Thomas and I got to talking about how things have changed over the past few years. Specifically, how things have changed in the farming business since we ceased row cropping.

This all came about because Thomas went to an auction up at Idabel last week. He and his cousin Charles used to go to farm auctions almost as a form of entertainment, but that was many years ago.

Well, he went last Thursday, and came in amazed.

"Everyone has cell phones" he said. "I mean everyone".

He says that people buying for other people were actually doing so while they were in contact by cellular phone.

They would be strolling around, talking to their buyers about makes and models, expected prices and more.

As an item was auctioned the person could report to the buyer what the price was, and see if they wanted to bid or not.

He said the various little trills from various models of cellular phones literally filled the air as other people were calling in to the people at the auc-

Another big difference was transportation. No, I don't mean people still don't come to auctions in their pickup trucks, but that they have trailers behind them. They let down the ramps, back their four wheelers, golf carts or "mules" off and then happily cruise up and down the acres and acres of equipment, writing down auction numbers, scanning bid

sheets and generally not having to work up a sweat hoofing it up and down the aisles of equip-

Of course, everything goes into a computer, and I suppose checks are generated through the computer too.

It's all part of a technology trend that makes itself known in every aspect of life.

I can remember one time I had to drive to Paris for parts five times in one day. Three of those trips could have been avoided with the simple addition of a cell phone. I can remember driving from field to field trying to locate Thomas....a chore that took lots of gas and time. Cell phones have eliminated that, too.

But there is one thing that hasn't changed...that's the frenzy that auctions can evoke, or provoke, depending on your point of view!

Because people get just as caught up in buying and selling, bidding and evaluating as they did way back at the turn of the century when it was horses and mules, not machinery they were bidding on! Some things, I suppose, never change!

Murray Riddles, Diane Minter, Dwain Haggard and Gerald Farmer all submitted their resignations to the board and all were accepted.


The board hired Janice Patterson as a teacher on the Blossom campus. They also hired Trevor Upchurch as Teacher/Coach, subject to assign-



The most popular and the easiest is baked of course. Scrub, butter and bake!....can't get much easier than that. . . and no dirty dishes to clean up! In case you forget to put your potatoes in the oven or on the grill and need a faster way to bake them, try this.
