

Storm Damage Seen In Silverton Area

Some damage resulted from the wind storm that hit Silverton about 8:30 p.m. Sunday. Sirens sounded for the second night in a row, sending residents hurrying to storm cellars.

Even though there was no tornado sighting, tornadic winds damaged highway signs, farm equipment, roofs of homes, small barns, trees and numerous fences around town. The Soil Conservation Service office was unroofed after having had a new roof put on less than two weeks ago, and the Burson building had part of its roof ripped off and flung into power lines behind Merlene's Flowers & Gifts. The Billy Wayne Garvins had a metal storage building completely destroyed.

The concession stand at the football field was destroyed.

Electricity went off just before the storm hit due to a break in the lines between Silverton and Lockney. When this break was repaired, service was restored about 10:45 p.m. in the area of town east of Main Street, while the rest of the city remained in darkness. Electrical service was restored in one area of the west part of town about 11:15 p.m., and the remainder of the city was without power until about 4:30 a.m.

An inch of rain fell along with the storm Sunday night, and added to the half inch that fell Saturday night, this gives Silverton a measurement of 1.50 inches for the past week.

In the rural area southeast of town, Jimmy Myers reported that he had a barn unroofed and Berle Fisch lost cotton trailers. Riley Harris also lost a barn.

STORM WARNING SYSTEM

Some residents have asked why the storm warning was not sounded earlier Sunday, and it seems there were two reasons for this. One was that the cloud, which was being watched closely, seemed to split and move in faster than had been expected, and the other is that numerous residents had complained about the alarm having been sounded the night before. Some people seem to feel that a tornado must hit if the alarm is sounded.

The men who man the storm watch system leave their homes and families during turbulent weather to help make things safer for all the residents of Silverton. Some advance directly into the storm in order to be able to radio back the weather conditions. They are almost always the only ones who have no opportunity to seek the safety of a storm shelter. They try to sound the alarm at the proper time. They delay as long as possible, hoping that conditions will improve and this will not be necessary. Then when they do sound the alarm and are later criticized for this action, this causes them to be more hesitant the next time.

If you don't want to go to the storm cellar when the alarm is sounded, don't go. But don't cause the early-warning system to be disrupted for the other people by complaining about it. After all, the elderly and sick people require longer to get to shelter than the young, able-bodied ones, and the slower ones are the ones who need to be considered and given an early warning.

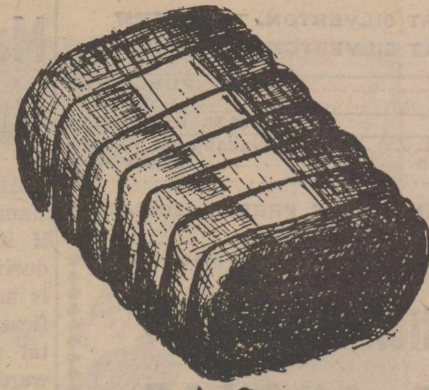
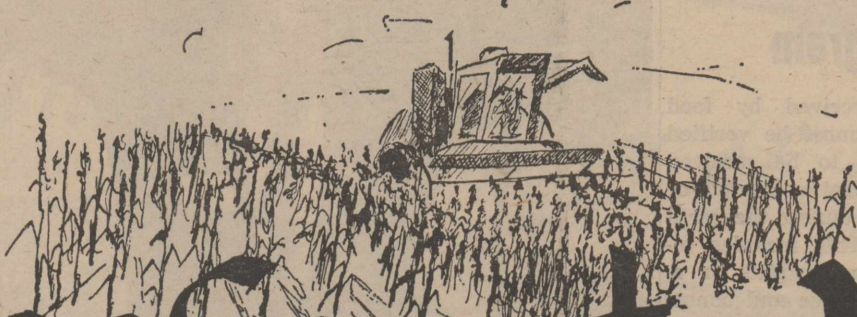
The storm warning system has two sounds. One is the siren which is used to tell residents that severe weather is in the local area, and is for the purpose of alerting people so they will be watching the clouds and preparing to move to a place of safety. If the National Weather Service advises it or if funnels or tornadoes are sighted in this area, the warning system will emit a yelping sound to tell residents to go to the nearest storm shelter.

