**A Canadian Commentary**  
Many of you may have already seen this. It was sent to me by Lamar County Sheriff B.J. McCoy, and later I received it in an e-mail. But, for those of you who haven't read it, please do.

This was an editorial broadcast from Toronto by Gordon Sinclair, a Canadian television commentator.

"This Canadian thinks it is time to speak up for the Americans as the most generous and possibly the least appreciated people on all the earth.

Germany, Japan and, to a lesser extent, Britain and Italy were lifted out of the debris of war by the Americans who poured in billions of dollars and forgave other billions in debts. None of these countries is today paying even the interest on its remaining debts to the United States.

When France was in danger of collapsing in 1956, it was the Americans who propped it up, and their reward was to be insulted on the streets of Paris. I was there, I saw it.

When earthquakes hit distant cities, it is the United States that hurries in to help. This spring, 59 American communities were flattened by tornadoes. Nobody helped.

The Marshall Plan and the Truman Policy pumped billions of dollars into discouraged countries. Now newspapers in those countries are writing about the decadent, warmongering Americans.

I'd like to see just one of those countries that is gloating over the erosion of the United States dollar build its own airplane. Does any other country in the world have a plane to equal the Boeing Jumbo jet, the Lockheed Tri-Star or the Douglas DC10? If so, why don't they fly them? Why do all the international lines except Russia fly American planes?

Why does no other land on earth even consider putting a man or woman on the moon? You talk about Japanese technocracy, you get radios. You talk about German technocracy, you get automobiles. You talk about American technocracy, and you find men on the moon not once, but several times and safely home again.

You talk about scandals, and the Americans put their right in the store window for everybody to look at. Even their draft-dodgers are not pursued and hounded. They are here on our streets, and most of them, unless they are breaking Canadian laws, are getting American dollars from home to spend here.

When the railways of France, Germany and India were breaking down through age, it was the Americans who rebuilt them. When the Pennsylvania Railroad and New York Central went broke, nobody loaned them an old caboose. Both are still broke.

I can name you 5000 times when the Americans raced to help other people in trouble. Can you name me even one time when someone else raced to the Americans in trouble? I don't think there was outside help even during the San Francisco earthquake.

Our neighbors have faced it alone, and I'm one Canadian who is damned tired of hearing them get kicked around. They will come out of this thing with their flag high. And when they do, they are entitled to thumb their nose at the lands that are gloating over their present troubles. I hope Canada is not one of them.

## Board to apply for school repair/renovation grant

The Prairiland ISD Board met September 17 with Downs, Basinger, Sessums, Perry and Patterson attending.

They rejected the bid on the shredder and the re-bid and accepted the inter-local agreement with Region VIII ESC for combined purchasing supplies for 2001-2002.

A request for maximum class size waivers was approved.

The Board agreed to apply for school repair and renovation grant and to apply for a TIF Grant for the Blossom campus.

A resolution with TASB as ag-

gregations authorize the Superintendent or Assistant Superintendent to implement the district participation in the Aggregation Program was approved.

At 9 p.m., the board went into Executive Session and came out at 9:10 p.m. Kent Wright's letter of resignation was accepted and contracted services with Russell Thrasher as computer tech, not to exceed 100 days was approved.

The board also met in special session on the same date for the purpose of holding a public meeting to discuss the school repair and renovation grant.

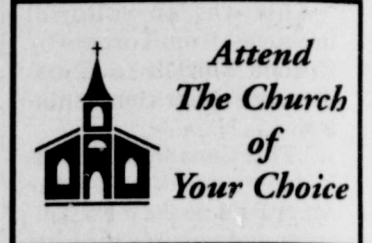
**Mrs. Helen O'Donnell dies September 12**

**Chicken Almond Fry**  
2 tablespoons oil  
4 chicken breasts-cut into small pieces  
2.25 ounce package almonds  
16 ounce package of stir-fry vegetables such as broccoli, carrot and water chestnuts  
1 tablespoon cornstarch  
1 tablespoon brown sugar  
1/2 teaspoon ground ginger  
1/2 cup soy sauce  
1/3 cup pineapple juice  
hot cooked rice

Pour oil into a big, deep skillet and heat to medium (375 degrees). Add chicken & almonds. Cook 2 minutes, stirring constantly. Add frozen stir fry vegetables, cover and cook 4 minutes, stirring once. Combine cornstarch and next four ingredients and add to chicken-vegetable mixture. Cook, stirring constantly for 2-4 minutes or until mixture thickens. Serve over rice.

