Members started on the bicentennial quilt which they will give away during the rodeo. Donations are being accepted by all the members of the Young Homemakers.

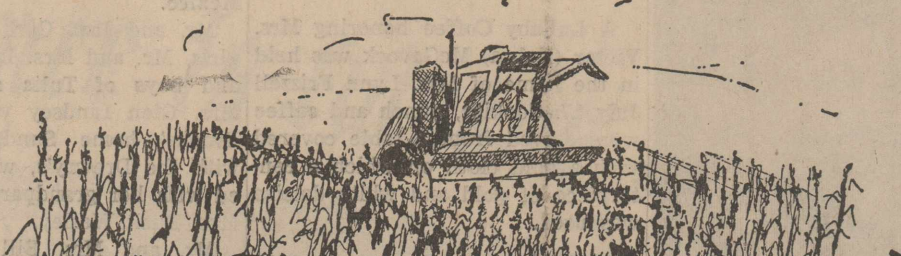

Four Accidents Reported In June

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated four accidents on rural highways in Briscoe County during the month of June 1975, according to Sergeant J. R. Smith, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area. These crashes resulted in no deaths and one person injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first six months of 1975 shows a total of 20 accidents resulting in two persons killed and seven persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for June 1975 shows a total of 572 accidents resulting in 25 persons killed and 355 persons injured as compared to June 1974, with 466 accidents resulting in 19 persons killed and 261 persons injured. This was 106 more accidents, six more killed, and 94 more injured in 1975 at the same period of time.

The 25 traffic deaths for the month of June 1975 occurred in the following counties: one each in Clay, Floyd, Garza, Wichita, Young, Armstrong, Childress, Collingsworth, Donley, Hardeman, Randall and Roberts; two each in Carson, Cochran and Lamb, and seven in Lubbock.

COMPLETES REQUIREMENTS FOR DOCTOR'S DEGREE

Lester L. Grabbe, son of Mr. and Mrs. Warner B. Grabbe, recently completed all requirements for the Doctor of Philosophy degree at Claremont University Graduate School, Claremont, California. His area of specialty is the languages and literatures of the ancient Near East.

His doctoral dissertation, entitled "Comparative Philology and the Text of Job: A Study in Methodology," was an investigation on the use of Semitic languages (such as Akkadian, Ugaritic and Arabic) to help elucidate lexicographical problems in the Hebrew text of the Old Testament. The advisor of his program was Professor William Brownlee, expert in the Dead Sea Scrolls.

He is a member of several scholarly societies including the American Oriental Society and the Society of Biblical Literature. Interest High In Fields Of Sunflowers

Fields of bright yellow blooms have sparked strong interest in sunflowers in the area. And that, in turn, has caused people to ask why the blooms invariably face east, no matter where they are in the field or in which direction the rows are planted.

Hale County Agent Ollie Linder had this explanation in Jim Serfatius' "This and That" column in the Plainview Daily Herald.

It seems that during the budding stage sunflower buds actually "follow the sun," moving from east in the morning to west as the sun sets.

During the next stage, called the "nutating" process, the blooms appear, and the heavy heads cause the flowers to droop, no longer able to follow the movement of the sun. They end up facing the direction in which they first receive sunlight each day, the east.

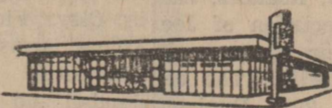

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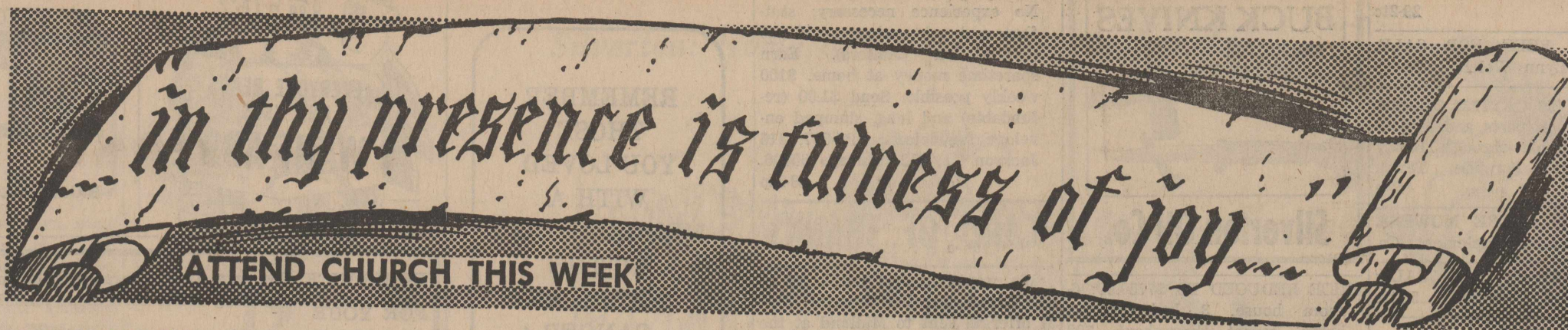

