

Chicken Tamale Casserole dozen frozen tamales I fryer-stew and de-bone 1-1/2 cups chicken broth reserved from chicken

1/4 small onion-chopped l can green chilis-chopped l can cream of mushroom soup 2 cups velveeta cheese

In deep oblong pan put tamales on bottom; layer chicken over these and then layer onion. Grate the velveeta or slice it and layer on top. In saucepan heat the broth, soup and green chilis to boiling. Pour over tamale, chicken and cheese, mixture. Cover with foil and bake at 325 degrees for I hour and 15 min-

Refrigerator Rolls 1/2 cup sugar l teaspoon salt 2 cups water 2 tablespoons Crisco l package dry yeast l/2 cup lukewarm water

5 cups flour In saucepan combine sugar, salt, 2 cups water and Crisco and heat just until Crisco melts. Let cool to lukewarm. Dissolve yeast in 1/2 cup water and add to cooled mixture. Gradually add the flour to mixture in medium mixing bowl. When mixed well, sit in a warm place and let it double in bulk. Put on floured board and knead. Grease tupperware bowl and cover when you place in refirgerator. Make into balls and put two into greased muf-fin tin for Parkerhouse Rolls. After rising for about 3 hours place in preheated 375 degree oven until golden brown. In warm weather, it won't take as long to rise and recipe makes about 2 dozen. Dough keeps

about 2 weeks in refrigerator.

Pastry for Double-Crust Pie 1-1/2 cup flour dash salt

1/3 cup Crisco cold water to hold together

Combine all ingredients except water and use a small amount at a time so as not to add too much. Roll out and chill before making pecan or buttermilk pie.

Pastry for Fried Pies l cup flour dash salt

1/3 cup Crisco cold water to hold together Combine all ingredients except water and add only enough to make

crust stick together. Divide into small balls and roll out and fill wth favorite filling. Ths will make 5-6 crusts for pies.

Pecan Pie

l cup sugar stick oleo 3 eggs 3/4 cups Karo-white teaspooon vanilla cup chopped pecans

Combine all ingredients and bake in crust at 350 degrees for 50-55 minutes. If it browns too quickly, make a tent of foil to place over top.

Cinnamon Red Hot Apples 4 large McIntosh apples margarine 9 ounce bag red hots

l cups sugar-divided Quarter, core and leave peelings on apples. Add water to pan and bring to boil. This will fill a pan 9-10" in diameter. DAdd apples and dot with margarine and put on lid. When apples cook a little, add red hots gradually until mixture is as red as you would like. When red hots are melted add 1/2 cup sugar and then another 1/2 cup gradually.

Buttermilk Pound Cake 2 cups flour 1 cup Crisco 4 eggs 1 cup buttermilk

1/4 teaspoon soda 2 cups flour I teaspoon baking powder dash salt

l teaspoon vanilla I teaspoon butter-flavoring

Blend together Crisco and 2 cups flour. Add eggs, one at a time and beat after each. Alternatley add remaining ingredients and add vanilla and flavoring last. Bake in bundt pan for I hour at 350 degrees.

RRC looking for newspapers


