



Turkey Tostadoes 2 cups shredded turkey package taco seasoning

8 corn tortillas 1/2 cup canned refried beans-heated 1/2 cup shredded cheddar cheese cup shredded lettuce cup chopped tomatoes

sour cream guacamole

In large saucepan over medium heat, combine turkey and taco seasoning with amount of water specified on package. Bring miture to boil; reduce, heat and simmer 5 minutes; stir occasionally. Preheat oven to 375 degrees. On large cookie sheet arrange tortillas. Bake 5-7 minutes or until tortillas are crispy and lightly browned. Spread each tortilla with some beans, then turkey mix and remaining ingredients. Fold over and serve.

Lightly grease baking dish. Cook rice according to directions on package except use broth instead of water. Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Add peas and carrots; stir to combine. Add turkey, and soups. Pour into baking dish. Roll out puff pastry sheet slightly larger than pan. Brush edge of pastry with egg wash set over filling and press pastry edge around to adhere to baking dish. Brush top of pastry and bake until pastry has puffed slightly and is golden brown around 35-40 min-

Turkey Enchiladas 3 cups shredded cooked turkey 2 cups sour cream 2 cups shredded cheddar cheese 3 sprigs fresh cilantro-chop 12 ten inch tortillas-corn or flour l can red or green enchilada sauce sliced black olives to taste sour cream to garnish

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Combine turkey with sour cream, cheese and cilantro. Stuff enchiladas with turkey mix and roll. Arrange side by side seam down in shallow dish. Pour enchilada sauce over the top. Sprinkle with olives. Bake 20-30 minutes before serving. Garnish with additional sour cream f necessary.

Preheat oven to 350 degrees Whisk together eggs and water. In another bowl, combine breadcrumbs, oregano, salt and pepper. Dip turkey in egg mixture and then in crumb mixture. Place noodles on bottom of casserole dish Place turkey on top. Pour over spaghetti sauce. Layer with mozzarella cheese and top with Parmesan cheese. Bake, uncovered until sauce bubbles and cheese melts or about 20 minutes.




From "God's Little Devotional", Reba Temple read the selection, "It's not the outlook but the Uplook" that counts.

## Memories of a strong woman

I saw in the Obituaries where Willie Mae Dowdy Landers passed in Denton at age 86 last month. Willie Mae walked past our hours on Jeffus Street in Deport hundreds of times in the late sixties. Most folks will remember Willie Mae for at least a couple of important reasons...she was a hard worker and a good mother.

She had a strong family. There were her boys, Joe, Roy Lee, Billy and Tommy plus her girls Susie and the twins Bobbie and Robbie. They all lived in a very small house just up the street from us. The fast baseball pitch of Roy lee added to my youth my first broken bone one time when we were playing catch. School integration must have been a stressful time for the Dowdys, but they all transitioned to Deport Elementary just fine. Who around these parts cannot remember the tough, smart and talented dynamic duo of Bobbie on defense and Robbie on offense for the state playoff contending

Deport Tigerettes? I remember Willie Mae passing by on the road walking to many of

those basketball games. You see, Willie mae had no automobile. Not only did she walk to the school time after time to support all of her children, but daily she passed by on her way to work. She knew work. She did cleaning, nursing and cooking for years. Though her legs were not the healthiest and she walked with a limp, she was dedicated and reliable.

I was off at college when one day I heard that Willie mae had moved to Denton to be with her girls who were over there. Deport lost a good citizen that day she moved. She worked hard to overcome big challenges. A single mother, seven kids, a small house, no car and barely living wages made it by in Deport. She brought joy to many of us, helped many of us along her way and raised some good kids in those hard times.

I remember when on her walks by, Willie Mae would stop on the roadside in front of our house to talk to my mother, Flossie. I can still hear their loud, wild stories and the laughter of life ringing in my memory. Glad you passed by,