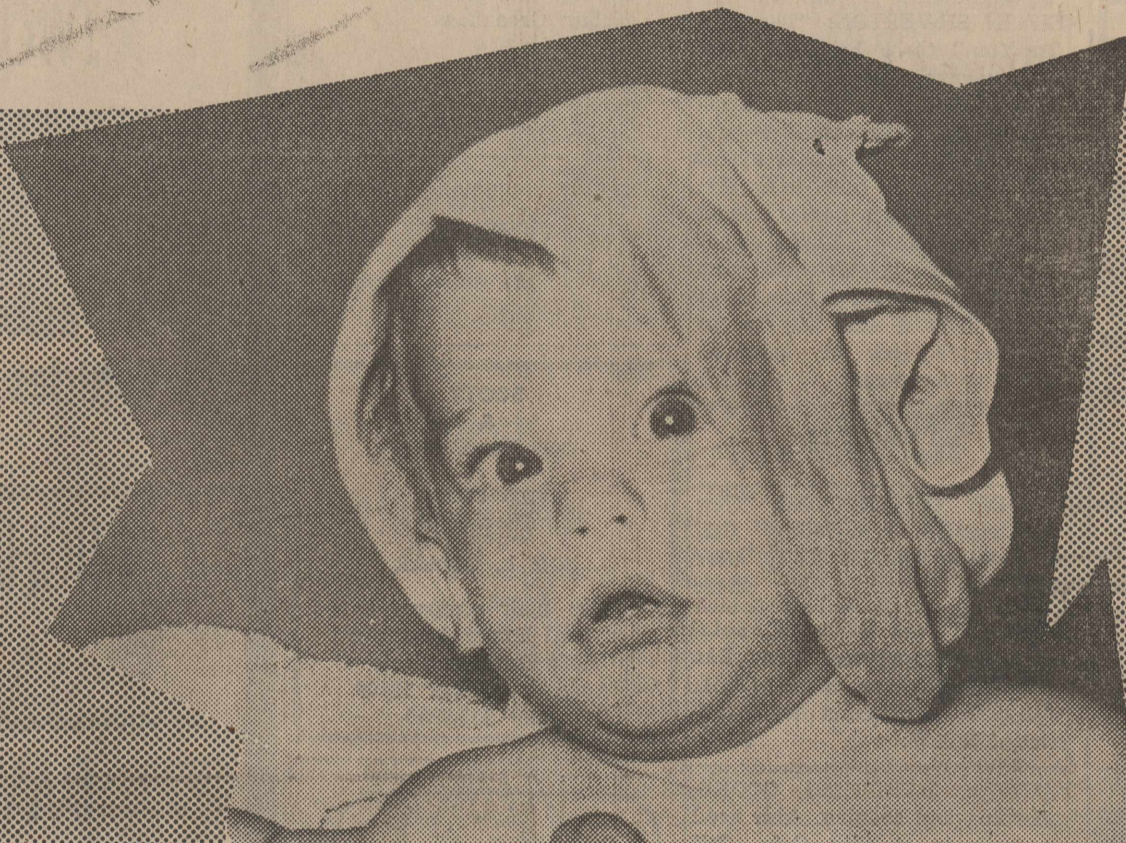

How concerned we are with the image we present to others! And it is right that we should be. How mightily we influence others. It is so important that the self we present is one that will influence others for good.

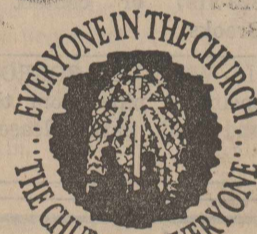
With guidance from God we will be ready to present ourselves to the world in such a manner as to sway others toward God and all that is worthwhile and good.
