





Fresh Blackberry Cobbler 3-1/2 cups fresh blackberries

cup sugar 2 tablespoons flour

6 tablespoons butter or margarine Preheat oven to 400 degrees. Pour berries into a 2-quart casserole dish and add water. Combine sugar and flour in small bowl. Stir to mix. Sprinkle over the berries. Dot with butter. Cut crust to fit top of dish or cut into strips for top. Bake for about 30 minutes and then reduce oven to 350 until crust is brown and juice begins to bubble and thicken.

Blackberry-Lemon Pie double crust pastry 3/4 cup brown sugar l tablespoon lemon zest 4 cups fresh blackberries I cup white sugar 1/2 cup flour tablespoon lemon zest l tablespoon butter

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Place bottom crust into pan. Crumble remaining crust into a bowl with brown sugar and I tablespoon lemon zest. Mix with hands until dough becomes pea-size and set aside. In large bowl, combine berries, flour, sugar and I tablespoon lemon zest. Fill bottom crust with berry mixture. Sprinkle crumb top-ping over mixture and dot with butter. Bake for 45 minutes to one hour. Let stand before serving.

Blackberry Bake

2 tablespoons lemon juice 3 cups fresh blackberries To make biscuit topping: combine flour, baking powder, baking soda and I tablespoon sugar. Mix well and then stir in buttermilk just until all ingredients are moistened and dough forms a ball. Set aside. To make berry filling: in large saucepan com-bine honey, I tablespoon sugar, corn-starch, cinnamon, water and lemon juice. Mix until smooth and then add berries. Simmer over medium heat, stirring gently, until thickened. Spoon berry mixture into casserole dish and drop biscuit dough onto berry mixture by tablespoons. Bake in preheated oven at 400 degrees for about 20 minutes.



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Grasshopper outlook turned around

rains should help keep the pest from becoming a severe problem hatch to become nymphs. for the next few weeks in East

Dr. James Robinson and other entomologists with Texas Cooperative Extension are reluctant to predict what will happen during the next few months. Much depends on summer rainfall and the for the grasshoppers.

If the rains are adequate, many of the grasshoppers will feed on weeds and other foods and they will stay away from crops. Along forage production, allowing grazing by livestock and hay to be produced. An added benefit of hoppers in their natural habitat landscapes.

Grasshoppers are not currently a problem in East Texas except for isolated areas. A couple of weeks ago, it was a different story. There were reports of Central Texas farmers finding the ground under their feet squirming with grasshopper nymphs. Reports of grasshopper infestations were also coming in from the Athens and Canton areas.

Farmers were concerned about the infestations because with soil moisture already below normal in many parts of the state, hay and forage could be at a premium during the months ahead.

Though the grasshoppers are small, many farmers elected to treat early. It was an expensive enterprise, but one which was probably wise, considering the past effects of adult grasshoppers on pastures.

At this time of year, the majority of grasshoppers are in the nymphal (young) stage. These small grasshoppers are easier to control when compared to the

larger adult stage. Grasshopper hatches are normally held in check by a fungus

A dry, mild winter has encour- which attacks their overwintering aged a large hatch of grasshop- eggs in the soil. During a dry pers in Central Texas, but recent winter, the fungus does not flourish and more grasshopper eggs

Producers are usually advised that it becomes economical to treat when they can count 25 grasshoppers per square yard. Twentyfive grasshoppers may not sound like a big number, but over an acre, this count could equal 120,000 grasshoppers, At this availability of natural food sources concentration, the grasshoppers can eat as much forage as a mature cow.

Chemical controls for grasshoppers in improved pastures are relatively cheap when products with adequate rain comes better are used at their lowest rates. Sevin XLR and Malathion 57 EC have proven effective on grasshopper nymphs in bermudagrass adequate rain, is it will keep the pastures at their lowest rates. Cost of these products will range from and away from gardens and home nearly \$5 to as much as \$7 per

Which insecticide used depends upon more factors than cost, however, Malathion has no grazing or harvest restrictions. Seven has a 14-day grazing restriction.

The highly toxic insecticide methyl parathion is also labeled for grasshopper control. Because of its toxicity level, Robinson recommended that it be applied either aerially or by a commercial applicator using an enclosed cab machine.

I do not recommend that methyl parathion be applied by farmers with an open air tractor cab and spray rig. It's just too danger-

of grasshopper nymphs only in rangeland and non-cropland. There will not be a special permit allowing the use of this product on pastureland. The choice of insecticides for

grasshopper nymphs pastureland remains to be carbary! (Sevin), malathion or methyl par-

Robinson emphasized that insecticide products are complicated and allowed usage will vary among formulations of the same chemical. Applicators should read the label carefully before mixing or applying. For example, producers should note that the restrictions listed above are for beef cattle only. Restrictions for use on dairy pastures vary considerably.

Sevin, a commonly used insecticide, has another restriction. It can only be used twice in a calendar year. In addition to controlling grasshoppers, it is also effective with another scourge of East Texas pastures, the fall armyworm, which has been a problem in recent years.

You might consider using one of the other products for grasshoppers now and holding Sevin in reserve in case they have a problem with armyworms this fall.

Homeowners shouldn't worry about grasshoppers damaging lawns. Vegetable gardens and ornamental landscape plants can be a target, however. For safe control in vegetable gardens, use Sevin or malathion.

