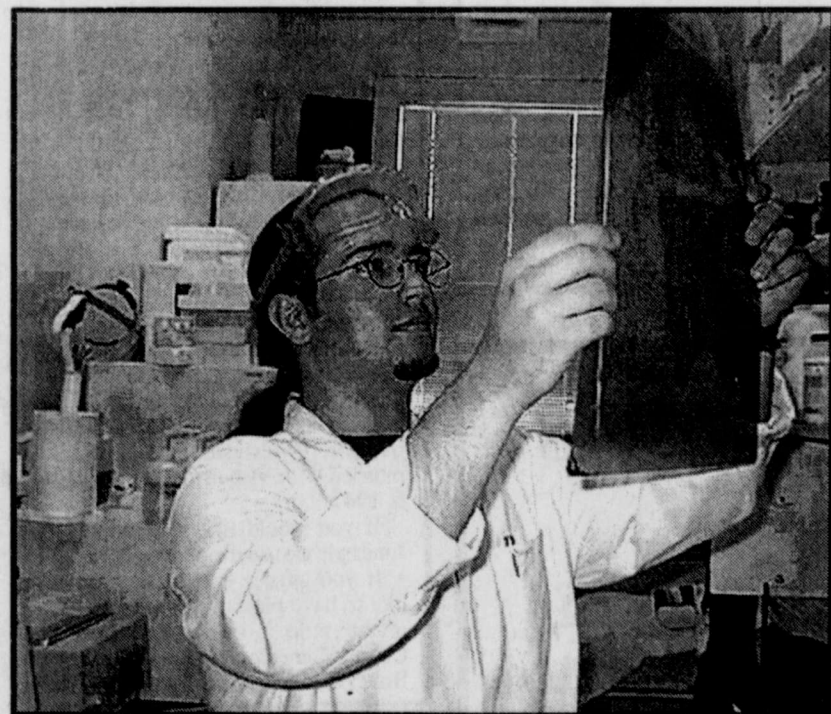
"I'll be studying physical chemistry this summer. In the fall, I'll be taking classes in my major. I won't have to choose an advisor until my second semester, so my options are open."

Clarkson hopes to earn a Ph.D. in research science, which takes about four-five years of study. He then looks forward to working in the field of research.

"I'd like to have my own research group at a major university or work as a research scientist."

Clarkson feels the education he received at SAU provided him with the background necessary for graduate school.

"Southern Arkansas University provided the essentials to be successful," said Clarkson. "There's a lot of interaction with the professors at SAU. That gives the students a chance to learn a lot."

Fried Okra Patties
1 tablespoon vegetable oil
1/2 cup flour
1/2 cup meal
2 eggs
2 tablespoons baking powder
2 cups okra-slice thin
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon pepper
Mix all ingredients except okra and make a batter. Add okra. Drop by spoonful in hot oil and turn one time. Serve hot.

Corn Fritters
1 cup flour
1 teaspoon baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
2 tablespoon sugar
1 egg
1/3 cup milk
1 tablespoon oil
12 ounce can whole kernel corn-drain
Sift flour, measure and resift with next three ingredients. Beat egg, add milk and oil; then add flour mixture and beat until smooth. Fold in drained corn. Let stand 5-10 minutes before frying.

Corn Fingers
3/4 cup margarine
2 cups flour
4 teaspoons baking powder
1 teaspoon salt
2 teaspoons sugar
large can cream-style corn
1/4 cup milk
Melt margarine in 13x9x2 pan in 425 degree oven. Combine remaining ingredients and mix until blended. Turn out on lightly floured board and knead 6 to 8 times. Roll out to form rectangle about 1-inch thick. Cut in 3x3/4-inch strips and roll in margarine and arrange in pan. Bake 20-25 minutes or until well browned.

Eggplant Fritters
1 medium eggplant
6 cups water
1 teaspoon salt
1 cup sugar
1 egg
4-6 tablespoons vanilla
2-1/2 cups flour
4 teaspoon baking powder
Peel eggplant and dice into small cubes; about 1-inch size. Boil with water until dark green and soft; drain. Place in bowl and add sugar; allow to cool 10-15 minutes. Add egg and mix thoroughly; then add vanilla. Sift in flour and baking powder together into eggplant mixture to make batter. Add more or less flour depending on size of eggplant. Batter should be able to drop from spoon into hot oil without being watery, or too doughy. Fry in deep fryer until golden brown.

Fried Cabbage
1-1/2 pounds cabbage
3 strips bacon
1/4 cup vinegar
1 teaspoon sugar
salt and pepper to taste
Shred cabbage medium-fine and set aside. Fry bacon until crisp; drain and break into pieces. Add cabbage to bacon drippings and saute. Stir constantly. Add vinegar, sugar, salt and pepper. Serve immediately with bacon sprinkled on top of cabbage.

