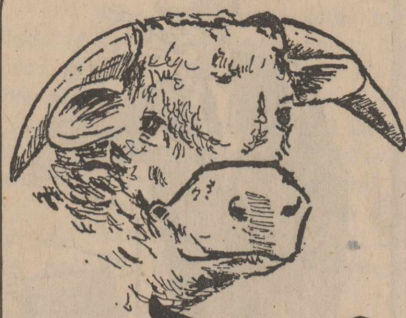

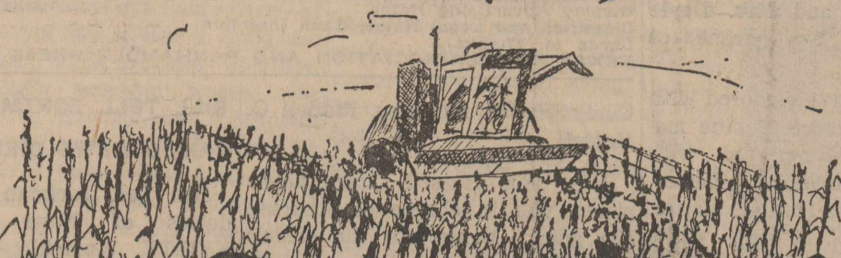

## Horse Project Records Due At Third Elimination June 16

The second of three Briscoe County Eliminations for the District 4-H Horse Show was held June 9 at 7:00 p.m. at the Silverton Rodeo Arena. Twenty-seven Briscoe County 4-H Horse Club members competed for honors, with Roland Moore judging the performance events and Steve Barbour pulling showmanship.

The third Briscoe County Elimination for the District Horse Show will be June 16 at 7:00 p.m. at the Silverton Rodeo Arena. At that time, points will be tabulated and those qualifying for District Competition will be announced. Each contestant qualifying for District competition must, on June 16, turn in an AS3.030 record form on project horses. Copies of registration and certification papers on project horses must be submitted; also, according to Texas State 4-H Horse Show rules, health papers and veterinarian's certification must be submitted on grade horses.

Anyone who does not submit his horse project record, health papers and registration papers on June 16 WILL NOT be eligible for District competition.

## Green Thumb Crews To Go Back To Work

Work crews for Texas Farmers Union Green Thumb will be returning to work on June 16, 1975, according to State Director David Hartwig. Congressional action has prompted the release of \$12 million to Green Thumb and four more national contractors which had been appropriated last December.

The release of these funds will allow 196 men to return to projects which were interrupted in April. This means that work on park developments, school repairs, and other community improvement projects will be completed in 22 counties now being served by the Green Thumb crews.

Crews will start work in Swisher, Briscoe, Lamb, Hale, Floyd, Motley, Terry, Crosby, Dickens, Garza, Dawson, Bosque, Navarro, McLennan, Bell, Falls, Milam, Lee, Travis, Williamson, Bastrop and Fayette.

Sponsored by Texas Farmers Union, Green Thumb employs low-income rural persons, age 55 and over. The workers provide the know how and the manpower to do improvement projects such as described above. Individual placements also assist local communities by strengthening social services as teacher's aides, library aide, senior center assistants, and nutrition site workers. Statewide, Texas Green Thumb currently has 291 persons working in 29 counties.

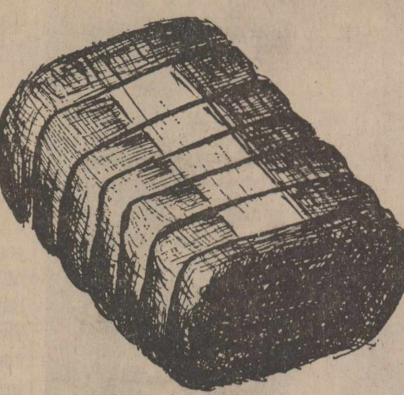
## Attend Centennial Celebration, Unveiling of Plaque

## Information Given on Myasthenia Gravis

Myasthenia gravis is a fluctuating condition of unusual weakness and fatigability of skeletal muscle, aggravated by exertion, emotion, infection, menstruation, surgery, injury, or any kind of stress, and relieved by rest and anticholinesterase drugs. It may occur at any age, from birth to the late 80's, but is most common in women from 20 to 40 (the childbearing age) and women outnumber men three to one, at least in diagnosed cases.

In 1935, Dr. Mary Walker, an English physician, discovered a remarkable diagnostic and therapeutic effect of neostigmine (Prostigmin) on the symptoms of this disease.

This discovery led to a gradual but steady increase in the number of diagnosed cases and a gradual reversal of the mortality rate. Today, less than ten percent of severe myasthenics die of this disease. More than 90 per cent survive—most of them do useful work. Many thousands of myasthenics are now under treatment.

It is now estimated that there are between 50,000 and 500,000 undiagnosed cases of myasthenia gravis in this country, and perhaps many more are suffering from a frequently unrecognized, milder form of this disease. This milder condition, which may or may not be a mild form of myasthenia gravis, responds to the same treatment.