**Beef and Salsa Burritos**  
1-1/2 pounds ground beef  
1-1/2 tablespoons chili powder  
1/2 teaspoon ground cumin  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/4 teaspoon pepper  
16 ounce package frozen, chopped spinach-thaw & drain  
1-1/4 cup chunky salsa  
1 cup shredded Cheddar cheese  
8 medium flour tortillas

Brown ground beef in large skillet until no longer pink; stirring constantly; pour off drippings. Season beef with chili powder, cumin, salt & pepper. Stir in spinach and salsa. Heat through. Remove from heat and stir in cheese. Spoon 1/2 cup in center of tortilla. Fold bottom and edge of burrito over filling. Then fold sides to center.

**Chunky Tomato Pasta Bake**  
8 ounces uncooked tube pasta  
1 pound ground beef  
14-ounce can diced tomatoes & green chilis with onions  
1 can condensed cream of mushroom soup  
1-1/2 cups shredded Mozzarella cheese

Cook pasta according to directions; drain. Brown meat in large skillet and drain. Combine meat, pasta, tomatoes & soup in 11x7-inch baking dish. Bake, covered at 350 degrees for 25 minutes. Uncover top with cheese and bake 3-5 minutes more until cheese is melted. Serves 4.

**Fool-Proof Sugar Cookies**  
1 cup butter  
1-1/4 cup sugar  
3 large eggs  
1 teaspoon salt  
1 teaspoon baking powder  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
3-4 cups flour

Mix together; roll out or cut out and decorate. Bake at 375 degrees for 8-10 minutes on ungreased cookie sheet.

**Puddin's Pudding**  
1 can Eagle Brand Milk  
1-1/2 cup water  
1 box instant vanilla pudding  
1 pint whipping cream  
vanilla wafers  
lemon juice  
bananas  
crushed pineapple

Mix milk with water and pudding. Mix well and let sit in fridge for at least 5 minutes. Beat whipped cream until very stiff. Fold into pudding. Drain pineapple well and add lemon juice. Layer vanilla wafers & pudding with drained pineapple. Lemon juice makes dish a little more tart. Bananas can be used, but Renate prefers the pineapple to bananas.

**Kitchen Sink Cookies**  
1 cup softened butter  
1/2 cup sugar  
1/2 cup firmly packed light brown sugar  
2 large eggs  
1 teaspoon vanilla extract  
2 cups all purpose flour  
1 teaspoon baking soda  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
2 cups old-fashioned oats  
2 cups semi-sweet chocolate chips  
1 cup unsweetened flake coconut  
1 cup raisins  
1 cup chopped nuts

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. In a very large bowl mix butter, sugars with wooden spoon until creamy. Beat in eggs, one at a time until well blended. Stir in vanilla. In medium bowl, sift together flour, soda & baking powder. Gradually stir into butter mixture until well blended and then add the rest. Drop by rounded tablespoons onto cookie sheet, about 2 inches apart. Flatten with a glass and bake for 16-18 minutes or until golden brown. Cool for about 2 minutes and then transfer to wire rack and let cool immediately. Makes 4 dozen.