Marvin Self Wins Missouri Valley Conference Discus Championship

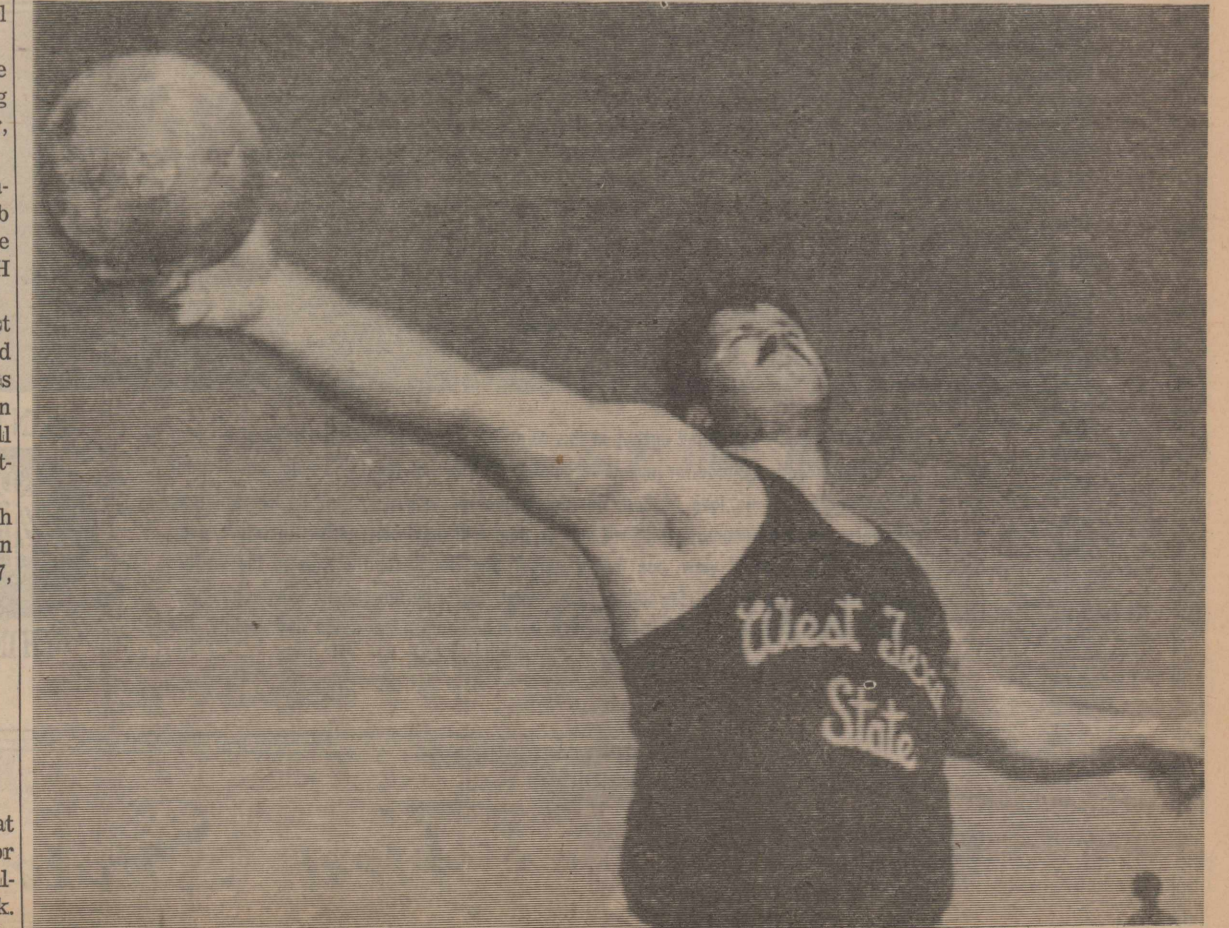

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Income Verification Mandatory In Food Stamp Program

All income received by food stamp recipients must be verified if it is expected to be received during the certification period or is meant for use during the certification period. This includes total salary and wages, gifts or awards for maintenance and bonuses paid as income (such as crop bonus commonly given by farmers).