Dr. J. E. Tether of Indiana University School of Medicine, Indianapolis, will be in Hale Center early in September for an all-day M. G. patient clinic. He is a neurologist and one of the foremost authorities on Myasthenia Gravis, and a friend and loyal supporter of the Northwest Texas Chapter of the Myasthenia Gravis Foundation.

### SENATOR FARABEE VOTED AGAINST PASSAGE OF NEW SCHOOL FINANCE PLAN

State Senator Ray Farabee was one of several rural Senators opposing Senate passage of a new school finance plan. The measure, known as the Revised Foundation School Plan, passed the Senate.

Farabee said he voted against passage of the bill because portions of the legislation would cause increases in the amounts local school districts have to raise. School districts under the present plan are required to raise at least 20% of the cost to participate in the Foundation Program. Under the new plan, districts would be required to contribute approximately 30%.

"Under this new program," Farabee said, "it is estimated that Silverton Independent School District would have to increase its local payment by \$93,000. In return, it would receive a \$57,000 increase in State aid."

The Senator explained that a portion of the increase in local money required would be offset by increases in State funding.

"Since some programs are currently being paid for with local money," Farabee said, "it is unclear as to whether new taxes would be required at the local level. It is my contention that the Legislature should not pass a state-wide program such as this one and then expect local districts to shoulder such a tremendous portion of the burden for funding the program."

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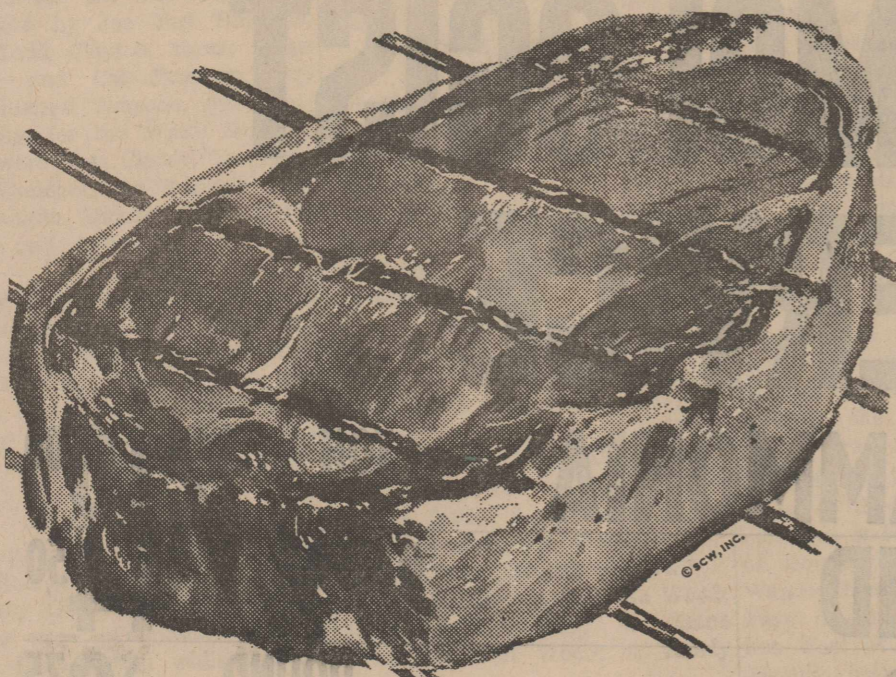

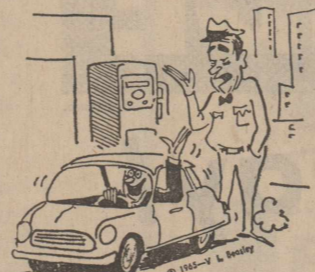

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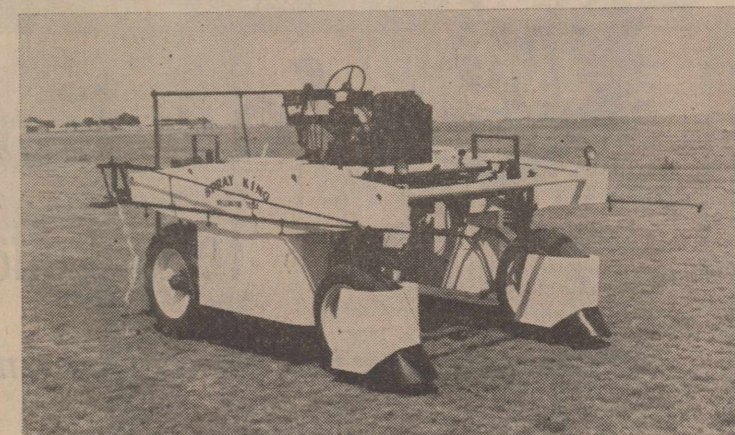
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
