HE'S YOUNG TO BE A PIONEER

Mrs. Milton Dudley recently handed us the copy of a column, "Who Nose?" by Lyndell Kenley from the Levelland Daily Sun News. It concerns the Dudley's son-in-law, W. H. (Hop) Graham of Lovington, who isn't exactly the ancient sort we think of when we speak of pioneers, but who pioneered a new central plant printing process some years ago.

To quote Mr. Kenley: "We notice where W. H. (Hop) Graham, publisher of the Lovington Leader, has been named that city's 'Citizen of the Year.' Hop is a long-time friend of ours and we are proud that the Lovington Chamber tabbed this deserving man for his many contributions to his fellow man."

"Hop conceived the 'Central printing plant' idea almost 20 years ago and was the first to publish a number of weekly papers in a single plant utilizing the off-set printing process. Hop is truly a pioneer in the printing and publishing business. He installed the second web-offset-perfecting newspaper press ever built in Friona plant back in the fifties. Hop put together the process and methods that are just now coming into general use in the world's largest newspapers."

"Two Arlington men, Stanley McBrayer and J. Grant Ghormley, invented and manufactured the first web-offset newspaper press in 1956. Hop heard of the development, went to Arlington and wangled the second press off the assembly line. The rest is history—McBrayer and Ghormley got rich. Hop didn't get rich but he did help many of the rest of us along the way. He has a fine family and a host of friends who are proud of the fine award presented to him by the Lovington Chamber."

"More than 62 percent of all the daily papers in the U. S. are now printed by the method that Hop pioneered."

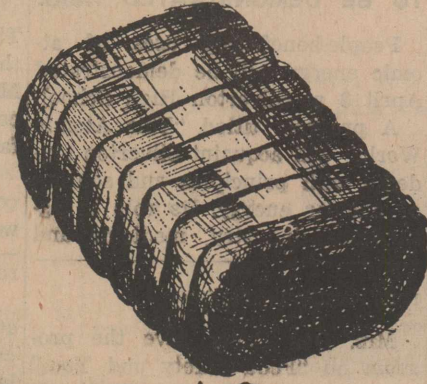
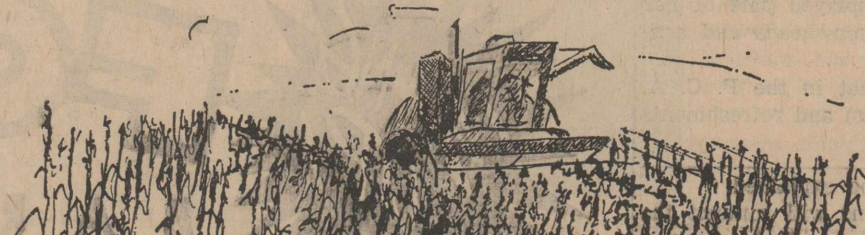

State Representative Surveys Tornado Damage in Lefors

"I just want these people to know we will help them," State Representative Phil Cates said after experiencing the saddest homecoming of his life.

The small Panhandle town of Lefors where Cates grew up had been ripped to pieces by a tornado shortly after midnight Thursday. One was known dead with sixty injured.

Donations to help relieve the distress of the tornado victims at Lefors are being taken at the First State Bank in Silverton. If you wish to contribute to the fund which will be sent by the Silverton community to help the people of Lefors dig themselves out of the debris, you may take or mail it to the bank.

"It's horrible, over 60 per cent of the town is gone," Cates reported in disbelief. "It looks like one huge dump ground."

Usually greeted by throngs of happy friends and neighbors, Cates met sadness in a town torn to bits—146 homes and 13 businesses demolished, the community center gone, the post office heavily damaged. Preliminary damage estimates were set at nearly \$4 million.

Cates flew to his hometown with Mike Cooper of Governor Dolph Briscoe's office, Frank Cox, Deputy State Co-ordinator of the Division of Disaster Emergency Services after an early morning meeting with Governor Briscoe.

"Governor Briscoe has assured me that he will do everything possible to aid and assist the area," Cates said.

Word of the disaster came in a telephone message to Austin from Cates' father, Herman Cates, who related that the immediate family was not injured. An uncle, Edgar Brown, had to be taken to the hospital to have a dime-sized rock removed from his arm. Cates' parents house was slightly damaged—shingles blown from the roof, the front window broken out and a neighbor's roof had been hurled into their front yard by the tornado's powerful winds.

"Many of the people whose homes were completely destroyed are on social security, they worked hard to raise their families here, their homes were paid for, but they have no insurance to rebuild," Cates said. "I want these people to know that we are going to do everything that can be done to help them."

Cates had immediate praise for the state agencies who were activated as soon as they received word of the disaster.

"All the state's resources were put at the city's disposal through the Governor's office," Cates said, adding his appreciation for the work of the State Highway Department, the Department of Public Safety, the Red Cross and others who came to help.

Lefors mayor John Archer has requested and received the declaration of the town as a disaster area by President Gerald Ford so that the townspeople will be eligible to receive long term, low interest loans to rebuild what was lost.

About an hour after the tornado struck at Lefors, a tornado dipped down on the City of Higgins, doing additional damage. About the time of the Lefors tornado, Silverton had an electrical and hailstorm that dropped about half an inch of precipitation.

USES OF ATOMIC ENERGY TO BE DEMONSTRATED HERE

People-benefitting uses of atomic energy will be demonstrated April 3 at Silvertown High School. A program titled "This Atomic World" will acquaint Silvertown students with principles and sources of nuclear energy. Its role in agriculture, industry, medicine and

research will be explained.

Orlan L. Ihms will conduct the 40-minute program. It is sponsored by Texas A&M University's College of Engineering.

Ihms will explain in student terms the structure of atoms, nuclear reactor operation and concepts such as radiation, fission and fusion.

He will employ special electronic equipment to show how nuclear energy is harnessed to generate electricity, plus other applications. Use of radioisotopes in various studies will be portrayed.

In a chalkboard talk to Silvertown High science classes, he will go into extra detail on atomic structure, radioactivity, radiation biology and nuclear science careers, among other topics.

TEXAS TALK

Here are some agricultural terms you may have wondered about: —

INDIGENOUS—a classification of plants which indicates they are native to the geographic area in which they are found.

EXOTIC—opposite of indigenous, plants being grown in areas where they were not previously found. Most crops in the United States are exotic.

FORAGE — fresh or preserved plant material used as feed for animals.

SILAGE— forage preserved by partial fermentation. Usually in a container such as a silo.

HAYLAGE—dry silage.

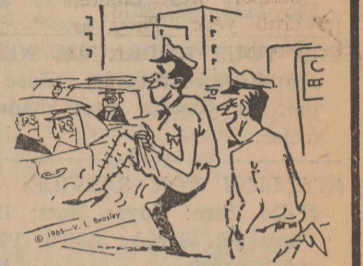
SOILAGE — sometimes called "green chop", it is a crop grown and then fed to animals immediately after harvesting.

TRAP CROP—plants grown to attract particular parasites or insects.