Charges are occasionally made that employers do not report total wages paid to employees, particularly the crop bonus. However, local welfare officials are somewhat skeptical of these reports. Both the employee and employer commit criminal offenses when income is intentionally reported incorrectly to obtain benefits or increase benefits from the food stamp program. Local officials

feel it is not likely an employer would conspire with his employees to defraud the government. Employers simply have nothing to gain when their criminal responsibility is taken into consideration. The employer commits a criminal offense when he intentionally signs a false income verification statement. The provisions are contained in The Penal Code of Texas, Section 32.32, subsection b.

It is recognized that some abuse is possible in any program. Consequently, an investigation unit has been created by the State Department of Public Welfare. This unit is composed primarily of former police officers who are familiar with investigative responsibilities and the proper legal procedures. If you have knowledge of any attempts to defraud the government, you should report it immediately to the welfare office at

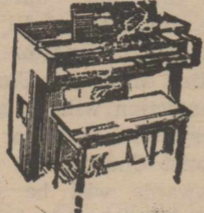

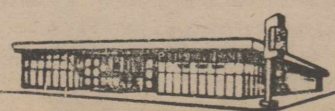



COTTON STILL "IN THE BALL GAME"

Cotton is "still in the ball game," according to an economist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "Cotton was considered on its last leg by many folks last fall due to declining prices brought on by a lack of demand. Although the overall outlook hasn't changed considerably over the last few months, there are a few bright spots," believes Charles Baker.

Despite reduced world consumption of cotton and the highest world cotton stocks since 1966, the bright side of the picture shows a drastic reduction in U. S. and world cotton acreage this year along with an increasing demand as economic conditions improve. "The Upland cotton acreage in the U. S. is expected to be down almost 30 per cent from 1974 levels," points out the Texas A&M University System specialist. "Texas farmers will probably plant about 19 per cent less cotton than last year although plantings could increase due to weather problems that have affected early plantings of corn and sorghum in some sections of the state."

Prospective plantings for 1975 were estimated at 4.3 million acres in Texas on March 1, down one million acres from 1974 plantings. In the U. S., plantings are expected to be down more than four million acres from the 1974 crop.

Major reductions in cotton acreage are expected in the southeastern states, especially Georgia and North and South Carolina where farmers plan to plant less than half their 1974 acreage.

"Failure of Congress to override the President's veto on the new farm bill leaves the cotton pro-

ducer with a 38-cent per pound target or support price and a 34.27-cent loan price," notes Baker.

"This loan price will automatically become the floor for 1975 cotton and virtually the floor for last year's crop. Farmers still holding their 1974 crop can easily weigh the cost of holding against the new floor levels."

Of course, prices could move above the 1975 loan if textile demand improves, adds the economist.

COOPERATION NEEDED IN
BRUCELLOSIS ERADICATION

If brucellosis is to be eradicated from Texas and the United States, full cooperation from cattle producers and all agencies involved in the program is essential, emphasizes Eddie Holland, Briscoe County Extension Agent for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The state - federal eradication program began on a voluntary basis in 1934. In 1954 a system was begun that involved testing cattle to find infected herds then slaughtering the infected animals.

The current program is under the direction of the Texas Animal Health Commission (TAHC), with Dr. H. Q. Sibley as executive director. It calls for the identification of market animals for tracing, investigation of infected herds, and vaccination of replacement calves in high-risk areas, points out Holland.

Although the TAHC has the authority to quarantine entire herds as well as adjacent areas when the situation warrants it, the general policy is to quarantine only the group of cattle where the infected animal was located, explains Holland.

The eradication program is hampered severely when industry segments fail to cooperate in locating herds where reactors have been found, emphasizes Holland. The seriousness of the disease warrants that producer and related
