They would be strolling around, talking to their buyers about makes and models, expected prices and more.

As an item was auctioned the person could report to the buyer what the price was, and see if they wanted to bid or not.

He said the various little trills from various models of cellular phones literally filled the air as other people were calling in to the people at the auction!

Another big difference was transportation. No, I don't mean people still don't come to auctions in their pickup trucks, but that they have trailers behind them. They heard from Mrs. Lemmons

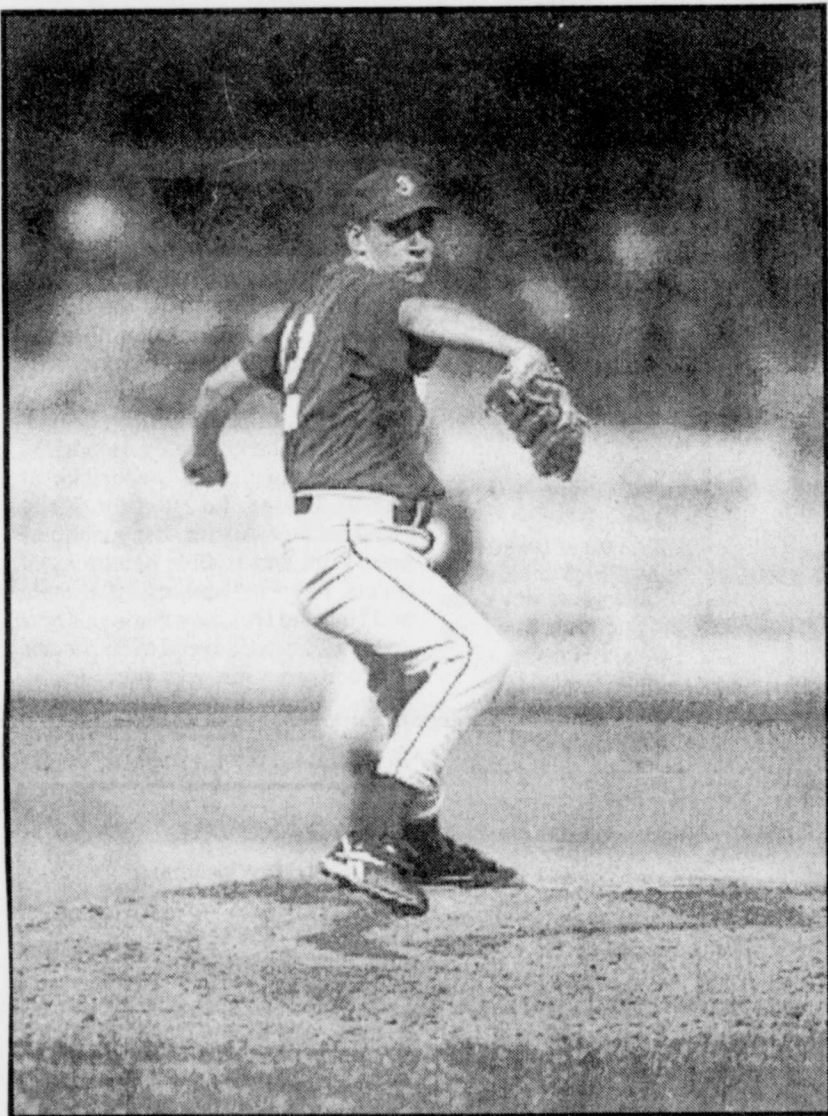
concerning denied transfer request.