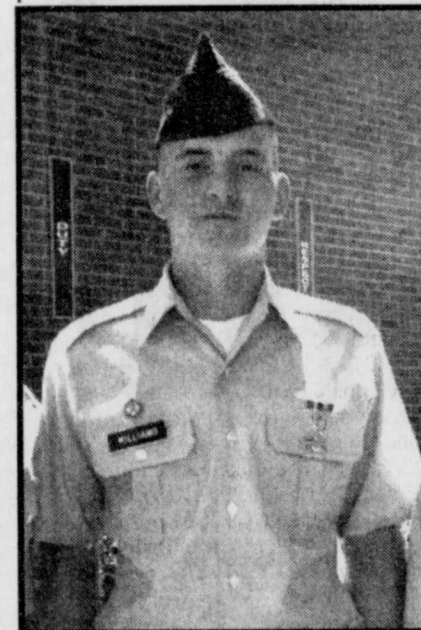

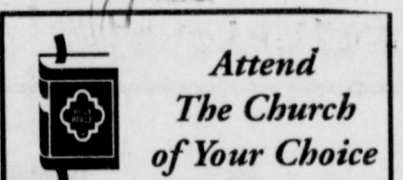

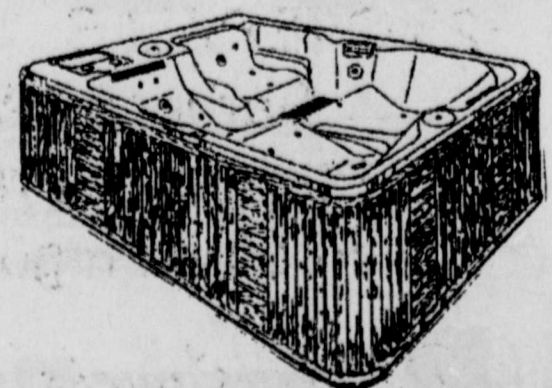

Project SAVE, Models of the Maker receive Christus fund grants

Two Paris agencies, Project SAVE and Models of the Maker, have been named the most recent recipients of the local Christus fund grants totaling more than \$81,000.
 Christus health, parent company of Christus St. Joseph's Health System, created the special mission fund to

assist community-led partnerships in each of the communities it serves in order to achieve measurable, sustainable improvements in well being.
 Project SAVE has been allocated \$34,500 for start up costs for a sexual abstinence program for youth living in facilities of the Paris Housing Authority, while Models of the Maker has been tagged for \$47,048 for the addition of an executive director and housekeeper for a long term residence for homeless women and children as they seek to find permanent housing.
 Models of the Maker, a relatively new faith based organization, provides shelter for homeless women

and as needed, their children. The goal, organizers said, is to empower each woman to find a permanent home.
 Project SAVE, a grant program of the Lamar County Coalition of Education, Business and Industry, is funded by the Texas Department of health. it serves young people of Lamar, Red River and Delta counties. Funds from the Christus health grant will be used to target the five units of the Paris Housing Authority by adding a full time staff person, providing individual and group counseling services and creation of a mentoring program, with leaders selected from a newly formed group for African American leaders within the community.

The Agape House, a non-profit health care program for the poor, was the first local organization to receive financial aid from the Christus Fund. It was awarded \$38,000 last March.

"Learn to Earn" offered at PJC

Paris Junior College will offer a summer youth program, "Learn to Earn", under a grant from the Northeast Texas Workforce Development Board.

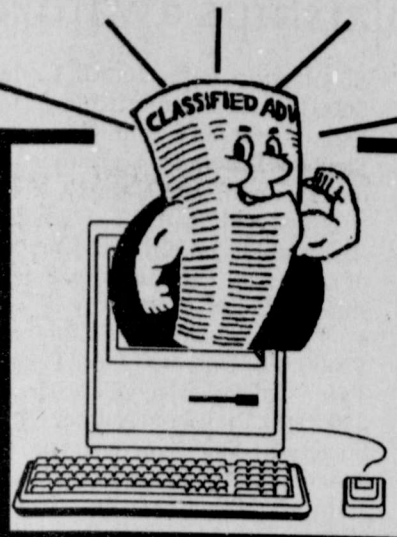

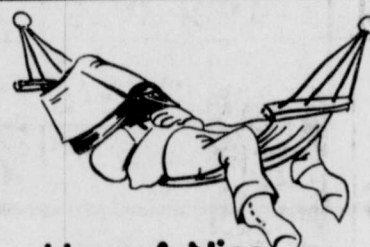
