Limo business is going places! Lady Limo began with an idea

Brenda Malone and Greg Parks have a business that is going somewhere...literally. They have taken a momentary idea seen on a TV talk show and turned it into one of the fastest growing busi-

nesses around! "Lady Limo" began only three years ago, but has grown from one limousine to a fleet, including a Limo bus and a separate business, Will Coach Tours, which has a full sized tour

Greg saw a program on the "Maury" show about people who had "had it all", lost it then rebuilt. One man was talking about going into the limousine busi-

That set Greg to thinking. Now, Greg has grown up in the floorcovering business. He has Carpet Worldon the Loop in Paris. There isn't much he doesn't know about that business, but he didn't know a thing about the limo business. Still, they realized that there was a real need and window of opportunity in Paris for such a service.

He and Brenda began to look for a limo. During that time, as she hunted down leads, checked ads and generally scouted around, he took to calling her the "Limo Lady". He said that's what she would be known as. They had picked out a business name, but on the way to Dallas to get their first limousine, she said "Let's call it Lady Limo" instead.

From the start that one limousine saw constant service. Within three weeks, they purchased another, and bought five more within the first year.

"When we got the first limousine, we rode around in it and I was so embarrassed . I felt silly" Brenda laughs.

One of Greg's favorite stories is about Ralph and Doris Parks. Greg had the limo driver pull up at his uncle's door, and knock. They peeked out, saw the limousine and were afraid to open the door until

Greg showed himself!". It wasn't easy, though. They found themselves up at 3:00 a.m. To clean a vehicle when it came in, because it had to be spotless for an early morning departure to somewhere like Dallas Ft. Worth air-

'We worked really hard. Just scheduling everything could be pretty tough" Brenda explained.

They now have 2 limos that seat 10, one that seats eight, one that seats six, and a Limo Bus.

They flew to New York City and purchased the limo bus, which seats eighteen to twenty people in total luxury

They didn't hang around. 'We got in that thing and set off

for home!" Brenda smiles, "We would get lost, stop and ask directions and keep on going until we finally left New York City"

Now, they have formed Will Coach tours, which has a 46 passenger bus, complete with rest room and all the comforts.

Brenda still does all the sched-

'I've met so many great people. They tell me why they want to rent a limo...birthdays, weddings, anniversaries, special nights out.. We visit and talk about what they need and pretty soon we're buddies. We get lots of repeat business". Churches frequently charter the bigger vehicles for various trips.

When asked what the most unsines were she smiles.

"There are so many, not all of which can be printed in the newspaper" she grins.

Proposals, birthday parties, graduations, weddings, concerts, all rank right up there. The long cars appear in parades, chartered for bachelor and bachelorette parties, and much more. A high school charters the big bus for their away

The limo bus get used a lot for trips to the "boats" in Louisiana. Lady Limo has regulars who go to the boats in a group every week.

Lady Limo is big enough now that they don't do their own driving, or cleaning anymore, unless part of the crew is sick.

But, they make sure they have good, safe drivers, friendly, personal service and limousine that provide lots of special touches.

One of the most popular limo nights is prom night or graduation. Parents aren't worried about putting on a show", they like to know that their children are safe, carried to and from the event with a sober driver in a reliable vehicle.

It's a hectic business, but they insist it is also a lot of fun.

Brenda had her granddaughter picked up from school for her birthday, and she gives her grandkids a "spring vacation" day in one of the showy cars every year.

The limos, from the smallest to the limo bus, are leather lined "laps of luxury". They feature ice buckets, glasses and napkins, tissue dispensers and soft drink. Colored lighting which changes, woodgrains and plush carpeting, music, a VCR, all combine to take the passenger into a new world.

They are working with Paris Travel to set up some tour packages for the big bus. They are usual reasons for hiring limou- already doing day tours and "shopping days" to various places.

Unmasking Halloween Dangers Never drive while wearing a

Parents who put Halloween masks on children may inadvertently create "mask blindness". Hospital emergency room statistics indicate that on Halloween a child is more likely to be involved in an injury producing accident than at any other time of the year.

In a major effort to protect children from costume and mask related accidents Prevent Blindness Texas is advocating the use of makeup instead of masks. Poorly fitted masks or those with small eye slits can block children's view of oncoming traffic, curbs, steps or other obstacles in their path.

