Deport City council hears from residents

Allen Vanderburg of Hayter Engineering discussed the grant and loan projects now underway in the city. According to Vanderburg On Line Construction is approximately 44% complete at the present time.

Vanderburg also fielded questions from resident Ruth Skaggs concerning the water to her residence being muddy and undrinkable. Mrs. Skaggs stated she has had to replace three ice makers because of the water. Vanderburg assured Mrs. Skaggs there is a loop in the line to avoid this problem and the contractor installing the new main line and fire hydrant to her home is responsible for providing a clean line that will pass the necessary test before the new line is approved.

Council approved a bid from Wesley King of Deport to remove an oak tree at 200 Depot St. for \$780. The tree is hollow and becoming dangerous and in the way of the new main water line.

Consolidated Disposal Service of Sulphur Springs was awarded the contract to remove and land supply 250,000 gallons or more of biosolids form the city's waste water treatment plant lagoon.

The council discussed replacing an aerator at the sewer plant.


Rick Hanning, Distribution Service Consultant with TXU Electric and Gas met with council members and guests to discuss TXU rates and service.

The council heard from Vicki Jeffus and Janette Burks concerning the condition of Fourth street. The city agreed to use an oil and rock mixture to resurface the street as soon as materials could be purchased and the work be done.

They also hired Charles Reavis as Sewer and Water Superintendent.

They also adopted a Rabies Resolution as a state requirement.

A place to burn brush was also discussed. No action was taken at the present time.

Tax Holiday is upcoming

Just in time for back to school shopping, many clothes and shoes can be purchased tax free August 3-5 during Texas' third annual sales tax holiday.

On the first Friday, Saturday and Sunday of August, no state or local sales tax will be charged on most clothing and footwear priced under \$100.00. The holiday provides much needed tax relief for hard working Texas families and lets them stretch their budgets a little farther as they shop for school clothes for the kids and work clothes for mom and dad.

This year, the sales tax holiday is expected to save Texans \$31.2 million in state sales tax and \$8.4 million in local sales taxes. Cities have the option to not waive local sales tax during the tax holiday, but no community has opted out of the event this

Rules for the 2001 sales tax holiday are the same as in previous years.

They include:

Most children's and adults' clothing and footwear priced under \$100 are exempt from sales tax. Customers may purchase as many tax exempt items as they wish.

Clothing and footwear used primarily for athletics or protective wear, such as golf cleats or football pads are not tax exempt. Tennis shoes, baseball caps, jogging suits and other athletic clothes that are commonly worn on the street are eligible for the tax exemption.

Accessories, jewelry, watches, handbags, wallets and briefcases are not tax exempt.

Items previously placed on layaway may be redeemed tax free during the sales tax holiday, and items laced on layaway during the holiday may be redeemed tax free later.

School supplies and backpacks are not tax exempt.

During the first two sales tax holidays in 1999 and 2000, Texans saved an estimated \$69.6 million, including \$54.8 million in state sales tax and \$14.8 million in local sales taxes.