After his

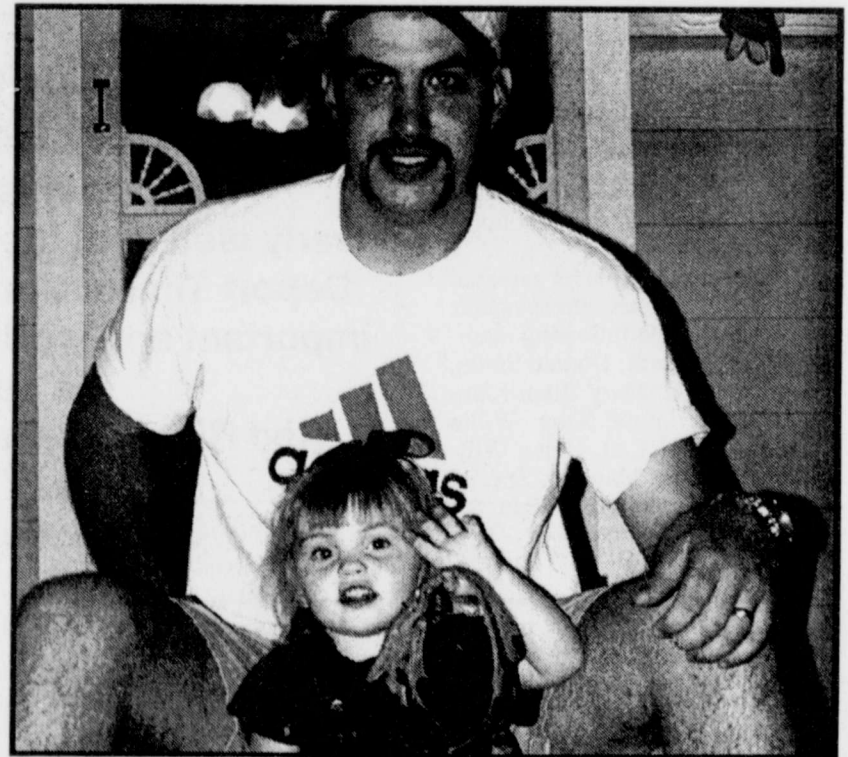

Country Cooking

Potatoes are the basic food for any meal and can be prepared in many ways.

The most popular and the easiest is baked of course. Scrub, butter and bake!...can't get much easier than that. . . and no dirty dishes to clean up! In case you forget to put your potatoes in the oven or on the grill and need a faster way to bake them, try this. Parboil them for five minutes before putting them on to bake or stick an aluminum skewer or an aluminum nail into each potato. Either one of these will speed up the baking process a good fifteen to twenty minutes.

Pricking potatoes with a fork will not make them fresh and flaky, if you let them sit around for awhile before baking. They will become soggy. Actually, the best thing to do with a baked potato is to make it fresh and flaky, it eat it immediately. An even faster way is to pop them in an open small plastic bag in the microwave and bake them. They won't be fresh-

and-flaky-right-out-of-the-oven baked, but they will do.

The following recipes are just some that will give you a little change of pace out of the ordinary. Try some of them and we hope you like them. See you in the kitchen!

Irish Baked Potatoes-Cook and mash them and layer in casserole dish and add your imagination and taste how great!

Fluffy Onion Potatoes-just add onions and butter to these mashed up potatoes and place in casserole dish! Wow!

Mushroom Potatoes-mushroom soup, maybe some bacon bits and butter and delicious!

Fancy Baked Fries-they are not cooked in hot oil, just in othe oven! Great!

Parmesan Potatoes-not for anyone on a diet, but they are delicious!

Twice-Baked Potatoes-these are out of this world, hot and fresh out of the oven!

Potato Recipes

Irish Baked Potatoes
6 baking potatoes
small amount of milk
butter or margarine
1 cup grated cheddar cheese
salt and pepper to taste

Cook and mash potatoes as usual, adding milk, butter and salt and pepper. Place in casserole dish and top with cheese. Bake, uncovered at 350 degrees for fifteen minutes.

Fluffy Onion Potatoes

5 good-sized potatoes
middle-size onion-chopped
small amount of milk
salt and pepper to taste

Cook and mash potatoes and mix in salt and pepper. Saute onion in butter. Add to potato mixture. Place in well-greased casserole dish at 300 degrees for 45 minutes.

Mushroom Potatoes

4 middle-sized potatoes
1 can cream of mushroom soup
1/2 cup milk

Grate potatoes and set aside. Mix soup with milk and heat. Pour over potatoes and bake, uncovered for an hour and a half at 350 degrees.

