The additional storm Monday night caused some major flooding in Deport, including one vehicle that was literally swept off of Main Street in Deport and received heavy damage, and a pickup truck that received a broken windshield when the driver crossed some water over the road and hit wash out


City employees and Deport Fire Department Members were called out to place barricades, safety cones and caution tape across a number of

High water and heavy rains re- flooded roads and streets including Main Street, Choctaw, North Jeffus St., South Kelsey St. and more.

The creek was flooded until downtown looked like a lake, and most witnesses reported water had not been that deep on Main Street since the Tom Jeffus Reservoir was built back in the 70s specifically for flood control in downtown Deport.

Hwy. 271 between Deport and Bogata was reduced to one lane, and the Texas Department of Transportation was out conducting traffic through an area where water was sweeping across the highway.

Cornstalks washedd out to a height of nearly 4 feet, and TXDOT had to manually remove them from the roadway.



Country Cooking

Food may come and food may go, but you can't beat the taste of a fresh, baked, crunchy, golden cookie! Although we don't know for sure where the first cookie came from, we do know that early cookies were actually tiny cakes that were baked as a test to make sure the oven temperature was right for baking a cake. The name cookie comes from the Dutch word, koekje, or "little cake" and the dictionary defines cookies as "small, flat, sweet cakes eaten as snacks or desserts." Today, cookies include a variety of treats that are enjoyed by young and old.

Speaking of young and old, this does bring to mind the story about the little neighbor boy who came visiting one day and I had just made a fresh batch of chocolate chip cookies. Asking him if he wanted one, he stated that he really wouldn't, but if I had some of those that came in the blue bag (Chips Ahoy), he would love some of those!

Anyway, many cookies familiar with North America, originated elsewhere. For example, shortbread is a favorite of Scotland, gingersnaps came from Sweden and almond macaroons were served first in Italy. And cookies aren't always called cookies. In Britain, Australia and New Zealand, they are "biscuits" and

in Germany, "keks". Some countries don't even have cookies (heaven forbid!) as we know them, but serve confections that are a cross between cookies and candy! (A cross between cookies and candy might not be that

And so goes the lesson for this week on cookies! I hope you enjoy some of these recipes and take the time to bake them with someone you love! See you in the kitchen!!!!!!!

Buttery Apricot Cookies use confectioner's sugar and dried apricots to make a delicious; mouth-watering treat!


Mixed-Nut Cookies-got some left over mixed nuts.....try this recipe and see what you can come up with! I'll

bet they are great! Coconut Macaroons-you know how great these cookies are, but never made them....try this and see how wonderful they are!

Golden Raisin & Pecan Cookieswhat would make these even better is to double up on the pecans!!!!!!!!!

Banana-Walnut Cookies-if you add bananas, oatmeal and walnuts, it has got to be a great combination for the palate!

Fruit Oatmeal Cookies-try thisdried apricots, dried pineapple, dried papaya plus oatmeal and spices..YUMMY!



1/2 cup unsalted butter-softened 1/2 cup sifted confectioner's sugar 1/2 teaspoon vanilla 1-1/4 cup sifted all-purpose flour 1/4 cup chopped dried apricots

Buttery Apricot Cookies

pinch of salt Place butter, sugar and vanilla in large bowl. Mix thoroughly and add beaten egg. Sift flour and salt over creamed mixture and blend gradually, working dough by hand. Add apricots and mix well. Shape dough into roll and wrap in waxed paper to chill over-night. Cut into 1/8-inch slices and bake at 400 degrees until brown around

Mixed Nut Cookies l cup unsalted butter 2 cups brown sugar 2 eggs-beaten 3-1/2 cups all purpose flour l teaspoon baking soda I cup chopped mixed nuts pinch of salt

sugar. Add eggs and mix well. In separate bowl, mix together flour, baking soda and salt. Mix in nuts. Divide dough in half and shape into two logs. Wrap in waxed paper and chill at least 12 hours. Preheat oven at 350 degrees and spray cookie sheet. Cut dough into 1/4-inch thick slices and arrange on cookie sheet. Bake 8-10 minutes.

Coconut Macaroons 2 cups confectioner's sugar 2-1/2 cups finely shredded coconut 4 egg whites 1/2 cup whipping cream 1 teaspoon vanilla extract

Preheat oven to 325 degrees. In bowl combine sugar and coconut. In separate bowl, beat egg whites until stiff and add to coconut mixture. Whip cream until stiff peaks form. Gently fold into coconut mixture along with vanilla and salt. Drop by spoonsful onto non-stick cookie sheet. Bake 15 minutes or until golden brown.

Golden Raisin & Pecan Cookies cup unsalted butter-softened 1-3/4 cups brown sugar

3 large eggs
2 cups golden raisins
3 cups all purpose flour

pinch of salt

l cup chopped pecans 2 teaspoons baking soda

2 teaspoons cinnamon pinch salt
Preheat oven to 350 degrees and spray cookie sheet. Cream butter in large bowl and add brown sugar and blend well. Add eggs, one at a time,

beating between additions. Dust raisins with 1/4 cup flour and add to egg mixture along with pecans; mix well Sift in remaining flour, baking soda, cinnamon and salt together. Stir into egg mixture; batter will be stiff. Drop by spoonsful onto cookie sheet and bake 15 minutes or until golden brown

Banana and Walnut Cookies 1/2 cup vegetable shortening l cup granulated sugar 2 eggs-beaten bananas-mashed 1-1/3 cup oatmeal flakes 3/4 cups chopped walnuts 1-1/2 cup all-purpose flour 3/4 teaspoon baking soda 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg 3/4 teaspoon salt

Preheat oven to 375 degrees. Spray cookie sheets with non-stick spray. In large bowl cream shortening and stir in sugar. One after the other, add eggs, bananas, oats, walnuts; mix well after each addition. Sift together remaining dry ingredients and blend into batter. spoonstul onto cooki Fruity Oatmeal Cookies

cup unsalted butter-softened l cup brown sugar 1/2 cup granulated sugar 2 large eggs 2 tablespoons light cream 1 teaspoon vanilla 2-1/2 cup all purpose flour 1/2 teaspoon baking soda 1/3 cup chopped dried apricots
1/3 cup dried chopped papaya
1/3 cup chopped dried pineapple 3 tablespoons all purpose flour 2 cups oatmeal flakes pinch salt pinch cinnamon pinch ground nutmeg

Preheat oven to 375 degrees and spray cookie sheets with non-stick spray. In large bowl, cream butter with both sugars and beat in eggs, cream and vanilla. Sift 2-1/2 cups flour together with baking soda, salt, cinnamon and nutmeg. Stir into egg mixture. Dredge dried fruit in remaining flour and fold into batter along with oats. Drop by teaspoonsful onto cookie sheet and flatten wwith spoon. Bake 10-12 minutes



For more than 22 years, the City of Paris EMS has provided professional medical care for the city of Paris and Lamar County residents. Our Paramedics are highly trained health care professionals of the highest quality. Many have spent most of their adult lives making our EMS the finest in the state of Texas. Not only do we take pride in our service but in the community in which we live. Many of us live outside the Paris city limits and would not want another emerency service rendering health care to our families, friends or neighbors.

Our protocols for treatment have been approved and authorized by our local medical director and the Lamar-Delta Medical Society and have set a high and expected level of competent patient care.

City of Paris EMS staffs 3 ambulances with 2 paramedics on each ambulance 24 hours a day. these ambulances are always stationed in Lamar County.
