or fire prevention programs. I think I knew the mone was going to be pitifully sho when it took six or seven hours
just getting through on the jst getting through on
nternet to FEMA! Now, the procedure isnt
through yet. No one knows
whether they are getting any whether they are getting any grant money or not. But, here's how things stack
up. Requests for this three hun-
dred sixty million totalled Two point two BILLION dollars!
That's right, there were 19.500 requests for funds for
total of $\$ 2.2$ BILLION. I can't count high enough, or
even begin to grasp the coneven begin to grasp the con-
cept of that much money.
Fifty eight percent of the grant money requested was for
fire operations and firefighter safety...that means things like protective clothing (bunker
gear) radios, boots, jawsoflife gear) radios, boois, jawsoflife.
etc.
Fire fighting vehicles (usually the most expensive item has) made up $37 \%$ of the applications, and emergency
medical services and fire premedical services and fire pre-
vention made up the rest of vention made up
the applications.
In addition, vo In addition, volunteer de-
partments must compete with paid and combination volun-
teer/paiddepartments located teer/paid departments, located
in urban, suburban and rural communities.
300 fire service personnel are currently going over these applications todetermine who
gets what. I don't envy them gets what.
their job.
What does all this mean? It means that, as always, small town volunteer fire depart-
ments must have the support and help of the people they serve.
Because getting grants isn't a reliable way to obtain funds
for things such as gear tokeep for things such as gear to keep
a volunteer from being burned, or medical equipment to save a life.
Whenever grants are open,
velt apply for them. Otherwise it apply for them. Otherwise

or even minutes of exposure. If your bird does begin to show
symptoms of toxic fume inhalasymptoms of toxic fume inhala-
tion, take tion, take it to an emergency vet-
erinarian immediately. Your veterinarian may want to keep the affected bird in an oxygen cage to manage the symptoms. Johnson says that heat lamps
and other unlikely items often have coatings applied by the manufacturer that emit odorless fumes when heated and can be harmful to a bird. Since these products are not harmful to peopie, it is unilikely that they will