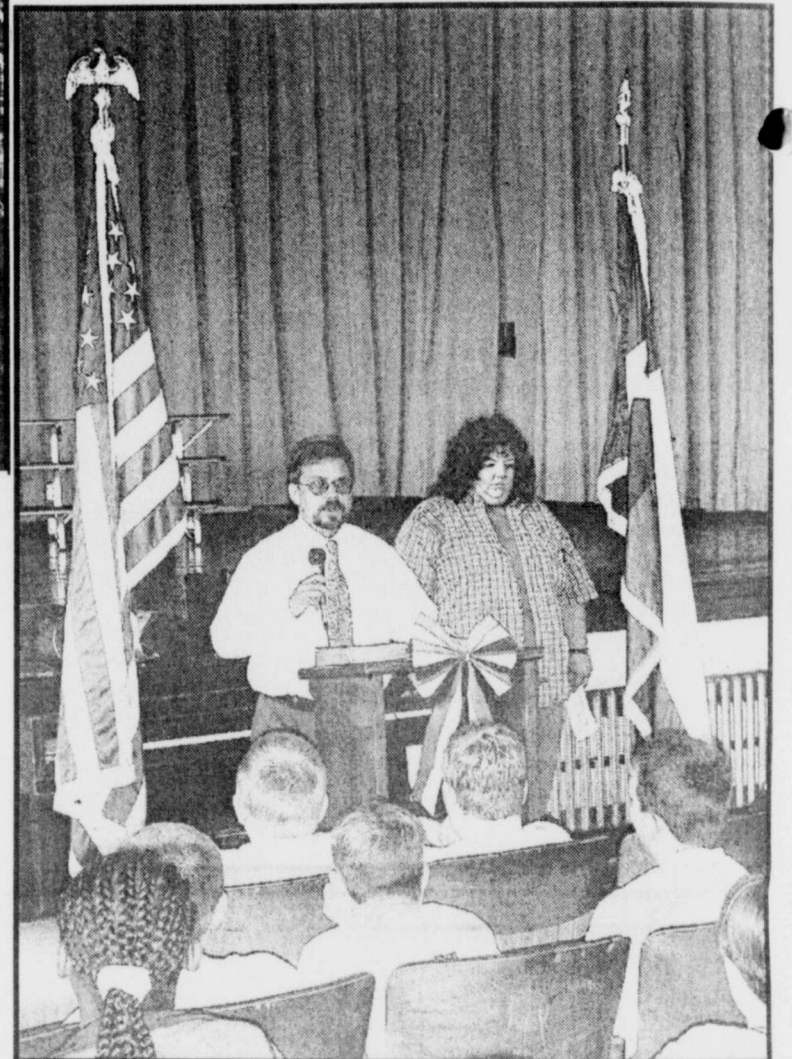

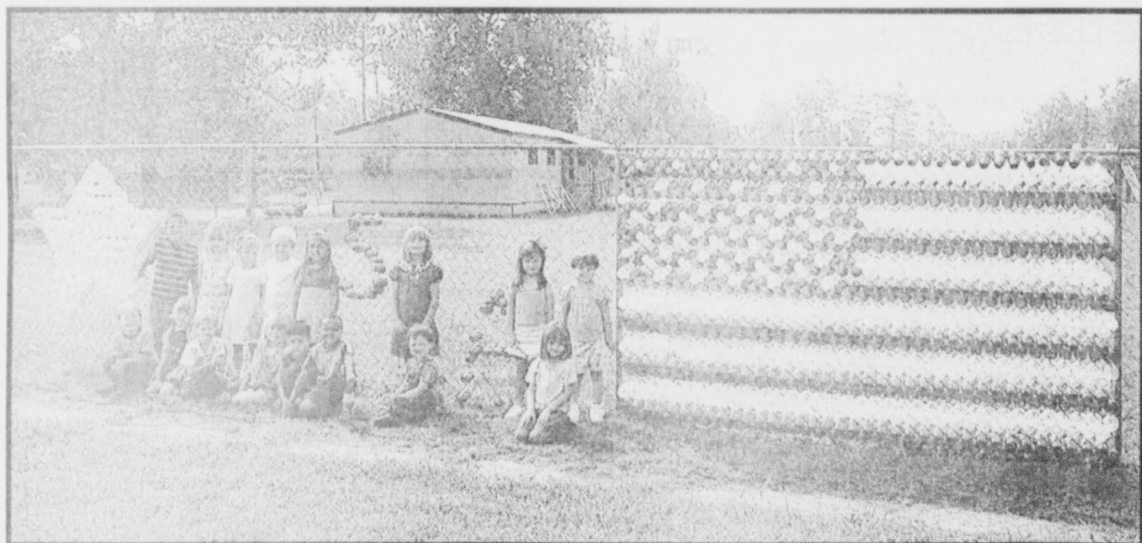

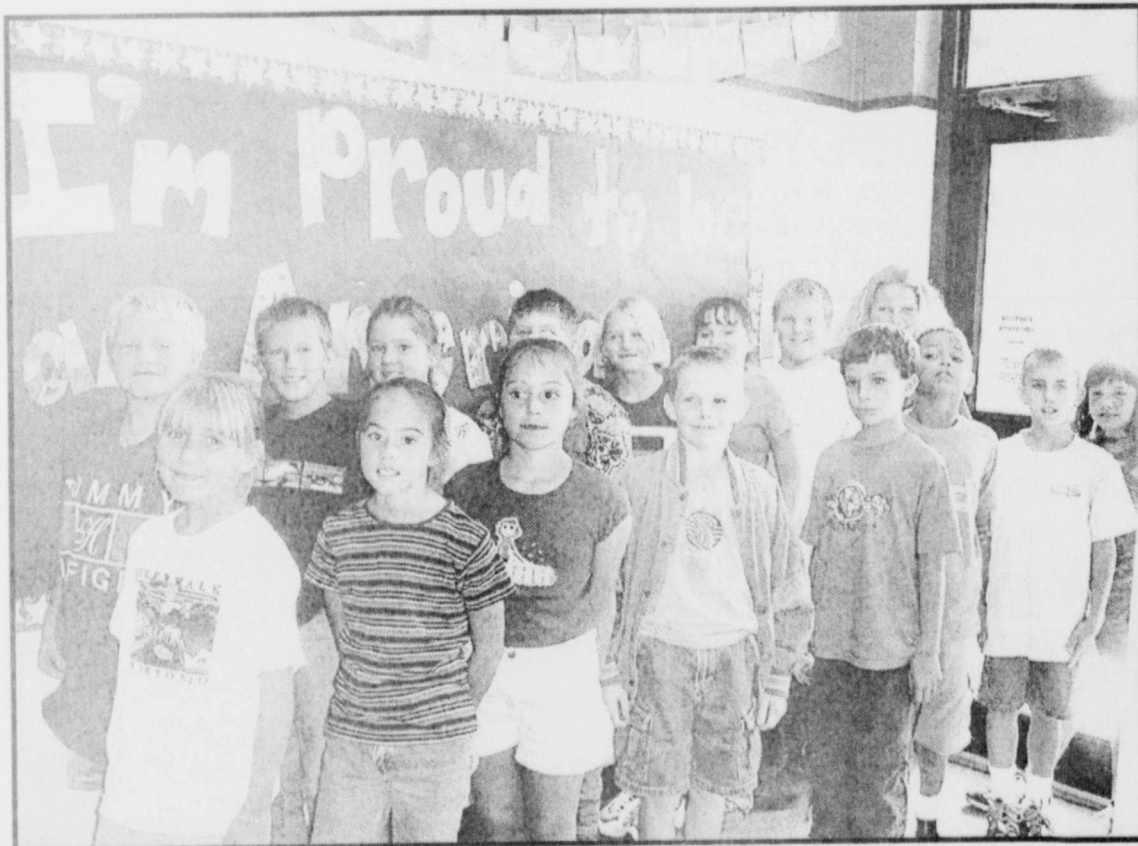

I was struck by the small, but fascinating "human interest" reports in the papers.

