Prairiland board considers building junior high, calling bond election, making many improvements

The Prairiland ISD Board of Trustees heard several proposals from consultants of Dain Rauscher and Associates at a meeting Thursday to consider options for building a Junior High School at the Prairiland Campus.

Superintendent James Morton stressed that "we are NOT considering shutting either the Deport or the Blossom campus down."

The board is just in the initial stages of the idea, and options ranging from a\$ 2.5 million bond issue to a \$7.5 million dollar bond issue, plus obtaining a great deal of funding help from the Instructional Funding Administration were discussed.

Superintendent Morton says

they board was looking at a five year plan which would include some of the following: 2001-2002: Bond Election in May, Building a Junior High for 6, 7 & 8 grades or a new High School and turning the Junior high out of the current High School

Build 2 PE Gyms with seating for 300 between them, enlarge Cafeteria into a Cafetorium, Upgrade Sewer System, build a Science Lab

2002-2003: complete project, Track at High School and Move Football Field.

2003-2004: Remove 2 Story at Blossom, build classrooms, office, and library at Blossom to tie buildings all together. Parking at Blossom

2004-2005: Remove 2 story at Deport, build classrooms, office and library at Deport to tie buildings 'all together. Remodel gym have access from outside.

2005-2006. Upgrade Vocational Ag Shop.

"This is only a proposal" Superintendent Morton said, "we have so many options to look at. One thing we have to meet is handicapped access, plus I'd like to see us start a Pre-K program and Blossom and Deport".

Upcoming meetings will determine how to best obtain funding and best utilize the program, plus the community's reaction to the matter.

The board also elected Mike Blackburn to the Lamar County Appraisal Board.



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
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
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
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LEC merger still important says board and management

The management and board of Lamar County Electric Cooperative say the merger of the co-op with Cap Rock Energy is more important than ever. There will soon be a deregulated marketplace for electric utilities in Texas. What does this mean for small companies like Lamar Electric Co-Op?

Many experts believe a utility must be a certain size to be able to survive in such a market. The large investor-owned utilities will have little interest in serving customers in rural areas - they learned long ago that rural areas were much too expensive to serve compared to the mass meters of urban areas. It is expected that many small co-ops will not survive in a deregulated marketplace, and the members of those cooperatives will end up paying increased costs for electricity, with a marked downgrade in reliability and quality of

The board and management of Cap Rock have been planning for years for the coming deregulation. Size is protection, and several small co-ops have joined Cap Rock in its fight for survival. The LEC board has shown wisdom in foreseeing the same future and deciding chance of survival is much better in a bigger organization.

What will happen to your capital credits if this merger does not occur? Capital credits have always been returned to the membership at the discretion of the board of directors and cooperative's bankers. In those years when the co-op made a profit, allocations were paid. In most cases, the payments were for small allocations up to 20 years in the past. If a co-op does not survive deregulation, those capital credits will never be paid. They will be eaten up by increasing need for operating capital.

Why should Cap Rock become a public stock company? First, Cap Rock is giving co-op members an opportunity to realize a return of those capital credits - either as a discounted lump sum, 100% reimbursement on electric bills or by receiving stock in Cap Rock Energy Corporation. Most Cap Rock customers have already received cash or electric bill credit. A total of \$2,187,583 has been disbursed in lumpsum payments and \$6,739,931 has been returned in electric bill credits. Cap Rock's members believed strongly in Cap Rock and many opted for stock. They have elected to receive stock worth in excess of \$13 million, representing almost 27,000 accounts. It is expected that stock certificates will be issued early in December.

A stock company structure will provide flexibility in financing, with capital to modernize and grow the business. Our goal has always been to have Cap Rock's stock in the hands of local investors - those who were members of our electric co-ops. It gives value to your capital credits. It provides a stock certificate that has value, instead of a promise of capital credits that may never be paid.

The challenges faced by electric cooperatives today are very similar to those of the thrift industry 20-plus years ago. They've operated for years in a comfortable, protected environment, just like the thrifts in the 1970s. Now they're about to face competition for the first time. Unless they prepare themselves for change, unless they take the necessary steps to compete, they probably won't make it. The biggest prerequisite for survival is size, which provides opportunity to lower costs and provide additional work force when needed, such as during the terrible ice storm of last December.

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Becoming part of a public stock company gives you more control of your destiny. Under the community-offering concept, together we have a better chance to maintain control of our companies, while securing capital to expand our infrastructure and survive.

The electric cooperative movement began with citizens banding together for mutual gain. In the 21st century, we are doing the same thing. We are taking what is best in the cooperative philosophy and combining it with the advantages of a public stock company. The result will be a public stock company that is operated much like a cooperative. You will continue to receive the same excellent service, and the Agreement to Combine ensures your rates will remain competitive.

The merger with Cap Rock is important to all LEC members. Returning proxies during the current board election is also important, It is important that LEC remain a strong, viable entity. It is probable that the merger with Cap Rock is the final opportunity for the coop to enter a deregulated marketplace as part of a larger organization.

If the odds are approximately 8,000 to one of winning up to \$300.00 a month off of your electricity bill for one year, does that mean approximately 7,999 members cannot win.