For home owners, insecticides containing bifenthrin and lambdacyhalothrin provide the fastest knockdown and longest residual control. Products containing permethrin cyfluthrin, and esfenvalerate should also provide good control. Be sure to read label instructions carefully before using a product on home vegetable gardens.

Robinson has put together a fact sheet on the various grasshopper control products and their formulations and distributed it to county agents throughout East Texas. Producers needing more specific information are advised to contact their local county Extension

born seventy-four years ago in Cuthand, Texas. She was one of eleven brothers and sisters, including her identical twin sister, Thelma. Her family also includes wife Nicki and their daughter Brandi, all of Paris.

Velma's early years growing up in a large family in the Fulbright area saw her spend a lot of time in supporting the family in cotton farming. She remembers that her family moved to Deport many years ago when they located to the Charlie Barnard place to farm.

Velma smiles when remembering her days in Fulbright. One of her favorite things to do was to go to the traveling picture show. In the mid 1950s once a week a "theater" would be set up in one of the old Fulbright downtown buildings for the showing of a motion picture. She recalls paying about ten cents admission. Her favorites were the westerns starring heroes Gene Autry, Tex Ritter and Roy

Velma married the late Bill Brooks in 1951. Bill was a mechanic from Mt. Vernon. They moved to Deport in 1956 after having lived for a while in Milton. Bill worked in Deport and Paris as a mechanic for Ford and Chevrolet dealers. For a number of years he and Velma had their own auto repair shop on Main

Street in Deport. Those were good years. Velma has lived in her current home since 1961. She reminisces that most afternoons at that home young son David would eagerly hop off the school bus, throw down his school satchel in the ditch, and immediately start flipping and turning summersaults in the yard. She smiles at the memory and says he usually was having so much fun she would have to fix him sugar cookies to entice him to come in

the house. Bill passed away in 1974 and Velma had never really worked outside the home. But since February 1975 Velma has worked at the Deport Nursing Home. She says, "One of the best things to ever happen in Deport was the nursing home. It put a lot of people to work.

In 1977, local farmer and carpenter Octavis "Tater" Westbrook

passed away in 1991, but Velma fondly thinks about how he was handy with his hands. She tells how he liked to build stuff, that he was always working on cabiher son, David Brooks, and his nets and shelves and that he would do a good job with anything he

tried Velma's family always enjoys getting together at Christmas and, since about 1975, probably the most exciting time of the year for Velma has been the Varner Family Reunion. Usually there are between fifty and one hundred family members getting together for good times.

One Christmas, her twin sister Thelma's son, Ray expressed the real meaning of family and caring. His Grandma Varner shared her special gift for Ray and the other grandchildren as she presented holiday wrapped buttered cornbread. As he left for home thinking about all the things he had in the world while appreciating the cornbread, Ray said, "I am so thankful for all my blessings."

When asked what she would like her grandchildren to remember about her, she has quite a story to tell. Her young granddaughter Brandi used to love to look into the refrigerator. So, when Brandi was small Velma would get a bar of chocolate candy and wrap a quarter around it and place it in the refrigerator for Brandi to find. This little "hide and seek" activity has been a joy to Grandmother and Brandi over the years. Brandi has recently graduated from Paris Junior College and Grandma Velma now laughs that Brandi coyly requests a dollar to be wrapped around the refrigerator candy bar.

One of the most disappointing times in the past for Velma was when the Deport First Methodist Church burned. She recalls, "It had the most beautiful stained glass windows. Pastor Hensley was there for a while and we enjoyed Mr. John Crabb, the former variety store owner, who played the violin." Velma's favorite hymn is "What a Friend We Have in Jesus.

The farthest Velma has ever been from Deport is Ulysses, Kansas. She went there to visit one of her brothers. Her dream vacation single day.

Velma Mae Westbrook was and Velma were married. Tater would be to go to Hawaii. She has seen the beautiful pictures, but she says with a wink of the eye, "I won't get there. At my age, it is too far away from my doctor. I would have to walk to Hawaii too. I have never flown and I am afraid of planes and trains now."

Yet, Velma has gotten around somehow. She is somewhat of a collector. She has dozens of dolls, ceramic bells and hundreds of ceramic salt and pepper shaker sets. In fact, she displays a variety of over three hundred fifty sets of salt and pepper shakers she has collected since about 1965. She is proudest of the Elvis shaker set. While she never met Elvis, she surely enjoys his sacred music recordings.

When asked what she would do if she won the lottery, Velma comments she would put it in the bank, sit back and look at it a while. If she had to, she would spend some of the winnings on a new car, because she always had one that somebody else has worn out.

Velma's favorite food is cocoanut. She likes it in and on just about anything. But, you will never catch her eating chocolate. Nor will you catch her going to a dance hall. She laughs, "I wouldn't be in a dance hall because the Lord wouldn't be able to find me there.'

Velma likes simple, homespun fun things. Her best skill is quilting. Her mother taught her, but she doesn't find time to do it much these days. Her favorite quilt she ever made was a Dutch doll pattern. Oddly, one thing she doesn't do is sewing. All her sisters are good seamstresses and she too would have loved to sew clothes. She doesn't garden much anymore either. She loved it though, and her canning skills have kept her busy over the years. She tells that her sweet cucumber pickles are the

When she thinks back on the best advice she ever received, it was from her daddy. He would ask her, "Do you need it or do you want it?" She recalls he taught us to respect and to love each other and to do what was right. One thing she has learned is to treat all people like she wants to be treated. Anybody who knows Velma can tell you that she lives that every


