#### ... Massey's Pit Bar B Q Flashes..

The sign just off Highway 37, "PIT Q", is now old and weathered and partly hidden on one side by a small but growing cedar tree. In years gone by, the sign once proudly proclaimed the roadside home of Massey's Pit Bar B Q restuarant located just about midway between Bogata and

Massey's long ago cooked the last pound of beef brisket. The small one room building of light green shingles, three single windows trimmed in white and a white roof is now all but abandoned. No longer does the flapping screen door invite customers to come in and enjoy that special flavor only Massey's knew how to provide. The gravel, oval driveway remains and the pit chimney and two smoke pipes still stand tall on top of the fading building, but the torn curtains hanging from the windows tell you that pit barbeque is there only in memory.

I was only a kid when I made my first trips from Deport to Massey's. It was practically a Sunday morning ritual for me and my daddy to crank up that 1954 Royal Blue Chevy pickup truck and drive the farm-to-market road

through Fulbright to Massey's. If Bud Nobles only knew, at an early age, driver's license or not, it was pretty exciting for me to learn to drive on occasion on that road behind the wheel of that old

Anyway, I supppose Massey's was open on other days of the tween 5:30 and 6:00 P.M., and the week, but our day for barbeque

was Sunday. I remember pulling tough to choose between the pork into that oval driveway and at times seeing Mr. or Mrs. Massey tripping out of the back door of their house which was located just about thirty paces beyond the carport from the restaurant. Going inside the restaurant front door, you quickly met up with the counter and the old cash register. Behind the counter were the obligatory chip rack and the old Coke wall menu proclaiming beef and pork by the pound or by the sandwich.

Mrs. Massey, grandma-like and always smiling, usually handled the counter and the customer service, while Mr. Massey, always serious about his product, was busy in the pit. You don't find barbeque like the Massey's much anymore. The sauce was a deli-

cious, special clear vinegar based blend of spices and heavy on red pepper. It was sweet, yet with the right spicy bite. It was always

and the beef, so we usually just

got both. What made a trip to Massey's really special was the preparation of the "to go" order. Folks, it was pre-styrofoam times. Then, they packed both the sauce and barbeque in what we know today as those neat, white cardboard Chinese food boxes complete with the little wire handles. Just drop those into a brown paper bag and you were on your way.

Once we got home with barbeque by the pound, Mother would toast "hamburger" buns to perfection with just the right touch of browned edges from an old black iron skillet. Those buns were good for mopping up the sauce that dripped off your sandwich. That was the best part. We just added chips and bottled Dr. Pepper to our Massey's on Sunday. That was all you needed to enjoy an old family tradition--one for days gone by supplied by the Massey's for our house.

Our recipes this week deal with Key Limes. Those of you that don't know about Key Limes.....well, here is a short history lesson. There are two principal varieties and they are the Key Lime or Mexican or West Indies Lime and the Persian or Tahiti Lime. The Key Lime was cultivated in the Indo-Malaysian region and made its way all around the Mediterranean by way of Christopher Columbus. Go Chris!

The lime or Citrus aurantifolia; Rutaceae family, was touted as the lifesaver of the British Navy in the 18th century. It was discovered that a daily dose of lime juice reduced the incidence of scurvy which is a deficiency of Vitamin C. Thus they became know as

Southern Florida where it became an abundant crop for farmers, particularly in the Florida Keys, thus the name, Key Lime.

The Florida lime groves were destroyed by hurricanes in the early 1900's and most Key Limes now come from Mexico. They are about the size and shape of a golf ball, with a thin skin and are harvested while immature. This is when the acid is at its highest level. When the fruit turns yellow, the using Key Limes gives the acid levels drop and they become cheesecake an aromatic and sweeter. It is used for sauces, gar- citrusy flavor!

The Persian Lime is also grown extensively in Florida. The fruit is larger with a thicker skin and is more durable than the Key Lime. 




She was a sister of the publisher Henry R. Luce, who died in 1967.

Since Tornado/Thunderstorm season is coming up, the National Weather Service has issued some hazardous weather threats and safety tips.

TORNADOES:

Although tornadoes occur in many parts of the world, these destructive forces of nature are found most frequently in the United States east of the Rocky Mountains during the spring and summer months. In an average year, 800 tornadoes are reported nationwide, resulting in 80 deaths and over 1,500 injuries. Texas leads the nation with over 120 tornadoes reported each year.

A tornado is defined as a violently rotating column of air extending from a thunderstorm to the ground. The most violent tornadoes are capable of tremendous destruction with wind speeds of 250 m.p.h. or more. Damage paths can be in excess of one mile wide

How Do Tornadoes form? Before thunderstorms develop, a change in wind direction and an increase in wind speed with increasing height creates and invisible, horizontal spinning effect in the lower atmosphere. Rising air within the thunderstorm updraft tilts the rotating air from horizontal to vertical. An area of rotation 2-6 miles wide, develops through much of the storm. Most strong and violent tornadoes form within this area of strong rotation.

TORNADO CLASSIFICATION: Weak, 80% of tornadoes. % of deaths, less than 5, lifetime, 1-10

minutes, wind speeds up to 110 m.p.h..

Strong, 19%, % of deaths, nearly 30, Lifetime, 20 mins. or more, wind speed, 110 to 205 m.p.h.. Violent % of tornadoes, 1%, % of deaths, nearly 70, Lifetime, up to an hour; wind speed, 205 m.p.h.

Tornadoes can occur at any time of the year. In Texas, the peak tornado occurrence is in March through May.

A secondary tornado maximum can occur in the fall.

Tornadoes are most likely to occur at all hours of the day or night.

The average tornado moves form southwest to northeast, but tornadoes can move in any direc-

TORNADO SAFETY TIPS Before the Storm: Develop a plan

you live, and keep a highway map nearby to follow storm movement from weather bulletins. Have a NOAA Weather Radio with a warning alarm tone and

battery backup to receive warnings. Listen to radio and television for information. If planning a trip outdoors, listen to the latest forecasts and take necessary action if threatening

weather is possible. If a Warning is issued or if threatening weather approaches: In a home or building, move to a pre-designated shelter, such as a

If an underground shelter is not available, move to an interior room or hallway on the lowest floor and get under a sturdy piece of furni-

Stay away from windows. Get out of automobiles.

Do not try to outrun a tornado in your car; instead, leave it immedi-

Mobile homes, even if tied down, offer little protection from tornadoes and should be abandoned. Occasionally, tornadoes develop so rapidly that advance warning is not possible. Remain alert for signs of an approaching tornado. Flying debris from tornadoes causes most deaths and injuries.
