4-year old children being surveyed for Pre-K class

a survey of four year old children, language other than English must must be four by Septenmber 1, 2002, who reside in the Prairiland school district to determine the need for a Pre-Kindergarten class in the 2002-2003 school year.

If this class makes, it may be a full day or half day program depending on the number of students qualifying. The children could ride the bus to school in the morning, but the parents would have to pick them up at 11:30. The breakfast program would be available to the children but they would not be eligible to eat lunch at school.

Children may qualify for the Pre-K class by meeting any one of the following requirements: Income: children from households 6233 or 652-3738. eligible for the Free/Reduced

The Prairiland I.S.D. is making lunch program; and Language: A be spoken in the home most of the time.

In order for the district to have the Pre-K class, there must be a minimum of 15 students qualify. If there is a total of 15 or more students, the class will be held.

If 15 to 22 students meet the eligibility requirement for Pre-Kindergarten, they will be able to have an all day Pre-K. If 22 to 44 students meet the eligibility requirement for Pre-K, two half-day Pre-K classes will be held.



tician asks that the Red River Ordnance at Texarkana be closed down to save money. Because of this, I think what happened in 1948 at Detroit should be made a written record. That was when I took 3 or 4 veterans to the Ordnance and came back with jobs for more than 100 veterans due to the good show by these Detroit area

I do not remember every one of those vets' names now, almost 48 ears later and need the survivors write the Detroit Weekly tellig what happened then.

In the 1940's, after a long, long war, veterans came home to Detroit area to no jobs, but home, home, home. We were all homesick. I came back as principal, Detroit High School. Then I took the job as Director, Detroit Autobody School. It was a veterans school owned by Col. Chewning of Paris, along with other businesses in Detroit. The only reason some veterans went to these type schools was they were paid to attend and there were no jobs here. Veterans were homesick and wanted to stay home for a while.

Some veterans, last name Vickers and from the Bagwell area, came to me and said the Ordnance needed autobody repairmen, but had a five years experi-

made an appintment for conference. On a Friday morning early I left Detroit with three or four veterans who were students at the school. At the Ordnance, the veterans were taken to the shops, away from me, and put to tests at work. Presently, staff workers came to us with glowing reports, saying the veterans were excellent workers and just what they needed at the Ordnacne. Calls were made to Civil Service Hq. asking for a waiver of the five years experience requirement for the jobs.

I was taken on a tour of the Ordnance, introduced to the Foreman of Trishops as Major Somerville from Detroit. He was delighted, saying "Ah, Detroit, Detroit! Chesus Christ, I vish I was back in Detroit!" Somebody told him it was Detroit, Texas, not Michigan and after that he would not speak to me.

Calls to Civil Service headquarters continued, and I was put on the phone a couple of times. But it was a long afternoon and about five o'clock when the National Headquarters gave temporary consent to waive the five year experience requirement for an autobody repair job at Red River Ordnance. They asked me for 100

ence requirement for jobs there. about dark, and veterans were still Korea in the Air Force.

eager for news. On Saturday, we processed about 30 to leave Monday for work.

I went to Col. Chewning, "I've ruined your school."

"What did you do?"

"I got jobs!" He smiled, even though this would mean no more income from the school. "That's the purpose of the school. That's our mission!" When he said that, you could tell he was an airplane pilot, a veteran of World War I and World War II.

On Monday morning, when I came to Detroit Audobody School, I could not find a palce to park. Had to park a block away. Veterans were everywhere. Some from Clarksville, some from Paris, some from Oklahoma. They had called friends, word got around...jobs, jobs.

And people said veterans were not interested in work? They really wanted to stay home because they were homesick.

But we sent more than 100 veterans to the Ordnance. I need those survivors of 1948 to write the DetroitWeekly with their memories of this. I left Detroit soon after that and Fred Fisher came in as Director of the School, still sending veterans to the Ordnanc. Car Seat Check-up is June 5

A car seat check-up will be held June 5 from 3 p.m. to 6 p.m. in the Paris Wal-Mart parking lot. The event is being sponsored by the Paris EMS


The Car Seat Check-up Program was developed by the Department of Transportation and the Department of Health due to the growing number of injuries and deaths of infants and toddlers. National studies have discovered that infants and toddlers were restrained improperly in car seats.

Those same national studies reflected that at least 8 out of 10 car seats are incorrectly used. The studies revealed that correctly installed car seats are 71% effective in reducing deaths for infants, 54% effective in reducing toddler deaths, and reduced the need for hospitalization by 69%.

Paris EMS became involved with the Child Safety Seat Program last year when the studies were brought to the attention of local Paramedics. One of the goals at Paris/Lamar County EMS is injury prevention. Citizens need to know that injuries are prevented if infants and children are properly secured when riding in a

A 32-hour training program was developed through the efforts of the DOH & the DOT to educate individuals to become Child Passenger Seat Technicians. This 32hour training program consists of learning: Basics of injury prevention, Crash Dynamics, Federal Safety Standards, Identifying Vehicle Occupant Protection Sys-

tems, Correct Installation of Car Seats, Selecting and Securing the right car seat for each child, and how to set up a Car Seat Check-

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

This Independence Day, more people than ever will be showing their patriotism and loyalty to America by displaying the American Flag. Here are examples of how to display the flag properly:

hanging flat on

*Unless illuminated at night, flags displayed outdoors should only be flown from sunrise to sunset.