Makeup is a good alternative to hot, stuffy and dangerous masks. Parents can have fun applying makeup to complete their child's transformation into a ghost, goblin, princes, witch or whatever stage being lurks in their imagination.

If trick or treat is scheduled during twilight or evening hours, it is imperative that costumes include bright reflective material. The simple and inexpensive addition of a retroreflective armband can be the difference between life and

To help prevent accidents on Halloween, follow these safety guidelines created to help adults and children enjoy the holiday.

Wear makeup instead of Avoid costumes with masks, wigs, floppy hats or eye patches

that block vision. Avoid pointed props such as spears, swords or wands that can endanger other children's eyes.

Wear bright, reflective clothing or have reflective patches somewhere on the costume.

Carry a bright flashlight to il-

Obey all traffic signals, whether pedestrian or driver.

Younger children should be accompanied by an adult while traveling about the neighborhood. Older children should trick or treat





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

Local FFA offers pesticide CEU class

The Prairiland High School FFA Chapter will offer a 5-CEU Class for Private Pesticide Applicators at the Ag Department on Thursday, December 13 at 6:15

The Prairiland chapter is offering this training as a convenience for applicators whose license or certificate will expire before February 28, 2002.

Private Pesticide Applicators are required to re-demonstrate their competence to use restricted use pesticides, those considered to be the most hazardous, once every five years. Congress mandated the 5-year recertification program to insure that those who use the most hazardous pesticides stay up to date on new developments and regulations that affect their use.

To comply with recertification mandates, applicators are required to earn 15 CEU's before their permit expires. The Texas Department of Agriculture allows applicators to earn up to 10 CEU credits through self-study programs. TDA approved self-study programs several years ago to enable farmers-ranchers to utilize their spare time to earn CEU credits at home. However, five CEU credits must be earned by classroom instruction.

Applicators must earn two CEU credits in the Laws & Regulations category, two CEU credits in Integrated Pest Management, and 11 CEU's in any approved category. FFA Advisor Frankie Norwood said the five CEU class to be offered will offer one CEU in integrated Pest Management and four CEU credits in general categories.

Applicators may enroll for the five CEU class at Prairiland by calling 1-800-556-0536 or FFA Advisor Frankie Norwood at Prairiland High School between 11:15 to 11:45 a.m. If applicators still need additional CEU's to meet their renewal requirements, help will be given to enroll in home study courses of up to 10 additional CEU credits.

Thousands of applicators who held the original lifetime Pesticide Applicator Certificate failed to complete recertification requirements a few years ago. Many of those were under the impression that failure to recertify meant they lost their lifetime certificate, according to Norwood. This is not the case. Applicators who held the old certificate can reinstate it by completing the 15 CEU renewal requirement. If they complete their 15 CEU's, those applicators will not be required to take the new Applicator License Test, nor pay the \$50.00 applicator license fee. Anyone wishing to reinstate their expired certificate can get help by calling the 800 number listed

Let us now honor our Veterans.





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
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Cap Rock Electric challenges PUC

Preston Mitchellhas asked that this article from the Greenville Herald Banner be reprinted here.

A large group of rural customers of Cap Rock Electric Cooperative Inc. have filed a challenge against the company at the Public Utility Commission of Texas, according to attorneys handling the action.

The customer group intervening in the PUC proceeding is the St. Lawrence Cotton Grower's Association, an organizatin of rural customers of Cap Rock Electric located in Glasscock County.

But in a statement issued Friday by a lawfirm, the group includes other customers of Cap Rock who have allegedly expressed concerns over high prices, what they believe is a reakened financial condition of the compnay and expected additional rate increases.

Cap Rock, headquarterd in

Midland, also has division offices in Celeste, Colorado City and Brady. The utility provides service to more than 33,000 meters in Hunt, Collin, Fannin and 25 other counties.

Cap Rock currently has a proceeding pending before the PUC, seeking to transfer its state issued certificate to an affiliated corpo-

The intervening group has requested the PUC deny the request, claiming the utility has substantial debt and extremely high electric rates for a cooperative, according to the statement.

The consumer group is alleging Cap Rock's board of directors recently voted to raise rates at least 12 percent, that the utility has lost almost \$10 million in the past two years and that the company has paid larger than average salaries and bonuses to manage-






