

A bull and bronc riding event was held at the Bogata Rodeo arena last weekend.


Thirty bullriders and eighteen bronc riders participated in the event to raise funds for the Christians Cowboy Crisis Fund.

As Spring hits the area, folks begin looking for those fresh fruits and vegetables to grace their tables. With area rains so abundant this year, the waiting may be a little longer than ususal. Most area gardens are still muddy and unable to be planted....but warm weather will be here and none too soon! Then, we will be complaining about the hot weather and where is the rain? We can never be pleased.....can we?

One of the first fruits to make it's appearance in our area is the strawberry.....none better.....but that is my opinion! Whether thay are baked in pies, cakes, muffins, poured over ice shortcake

whatever....they are the best. Stores around seem to have anabundance of the berries and at a reasonable price also. So what better way to lead out a column than with some strawberry reci-

Did you know that American Indians were already eating strawberries when the Colonists arrived? They crushed the berries and mixed them with cornmeal and baked them into a bread. Of course, the Colonists had to be oneup on the Indians and devised their own form of the recipe and

with strawberry came up shortcake.

In Greek and Roman times the strawberry was a wild plant and spread throughout by birds as they consumed the wild berries and passed the seeds from country to country. The English strawberry come from the Anglo-Saxon word "streoberie", not spelled in the modern fashion until 1538. The strawberry was a symbol for Venus, Goddess of Love, because of its heart shape and red color. The first documented botanical illustration of a strawberry plant appeared as a figure in Herbaries in

The strawberry is a member of the rose family and is unique in that it is the only fruit with seeds on the outside rather than on the inside. Many medicinal uses were claimed for the wild strawberry along with its leaves and roots. 


Haskell Bratcher, 84, of Paris died Wednesday, April 17, 2002 at Christus St. Joseph's Hospital
