

"No call list" promoted


announced that Texans can now join the new "Texas No Call List" which enables consumers to block unwanted telemarketing phone calls and penalizes telemarketers who break the law. During the 2001 legislative session, the telemarketing disclosure and privacy act was passed. As a result, any Texan can voluntarily request that their name be placed on the no call list. The legislation prevents telemarketers from calling anyone on the list and also from disguising their number so that people will always be able to see

Homer pointed out that the law gives consumers more control over who calls them at home and also protects seniors and other

Any person who wants to put their name on the no call list can do so by calling 1-800-896-6225 or visit www.texasnocall.com. The cost for registering a residential phone number is only \$2.25 and the phone number will remain on the list for three years. The list will be updated quarterly with the first list available to telemarketers on April 1. The Consumer Protection Division of the Public Utility Commission will handle complaints against telemarketers who violate the no call list.



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Courthouses awarded grants

The Texas Historical Commisrecipients of the Texas Historic Courthouse Preservation Program at its quarterly meeting on January 11 in Houston.

Commissioners awarded matching grants totaling approximately \$39.2 million to 14 Texas counties to help preserve their historic courthouses.

The counties to receive funds are Archer, Cameron, Denton, Dimmit, Fayette, Goliad, Hudspeth, Jeff Davis, Lamar, Lavaca, Maverick, Parker, Val Verde and Wheeler.

THC commission members awarded the majority of the \$50 million received from the Texas Legislature during the 2001 legislative session. The grants will be used for construction and building costs. As in the first two months, the commission plans to grant the remaining funds for courthouses determined to be highly endangered based on inspections and recommendations to complete plans and specifications; based on other eligibility.

A total of 83 counties applied sion announced Round III grand for grant money in Round III, requesting approximately \$195 million in assistance to preserve and restor their historic courthouses. Nine of the counties were first time applicants, 25 were automatically rolled over from Round II with no changes to their applica tion and 49 from Round II were revised for reconsideration. Counties are scored on a variety of areas including historical significance, architectural style and degree of endangerment.

Gov. George W. Bush and the Texas Legislature created the Texas Historic Courthouse Preservation program in 1999 with an initial appropriation of \$50 million. In May, 2000, the THC distributed \$42.4 million in matching grants to 19 counties in Round I of the program. An additional \$7 million was distributed to 28 Texas counties in October 2000 in

Round II. The Lamar County Courthouse received \$3,535,500 in Round III by THC staff to the commission; funding from the Preservation