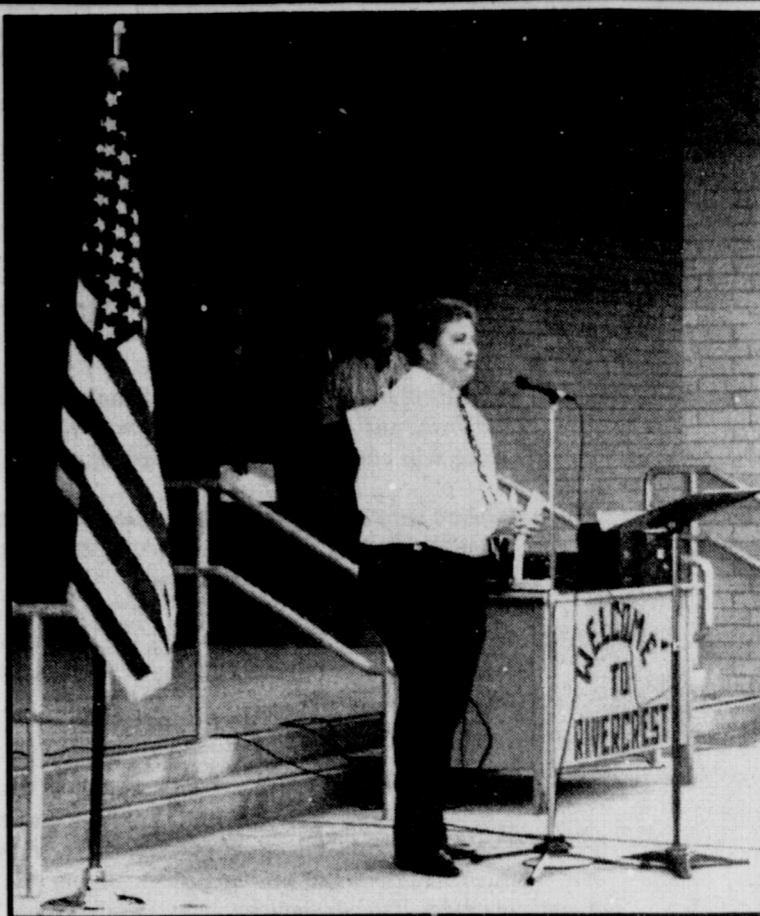

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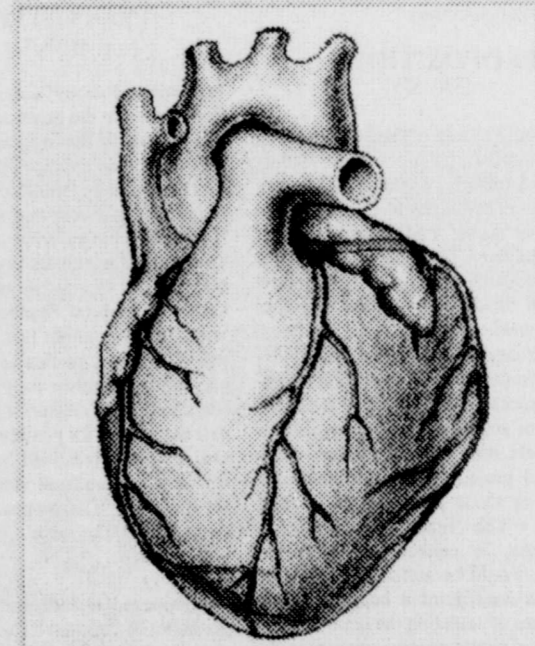

### Deport JH students honored with Duke recognition

Three seventh grade students at Deport Junior high School have been notified that they meet the qualifications necessary to participate in the Duke University Talent Search Program. Kalee Graham, Amanda Mathews and Charity Musgrove were selected based on their test scores on the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS) test that was administered in the spring of 2001. These students are now invited to take either the College Board's SAT: Reasoning test (SAT) or the American College Testing Program's Assessment (ACT). These tests are administered on college campuses throughout the nation during December, January and February.

Qualifications for the program require that a student must live in or attend a school in one of 16 southern and Midwestern states, be enrolled in the seventh grade, and score within the top three percent on a nationally normed test.

In addition to early college entrance testing experience, students also receive a Student Counseling Guide that aids in the interpretation of SAT/ACT test scores, an Educational Opportunity Guide that lists and describes over 400 summer and academic programs designed specifically for academically talented students, a College Guide which arrives during their sophomore year of high school, Insights, a newsletter that features articles and information regarding the college experience and a Certificate of Merit for being selected for the program.