**The flag should not be flown on days when the weather is inclement, expect when an all weather flag is

**The flag should not be draped over the hood, top, sides or back of a vehicle or of a railroad train or a boat. When the flag is displayed on a motorcar, the staff should be fixed firmly to the chassis or clamped to the right fender.

**When displayed either horizontally or vertically against a wall, the union should be uppermost and to the flat's own right, that is, to the observer's left. When displayed in a window, the flag should be displayed in the same

**When used on a speaker's platform, the flag, if displayed flat, should be displayed above and behind the speaker.

**The flag, when flown at halfstaff, should be first hoisted to the peak for an instant and then lowered to the half-staff position. The flag should be again raised to the day. On Memorial Day the flag should be displayed at half-mast until noon only, then raised to the top of the

**The flag should never be displayed up side down, except as a signal of dire distress instances of extreme danger to life or

**The flag should never touch anything beneath it, such as the ground, the floor, water or merchandise. **The flag should never

be used as wearing apparel, bedding or drapery. It should never be festooned, drawn back, not up, in folds, but always allowed to fall free.

**The flag should never be used as a covering for a ceiling. **The flag should never be

used as a receptacle for receiving, holding, carrying or delivering anything.

**The flag should never be used for advertising purposes in any manner whatsoever.

**The flag, when it is in such condition that it no longer is a fitting emblem for display, should be destroyed in a dignified way, preferable by burning. Contact your local American Legion or VFW

Milestone reached in fire grant review

Three hundred fire service personnel conducting peer evaluations of grant requests for the Federal Emergency Management Agency and the U.S. Fire Administration have completed their work, bringing eligible fire departments a step closer to receiving much needed assistance. With the peer review stage of the 2002 Assistance to Firefighters Grant Program now complete, the reviews will be forwarded to FEMA/ USFA staff for final processing

and selection of grant recipients. FEMA/USFA received an appropriation for \$360 million for the grant program this year. The applications for assistance totaled nearly \$2.2 billion with more than 19,500 requests for funds in four general categories: Fire Operations and Firefighter safety: \$882,539,097 and represented 58% of the applications. Fire fighting Vehicles and represented 37% of the applications. Emergency Medical Services, \$35,174,783 representing 2% of the applications. Fire Prevention Programs, representing 3% of the

applications. In accordance with the authorizing legislation, grants will be made to a variety of fire departments with consideration given to paid, volunteer and combination departments; departments located in communities of varying sizes; and department located in urban, suburban and rural communities. Grant awards will begin in June and will continue to be announced through the summer an fall, until all of the appropriated funds are

All applicants who did not make the peer review level will be notified of the final status of their submissions. All those departments that have applications that were peer reviewed but will not receive funding will be notified later this year.

It seems that almost every other vehicle on the road now displays some version of the American flag or the flag and eagle with mottos such as "These Colors Don't Run", "We Will Never Forget", "Pray for our Troops", or "God Bless America". My personal favorite from this category is Let's Roll!"



If it seems your horse has a frog in its throat, the culprit may be Streptococcus equi, or "strangles." This contagious bacterial infection affects young horses with cases ranging from only mild swelling to severe respiratory distress.

"Strangles is a contagious and very common disease in horses aged one to three years," said Dr. Peggy Marsh, a veterinarian in the College of Veterinary Medicine at exas A&M University.

"Streptococcus equi is in the same family of bacteria as the organism that causes strep throat in humans. In horses, it creates abscesses in the throat, swelling of the lymph nodes and nasal discharge."

Strangles is spread through direct contact with sick horses, or through contact with infected equipment, such as water buckets, brushes or blankets. Traveling stock are particularly at risk, as they are most likely to mingle with horses from other herds.

Marsh says prevention is the pest way to keep strangles out of a herd. Be sure to quarantine new horses away from the established herd for three to four weeks. In addition, she says you may opt for vaccines, which can be administered by injection or delivered through the nasal passages.

However, Marsh cautions that no vaccine is one 100 percent effective. Young foals are usually less susceptible to strangles since they are protected by the mare's immunity gleaned through nursing

If strangles does make its way into your herd, it is important to consult your veterinarian when symptoms surface. Marsh says a horse's appetite is not a good indicator of the presence or absence of strangles, as a horse may eat well in spite of minor pain and swelling, noted Marsh.

Most cases are not considered emergencies, but some cases can quickly escalate into respiratory distress. Your veterinarian will be able to prescribe a treatment appropriate for your horse's condition, which may include antibiotics and local, surgical drainage of any abscesses.

In very rare cases, strangles may cause one or more complications. These horses may develop pneumonia, myopathy (muscle swell-

ing), purpura hemmhoragica (generalized swelling caused by the body's own immune response), and/or abscesses in various other places, such as the abdomen. Most cases of strangles are curable, with only rare exceptions in which the bacteria "hides" in the guttural pouches, resulting in chronic shedding of the bacteria.

"The most important part of avoiding and treating strangles in your herd is to isolate sick horses and contaminated equipment from the rest of the herd," said Marsh. "When traveling, carefully monitor your horses' exposure to unfamiliar trailers and equipment. And, if symptoms do appear, it's best to seek the advice of your