Fancy Baked French Fries

3 baking potatoes-unpeeled
1/2 stick butter
salt and pepper to taste
season salt to taste

Scrub potatoes and cut into french fries. Place on baking sheet. Melt butter and salt and pepper and brush on potato strips. Bake at 350 degrees for 35 minutes or until done. Sprinkle on season salt or other flavors.

Parmesan Potatoes

4 large peeled potatoes-slice thin
2 cups milk
>1/2 cup heavy cream
1/3 cup grated parmesan
1 teaspoon salt
dash pepper

Place potatoes, milk, salt and pepper in double boiler and cook for thirty minutes. Microwave can be used at lower time. Pour into baking dish and pour on cream and top with Parmesan cheese. Bake at 350 degrees for 20 minutes.

Twice Baked Potatoes

4 medium-sized potatoes
1/2 cup bacon crumbles
1 cup grated cheese
1/2 cup chopped green onion-optional
1/4 cup dry Ranch Dressing Mix
1 stick butter
salt and pepper to taste

Bake potatoes; allow to cool and cut in half, saving shells. Scrape out inside and place in mixing bowl. Chop coarsely. Mix in remaining ingredients. Spoon into shells and place in 350 degree oven for 20-25 minutes until heated throughout. Top with extra cheese. Other ingredients may be added such as diced ham, cooked hamburger, etc. Use your imagination!

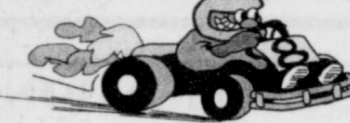

Many times such papers can be found in old trunks or packed away and forgotten in unused drawers. 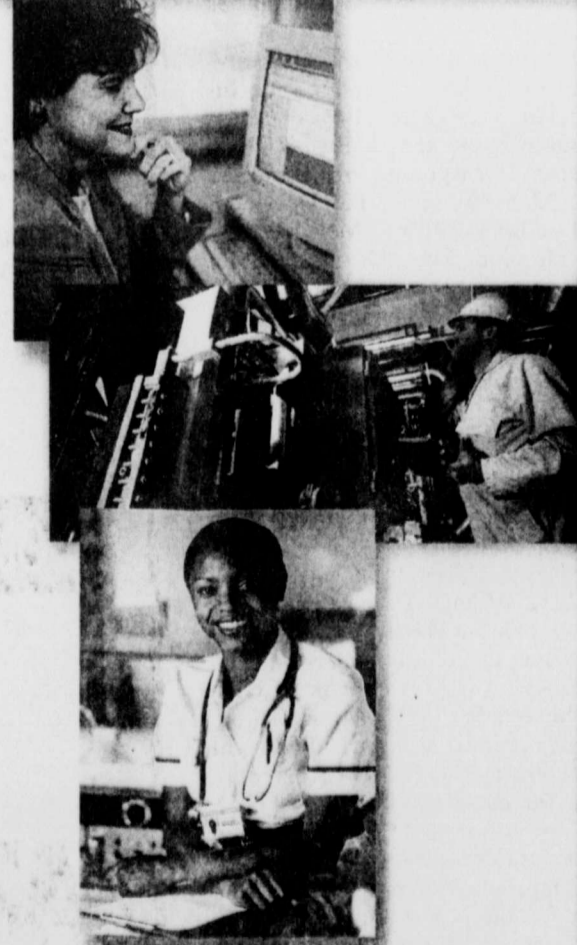

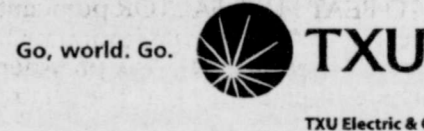

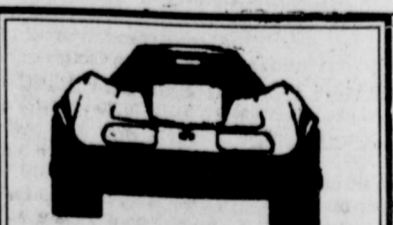