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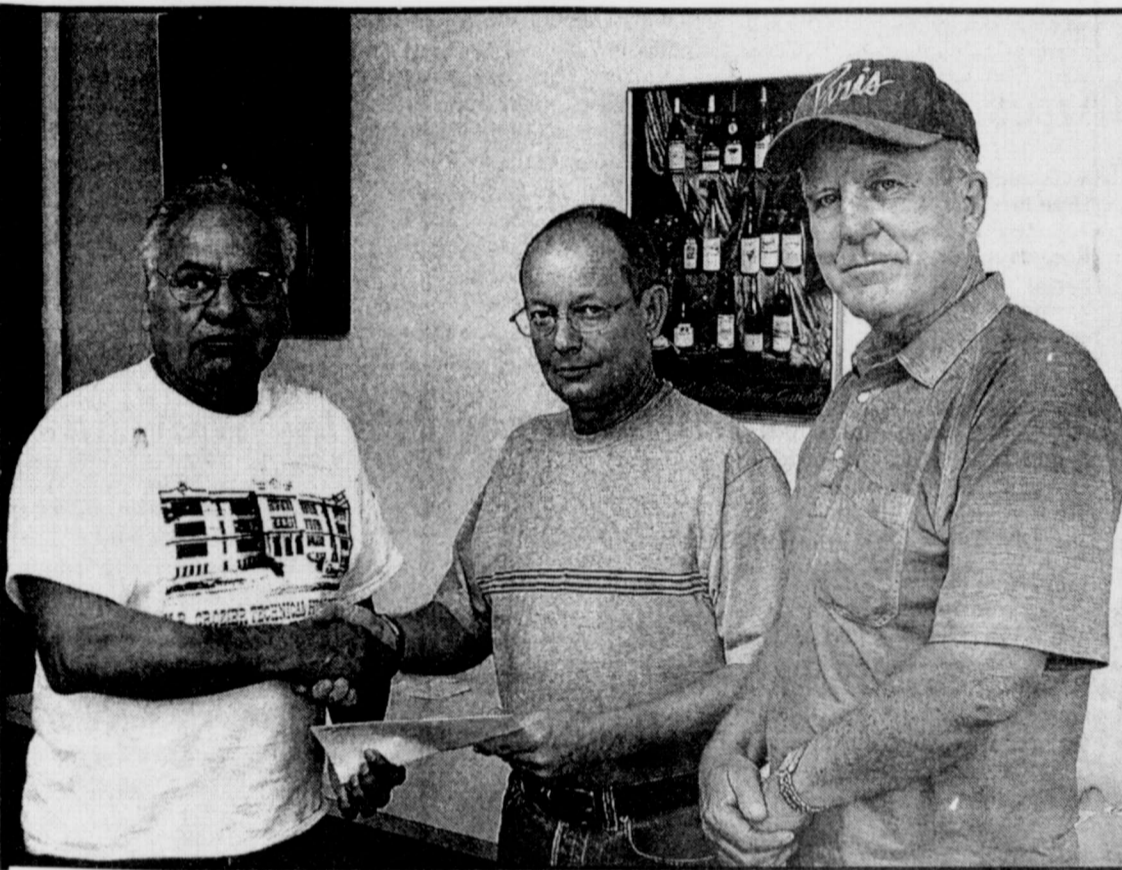

Paris EMS staffs 3 ambulances 24 hours a day. These ambulances are always stationed in Lamar County. If necessary, an additional 4 ambulances could be staffed and placed into service in a matter of minutes. Again, these ambulances and staff stay in Lamar County so as to be readily available to the citizens of Lamar County.

Paris E.M.S. staffs each ambulance with 2 Paramedics. Our Paramedics have almost 10 years experience each in emergency medicine. Our Paramedics are health care professionals of the highest quality. Many have spent most of their adult lives making our E.M.S. the finest in the State of Texas. Not only do we take pride in our service but in the community in which we live. Many of us live outside the Paris city limits and would not want another emergency service rendering health care to our families, friends, or neighbors.

The emergency medical system includes a fully equipped rescue truck staffed with trained, full-time personnel available 24 hours per day. This vehicle is equipped to handle a wide variety of rescue situations such as motor vehicle extrication, confined space rescue, farm/ag extrication, etc.

Dispatch is handled locally with personnel familiar with our area. Our Dispatch Center personnel immediately send the appropriate EMS, Rescue, VFD or First Responder personnel. Calls are

not transferred out of this county to someone who has never been to Lamar County.

Our protocols for treatment have been approved and authorized by our local medical director and the Lamar-Delta Medical Society and have set a high and expected level of competent patient care. These are all local physicians with ties to our community.

The Volunteer Fire Departments and First Responder Groups throughout Lamar County deserve special recognition. These groups ability to respond in time of need have increased the standard of care available to their neighbors. Paris EMS encourages participation by coordinating training, continuing education, training and patient supplies and equipment.
