(I found it interesting to choose that particular incident, since we've done the same thing, bearwise).

Names, names and more ames, the article says. People enjoy finding their names in the paper, they enjoy seeing their photograph in the paper. I would sincerely plead, again, that if people would just call us, we'll take their local news, their visitors, their awards, their ideas...absolutely anything. We love to put your name in the paper! Call 652-4205 or 632-5322 or 982-5829 or 379-4445 and someone will help you. Always remember, I'm right here at 652-4205 almost anytime you want. That's me, personally, in addition to our staff. I like being accessible and it will be a cold, cold day in...well, in July in Texas before you will ever have to deal with a "voice mail system". Leave a message on the answering machine after hours, yes, but we won't subject you to "punch one for ... punch 93 for". The article continued with a number of good ideas, some of which I may try to adapt to the weekly newspapers we publish. But, it was great to hear that we haven't become so faceless that people no longer care about anything but world news, international news or disaster news. After all, we are a part of the world we live in. And these papers are here to serve our part of the world! Call us, keep us informed, help us, please. continue boiling drinking water

The City of Deport has been under enough chlorine in the water. a boil order to boil all drinking water since last Friday, August 10th and as of press time on Wednesday morning, August 15, the order was still in effect. While City Water Superintendent Charles Reavis says his tests show the system is currently showing adequate chlorine levels, one of the samples taken last Friday to be tested by the State Department of Health for various things did not pass. This necessitates leaving the boil order in place until TNRCC can advise the city what needs to be done next.

The original Boil Order was issued by the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission after it was discovered that there was not

A citizen of Deport called TNRCC to complain about their water, and TNRCC state inspector William Stowe came to Deport on Friday and took several samples. The low chlorine level resulted in the boil order being issued. The order requires that customers boil their water vigorously for two minutes, then cool it or purchase bottled water or get water from some other suitable source besides Deport's tap water. City employees and city council members went door to door delivering the information last Friday.

Deport's water comes from Lamar County Water Supply. LCWS buys the water from the City of Paris. it is

treated by the City of Paris, and then further treatment is added at either Blossom or Reno before the water is distributed out into the County.

Lamar County Water spokesman Alton Dockrey says that "the problem is not ours, there is plenty of chlorine in the water when it leaves our station"

According to Hayter Engineering's Alan Vanderburg, who spoke at the Deport City Council meeting Monday night, the low chlorine level could be due to the amount of water line work and water leaks that have occurred recently. The concerned citizen who called TNRCC maintains that they feel the water is frequently substandard, at least in their area.

He says that his wife Catana gives him a lot of support as a volunteer fireman and knows what is involved


