

Most area gardens are long cone, but a few still have some vegetables still producing. The okra plant is one of these. Did you know that the okra plant is a member of the Mallow family, related to cotton, hibiscus and hollyhocks. It is a annual tropical herb cultivated for its edible green seed pods. (There is also a red pod variety that turns green when cooked.) It has heart-shaped leaves and a large, yellow hibiscus-like flower

Okra probably originated somewhere around Ethiopia and was cultivated by the ancient Egyptians by the 12th century B.C. Its cultivation spread throughout North Africa and the East. The seed pods were eaten cooked and the seeds were toasted and ground, used as a substitute.

It came to the Caribbean and U.S. in the 1700's and introduced in Western Europe soon after. Mature okra, is used to make rope

Okra Supreme V2 pound okra small chopped onion s medium tomato-chopped 2-3 Ritz crackers-crushed cgg

1/2 cup cheddar cheese

Using medium heat, saute okra and onion in small amount of bacon drippings until tender-crisp. Add chopped tomato; stir; cooking for about 5 minutes. Sprinkle on crushed crackers and blend lightly. Cook 5 minutes. Reduce heat. Break egg onto the mixture. Blend lightly until egg begins to congeal. Shape into a flat mound and sprinkle with grated cheese. Slip under broiler until cheese melts

**Stewed Okra and Tomatoes** medium onion-chopped 2 tablespoons oil 10 ounces okra 16 ounce can tomatoes V2 teaspoon salt

V4 teaspoon pepper Cook onion in fat in saucepan over moderate heat until lightly brown. Add remaining ingredients and cook okra until tender and mixture thickens, 10-15 minutes. Stir occasionally to prevent

Cook okra in small amount of water until tender but not mushy. Drain; arrange on dish in single layer. Do not use metal pan. Pour vinegar over the okra and marinate in refrigerator for 3 hours. Drain and disgard vinegar. Arrange okra on serving dish and garnish with chopped tomato, onions and ginger root.

Sweet and Sour Okra 14 ounces okra garlic cloves I dried red chili 7 tablespoons water 2 teaspoons cumin l teaspoon coriander 1/2 teaspoon tumeric 4 tablespoons vegetable oil l teaspoon cumin seed l teaspoon salt l teaspoon sugar 4 teaspoons lemon juice

Blend in garlic, chili and 3

tablespoons water into a paste and empty into bowl. Stir in ground cumin, coriander and tumeric. Mix. Heat oil in large skillet over medium heat until hot. Add cumin seeds and let them sizzle for a few seconds. Slightly reduce the heat and pour spice paste. Stir-fry for minute. Add okra, salt, sugar and lemon juice along with remaining water. Bring to a gentle simmer and cover tightly and cook over low heat for 10 minutes. Sauteed Okra, Tomatoes and

Cut okra into 1/4" rounds. Put tomatoes in pan and cook slowly for half an hour. Drain any liquid. Cut corn from cob and heat butter and oil in skillet. Add okra and onions. Cook until onions are wilted and okra has begun to brown around edges, 10-15 minutes. Turn often and add tomatoes and salt and cook for 5 minutes. Add corn and cook 3-4 minutes. Season to taste.
