## Tragic Accident Claims Life Of Monty Teeple

Funeral services for Monty Ray Teeple, 21, were conducted at 3:00 p.m. Saturday at the Silverton Church of Christ, with the minister, Ted Kingery, officiating. Burial was in the Silverton Cemetery, with arrangements under the direction of the Silverton Funeral Home.

Pallbearers were Mike Montague, Roland Montague, Quinn Montague, Steve Brown, Trent Brown and Dana Martin.

The young man was dead on arrival at Central Plains Hospital in Plainview about 10:00 p.m. Thursday, from injuries he received in a one-vehicle accident near Silverton.

Teeple, who lived about seven miles southwest of Silverton, suffered massive head injuries when the pickup truck he was driving overturned on a dirt road near the Roy Montague home. He had been checking the irrigation water on his father's farm just prior to the accident.

His cousin, Roland Montague, was traveling behind him in another vehicle, and went to the home of his parents to summon the ambulance.

Born August 6, 1953, in Silverton, he was a 1972 graduate of Silverton High School and was a member of the Silverton Church of Christ.

Survivors include his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Ray Teeple; two sisters, Mrs. Marsha Brunson of Silverton and Mrs. Venita McGavock of Tucson, Arizona; and his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Teeple.

He was preceded in death by a brother, Randy, in 1960.

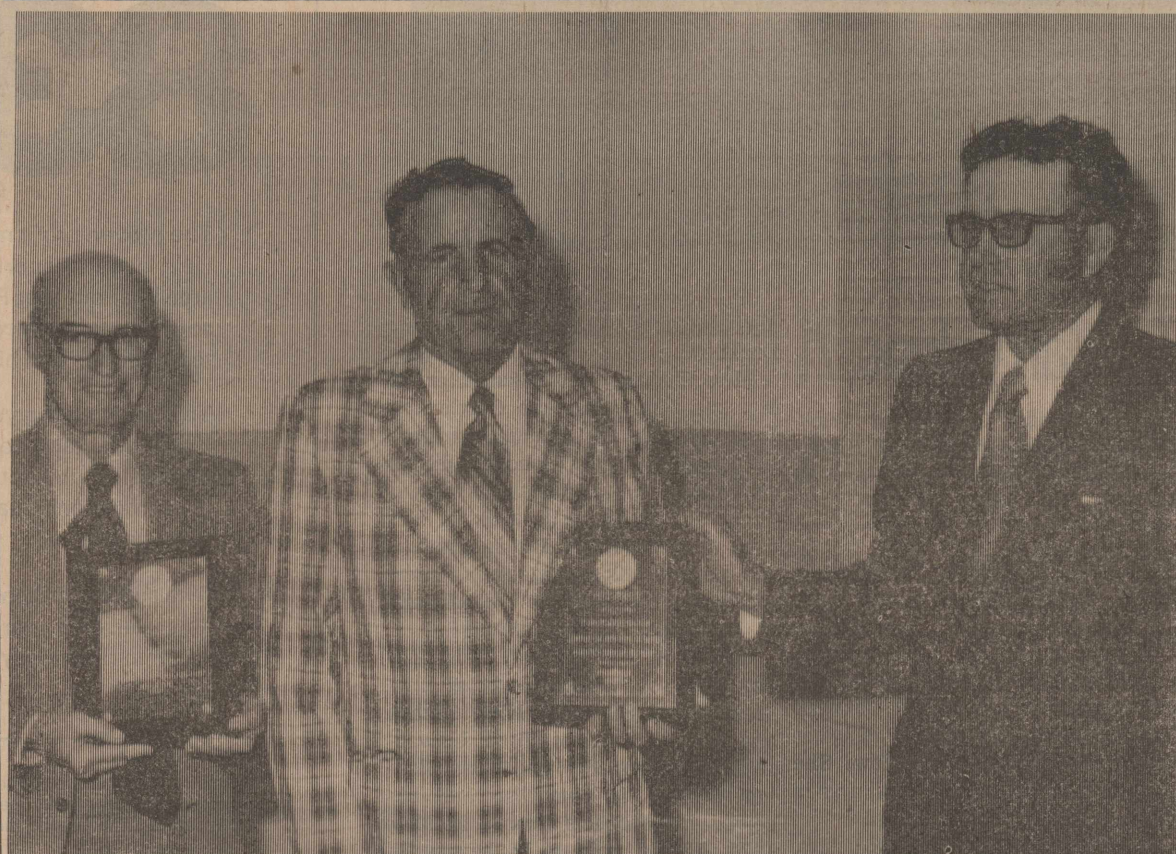

## School Tornado Policy Clarified For Parents

Superintendent O. C. Rampley has announced that school officials make it a practice to stay tuned to the radio during threatening weather in order to receive progress reports of weather throughout the area.

Jerry Patton, whose City Hall office has contact with the Weather Bureau in Lubbock and Amarillo, also helps keep the school informed of local weather conditions.

The school buildings have been inspected by a Civil Defense Inspector who suggested the following procedures for the safety of our children:

When a tornado seems imminent, all of the Elementary students will be moved to the basement of the high school building and the High School students will be moved to the first floor corridor of the high school building.

Students of all ages have received instructions to move in a quiet, orderly manner, and also what to do upon reaching their destination.

In case parents wish to pick up their children and take them to shelter elsewhere, they should feel free to do so at any time. However, parents are requested please to come to their principal's office and let him get your children instead of trying to find them for yourself.

School officials feel this procedure will allow better protection and control of all students, as some become very frightened when parents rush into classrooms frantically announcing tornado warnings.

Please do not ask to pick up children other than your own unless you have been asked to do so by their parents. It is very upsetting to parents who come to school to get their children if they are unable to locate them.

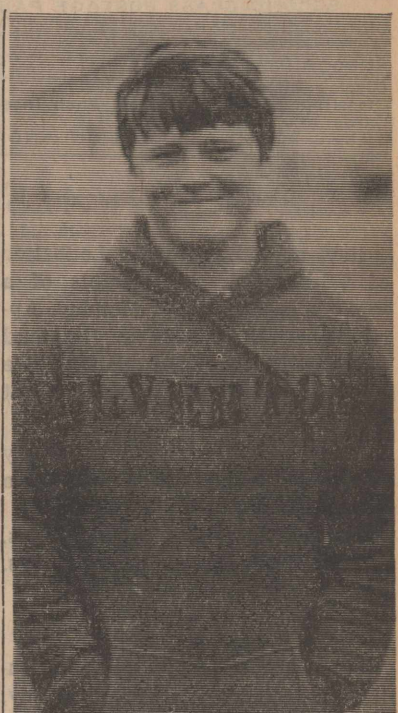
Preachers from the local churches will be called upon to make the Commencement Address in the same rotation system that has been used for the past several years for the Baccalaureate Service.

## Q. WHICH RETAIL BEEF CUTS ARE PRODUCED FROM THE FOREQUARTERS?

A. Beef carcass forequarters produce five major wholesale cuts which are then subdivided into a number of retail names. Wholesale cuts are the chuck, rib, plate, forehand and brisket. From the chuck are produced: Arm Pot Roast, Arm Steak, Blade Roast, Blade Steak, Boneless Shoulder Roast, Chuck Tender, English Cut and Inside Chuck Roll. From the rib comes the Ribeye Steak and Roast, the Boneless Rib Steak, Rib Steak, Rolled Rib Roast, Short Ribs, and Standing Rib Roast. From the Plate comes Plate Beef, Rolled Plate, Short Ribs, Skirt Steak and Stew Meat. The Forehand provides Crosscut Shank. Brisket cuts include Boneless Brisket Roast, Brisket Roast, and Corned Beef Brisket. There are now 46 standard retail cuts not including hamburger and ground beef.

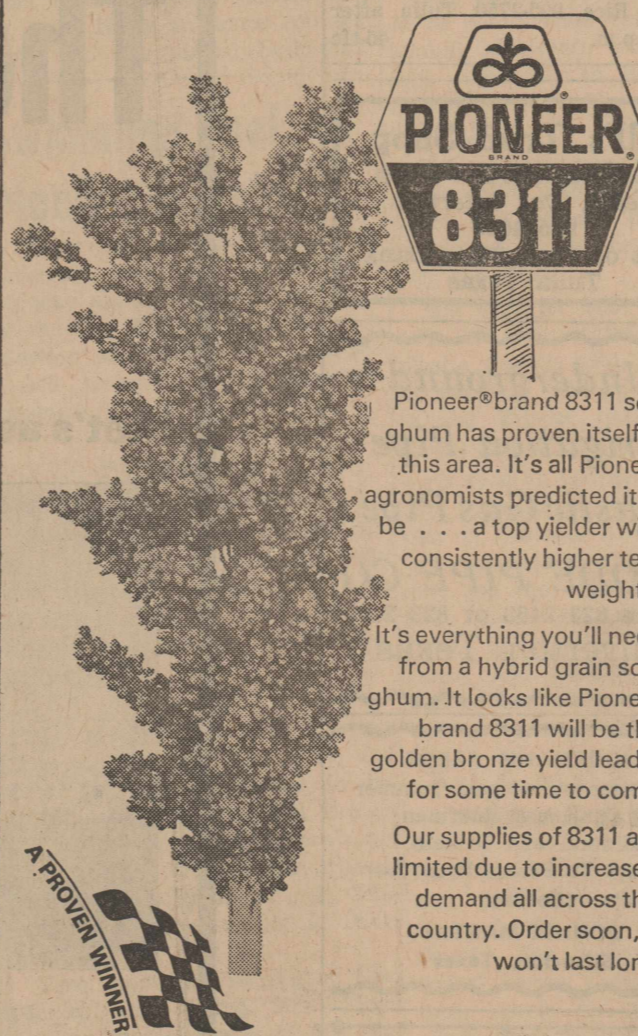

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
